LIBRARY NEWS



The most visible news from the Brooks Library this fall is the scene depicted above. The circulation department has exchanged places with the Instruction and Research Lab to occupy the center of the first floor, creating a one-stop access for the circulation of almost all library materials, including films and tapes.

Formerly in media circulation, Diane Rogers will now help the Music Library to increase its hours by 35 percent, and John Streepy will step into the gap left by Linda Baker's retirement from the documents department. Carlos Diaz, from Evergreen State College, will join him.

Less visible are several additions to faculty and staff. Steve Hussman has joined us from New Mexico State University to become the new university archivist and library department chair, a position designed to shoulder some of the burdens of the dean's office. Journeying from Singapore Management University, Ping Fu now heads Library Technology Services. Assisting him will be CWU alumni Andy Jackson as information technology specialist, who has transferred from the university's ITS. John Creech will move to the reference department.

MEASURE THE BROOKS LIBRARY

The Brooks Library is included in every campus tour for prospective students and their families, but few grasp the library's significance for their education. The library is such a crucial learning site that the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL) has devised a set of guidelines by which prospective students can judge the library's contribution to the quality of any college or university.

First and foremost, the library should be an inviting place to visit with convenient hours and a variety of study spaces. Because the amount of available information will double within the four years a student spends at college, it's imperative that the library's collection contain a variety of formats—print and electronic—with up-to-date knowledge. Increasingly necessary is the ability to access electronic information from sites outside the library.

At Central, librarians supplement the work of classroom professors. According to the ACRL, there needs to be enough "friendly, helpful and knowledgeable" staff available to help students with individual questions, either on site or via e-mail, and to teach them how to use the library. And lastly, in this technological age, the library is expected to provide printing services, computer ports, laptops, palm pilots and e-books.

How does the Brooks Library measure up to these guidelines? Users of the library's services think it does amazingly well. And it does so with increasingly adverse budgets. The Friends of the Brooks Library's Endowment Fund helps by supplying monies to purchase educational materials of all kinds.
