NOMINEES

1970 Baseball Team (Nominated by Bob Guptill & Rob Lowery): In terms of winning percentage the most successful baseball team in school history, winning 32 games and losing just eight. After sweeping through the West Regionals, lost a pair of tough 4-3 and 5-2 decisions in the World Series. . . Was the second of three CWU teams (along with 1968 and 1988) to advance to the NAIA World Series. Was led by three CWU Hall-of-Famers, including pitcher Dave Heaverlo (11-2, 1.47 ERA, allowing only 54 hits in 92 innings), first baseman Bill Walker (.382) and third baseman Bill Adkisson (.380). . . Heaverlo and Greg Schulte combined for the best 1-2 single-season pitching combo in school history. Schulte, one of just four 20-game winners in school history (along with Heaverlo, Carl Casperson and Scott Earle) won 8 and 10 decisions and had a team-best 1.40 ERA, allowing just 37 hits in 58 innings. Was coach Gary Frederick's third season as head coach at Central and would be an appropriate time to honor team, on the 40th anniversary of their season.

1989 Men's Basketball (Nominated by Bob Guptill & Rob Lowery): Won a school-record 32 games (matching the 1987 record of 32) and was the last CWU team to reach the national semifinals losing by two points to Saint Mary's, Tex. Season was one of the most memorable in school history, featuring a classic five-game series with Western Washington during which the visiting team won all five. CWU dethroned the defending District 1 champion and top seed Vikings in the best of three finals, winning twice at Bellingham including a classic 73-67 overtime victory in the third and final game. Then as the No. 13 seed in the national tournament, the Wildcats under Dean Nicholson pulled upsets over the No. 4 (Charleston, SC) and No. 5 (Wheeling Jesuit) before suffering a 60-58 loss in the national semifinal game in Nicholson's next-to-last season as coach. Team was led by Team MVP Carl Aaron, who scored 761 points (the second highest total in school history), team captain Dave Biwer, who set a single-season record for rebounds with 359 and Van Beard, who blocked a school-record 113 shots. Jock White was the Most Inspirational winner. At point guard was Jim Toole, who went on to earn Team MVP honors a year later and had a tryout with the Seattle Supersonics.

1988 Baseball Team (Nominated by Ken Wilson): The last CWU team to qualify for the World Series, the Wildcats had a great season-ending run winning six of eight playoff games before losing to a Grand Canyon team led by future major leaguer Tim Salmon. Though the Wildcats finished 29-22, they played perhaps the toughest slate in school history losing five times to John Olerud's Washington State Cougars, splitting two games with the University of Washington and the University of Portland, winning three of five against Eastern Washington, beating the University of Utah and winning one of four games with Gonzaga for an overall record of 7-12 against Division 1 programs. The Wildcats also split four games with eventual NAIA national champion Lewis-Clark State. . . Among the players on the team were three NAIA All-Americans - CWU Hall of Famer Joe Dawson, who set an all-time (since broken) single-season home run record with 16 and also hit .346 and drove in 52 runs, shortstop Marc Greeley, who etched his name in the CWU record book in numerous career categories and finished the 1988 season with a .361 average, seven home runs and 43 rbi and also stole 25 bases and pitcher Charlie Hatem, who won eight of 12 decisions against a schedule that featured 19 Division I opponents.

1984 Men's Swimming and Diving Team (Nominated by Terry Lathan): Led by CWU Hall-of-Famer John Sayre, who was a world-class swimmer and was a contender for the 1984 Olympic team, and Hall-of-Famer Jeff Walker, the Wildcats claimed 26 All-American awards (14 in individual events and 12 in relays) in winning their first-ever NAIA national men's national swimming team title. It was the first of three national men's titles for Bob Gregson, who also won titles in 1986 and 1987. CWU finished with a 7-1 dual meet record and scored 292 points in the national meet in finishing first.

1980 Men's Cross Country (Nominated by Phil Phimister) - Team tied for fifth at NAIA national meet led by Phil Phimister who placed 29th. Finish is highest in school history. Coached by CWU Hall-Of-Famer Spike Arlt. Also included Ted Mittelstaedt (43rd at national meet), Jack Stillmaker (45th), Kent Hernandez (78th), Paul Harshman (99th) and John Freeburg (200th). Tim Moran traveled with team to national meet but was sick and was unable to compete.

Jim Clem, Baseball (Nominated by Gary Frederick) - Elected to high school baseball coaches Hall-of-Fame in 1993. Compiled 481-212 record in 30 years at Burlington and Dayton. Was 26-20 in two years at Dayton and 455-192 in 28 years at Burlington-Edison. Ranks ninth all-time among Washington State prep baseball coaches in victories. Finished second in state tournament in 1989 when team won 21 straight on way to a 24-2 record. Also placed third in state tournament in 1981 and 2006, fourth in 2004 and fifth in 1987, 1988, 1994 and 1995. Placed ninth seven times. . Had 22 consecutive winning seasons, qualifying for state championships 15 times. Won 12 Northwest 3A league titles and finished second nine times. Sent 95 players to the college ranks. Nine players were drafted by major league baseball. . Had 2-2 career mark with two saves in 1974 and 1975 at CWU. Selected as the Don Hopkins Memorial Baseball Award Winner. Was National Federation High School Coaches Association Coach of the Year for Washington state in 2006. Worked as a baseball clinician in numerous camps. . Also coach American Legion baseball between 1982 and 2005 compiling record of 658-224. His senior Legion teams (1982-87) posted a record of 162-76, winning four District championships. His Junior Legion teams (1991-2005) won 496 games and lost 148, winning nine league championships, earning 10 state berths, winning three state titles and two regional championships. Combined won-loss record between high school and legion baseball of 1139-436. . Wife Annette competed in track and field at CWU. Son Zachary played four years for UW and was drafted in 11th round by Milwaukee Brewers. . Earned a BA from CWU in History and Psychology in 1973 and a Masters in Athletic Administration from CWU in 1993. Competed two seasons at Peninsula College before transferring to CWU, twice earning Team MVP honors. . Also coached basketball early in his career and served as athletic director at Burlington-Edison, continuing in that post upon his retirement from coaching following the 2006 season.

John Hallead, Football (Nominated by Rob Lowery): A seventh-round draft pick of the Colorado Rockies out of high school, the former Ellensburg High School baseball and football standout, twice earned Columbia Football Association (CFA) Defensive Player-of-the-Year honors (1998 and 2000) joining Keith Krassin of Pacific Lutheran (1986-87) as the only players to accomplish that feat. He was also a first team NAIA All-American in 1998, an honorable mention CFA selection in 1999, and the team MVP in 2000. Led CWU to CFA titles in 1998 and 2000. He was a standout strong safety and kick returner. At the end of his CWU career, Hallead was second in career tackles (272), a mark that still ranks fifth in school history. He spent three years in the minor league baseball before coming to CWU, after a standout prep career during which became just the second Ellensburg High School football player (behind former Wildcat Bob Shaw) to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a single season. Hallead also set what was then the all-time valley single-season rushing record. It was reportedly said by a baseball scout that Hallead had the fastest legs on the West Coast. . Since graduating from CWU, Hallead has coached at Goldendale (football), Naches (football) and Onalaska (football and baseball) high schools. He was named the 2009 Southwest Washington 1A Evergreen Division baseball Coach of the Year after he took his team to the District IV baseball championship. For the week of Oct. 19, 2009, he was also named the "Seahawks Coach of the Week" after his Loggers' football team improved to 7-0 on the season. The team ended up 8-2, losing 28-27 to King's in a first-round playoff game. The Loggers were 3-7 in 2008. He also served as an assistant football and softball coach at CWU. In addition, Hallead has served on the CWU Wildcat Club board of directors. He graduated in 2002 with a bachelor of science degree in social sciences (secondary teaching).

Terry Kelly, Track and Cross Country (Nominated by Dick Bedlington): Competed at CWU between 1968 and 1971. Finished third in 1969 national meet in steeplechase in time of 9:41 to earn All-American honors. As of the late 1990s was still second ranked second on the CWU all-time steeplechase list with a best of 9:00.8. Also was an All-American in cross country placing 23rd at the 1970 national meet, and leading the Wildcats to a sixth place national finish. Qualified for 1972 Olympic Trials in cross country. . Coached four years at Whitworth College, taught 12 years at Bridge School, an alternative high school. Also taught at Shadle Park and Gonzaga Prep. Was a track and field and cross country coach for 35 years. . Has been a volunteer for hospice and drives a van for a retirement home.

Brian McElroy, Football and Track (Nominated by Tracy McElroy): Was a two-sport standout for the Wildcats earning All-America honors in track and field placing sixth in the triple jump at the 1988 NAIA national meet with a leap of 48-10 $\frac{3}{4}$. Mark was third best in school history. Was 1988 team captain. Competed in one season of track and two seasons of football. Though he was overlooked on the all-conference team, he was selected to the 1989 Little All-Northwest football first team that encompassed all the NAIA programs in the Northwest, indicating that he was one of the best defensive backs in the region. Was the 1989 Team Most Inspirational award winner. Played on two teams that never lost a regular-season game going 18-0-1 in the regular-season. . Participated in the 1990 Mini-camp with the New York Giants, the Super Bowl champions. Played at Walla Walla CC prior to enrolling at Oregon State and Central Washington. . In high school was a State triple jump champion at Mt. Tahoma High School. . Professional achievements including being a church elder, recreation therapist, Little League football coach and former athletic director/Acting executive director for Boys and Girls Club. . Was affiliated with Team LRF (Lymphoma Research Foundation) as a survivor/advocate.

Paul Harshman, Track and Field & Cross Country 1979-84 (Nominated by Clifford Brock Hogle, Paul's high school coach): CWU's Track MVP and Inspirational award winner in 1984. 1982 team captain in cross country and 1981 Inspirational award winner. . . Still holds school 3000 record of 8:18.4 and 10,000 record of 29:41.50 25 years after they were set. . Also still ranks second all-time in 5,000 and 10th in 1,500. Only GNAC athlete to rank in Top 10 in four different events. . Placed third in 10,000 to earn All-American honors in 1984 national meet in time of 30:07.0. Also placed seventh in 5,000 in 1984 and 11th in 10,000 in 1982 national meet. . Competed in NAIA national cross country meet four times (1979-82) leading Wildcats to Top 10 national finishes each time . . 1984 district champion in 5,000 (14:42.10). . In post-collegiate career has won over 25 Seattle area road races. Placed second in 1992 Seattle Marathon and seventh in 1995 Portland Marathon. Ran a 2:22 time in 1991 Las Vegas Marathon. . Was sponsored by and ran for Reebok, Asics and Etonic shoe companies from 1984 to 1995. . Has been a teacher and music director (high school band) for past 25 seasons. Currently teaches in Shoreline school district. . Is Director of Bands at Shorewood High School. Also teaches the Beginning and Concert Bands at Lakeside Middle School in Seattle. Also serves as the conductor of the Music Works Jazz Orchestra, a professional jazz ensemble in the Seattle area and is in demand as a guest conductor and clinician for both jazz and concert band festivals throughout the country. . Paul's jazz ensembles have been considered among the finest in the nation since the early 90s, winning many of the most prestigious jazz festivals in the country including the Reno Jazz Festival, the Fullerton Jazz Festival, the Lionel Hampton/University of Idaho Jazz Festival and others. . His groups have qualified for the Essentially Ellington Festival in New York City five times and in 2005 received an honorable mention award at the festival. . His ensembles have performed through invitation in Chicago, Switzerland, The Hague in The Netherlands, Washington D.C. and New York. . 1984 grad with a BA Music Education, Cum Laude. Received Master of Music Degree from Northwestern.

Mark Brown, Track (Nominated by wife) - Had back-to-back second place national finishes in 5,000 meters in 1978 and 1979. Still holds school record in 5,000 meters with time of 14:10. Had best time in nation in 5,000 in 1978. Missed winning national title in 1978 by less than a second running a time of 14:24.75. . Placed second in mile in Washington State high school track meet in 1975. Was No. 1 runner on CWU's 1979 cross country team that competed in national meet. . Works in computer industry as an executive. . Has worked with the Beaverton Track since it was organized in the 1990s, mainly to assist youngest son, Patrick, who has autism. According to letter from wife, Patrick was able to learn to run with others, listen to directions and participate in track meets . . Is member of Autism Society of America and Autism Research Institute.

Tom Merrill, Football (Nominated by Gary Frederick) – Played at Central Washington in the mid 1950s. Was head coach at the high school level for 29 years, compiling record of 159-118. Coached 23 seasons at Kennedy High School (1972-94). Also coached at Wishkah Valley, Tyee and Roosevelt. Ranks 44th on the all-time Washington State High School winning list. Was inducted into the Washington State Football Coaches Hall of Fame in 1998.

Rick Harris, Football (Nominated by Bob Guptill) - Voted Best Tackler award winner four years in a row (1975-78). Only athlete in CWU history (in any sport) to win a "special award" four different times. Team captain and Most Inspirational Award winner in 1978 (giving him three special awards for that team). Twice first team all-conference linebacker. From Toppenish. Did not win any All-America honors, but that might be more a reflection on team's success than his individual accomplishments. Was an outstanding Hall-of-Famer down lineman, who teams often ran the ball away from according to Tom Parry.

Eric Boles, Football (Nominated by Brendon Kensel) – Last CWU player drafted by the NFL going to the New York Jets in the 11th. Round. Also played with Green Bay. . . Caught 67 career passes for 1,162 yards, including 37 for 667 in senior season in four seasons with the Wildcats. Honorable Mention All-American in 1991. . . Boles is President of Edge Learning Institute, a training and development company dedicated to maximizing the human asset. He is a highly acclaimed keynote speaker and consultant for some of the most recognized companies in the world and the elite special forces. His expertise is in team dynamics, leadership, maximizing momentum, personal growth and change. His clients include AFLAC, Starbucks Coffee Company, Southwest Airlines, Coca-Cola, Boeing, Alaska Airlines, IRS, Thermo Fisher Scientific, Money Tree, Bonneville Power Administration and the Army Rangers to name a few. . Prior to becoming an authority on teamwork, leadership and personal development, Eric learned many principles of team dynamics and leadership from his experience playing in the National Football League (NFL) with the New York Jets and Green Bay Packers. Eric had the privilege of being coached and mentored by some of the finest coaches in the game. . Eric has presented all over North America with audiences ranging from 5 to 20,000 people. From the boardrooms of some of our nation's most prestigious Fortune 500 companies, to our Federal Government, non-profit organizations, private companies as well as trade associations, Eric has earned the reputation as a dynamic presenter, facilitator, executive coach and friend. . According to his web site, typically receives a fee for \$10,000 to \$13,000 per speaking engagement.

Jeff Hillis, Swimming (Nominated by Bob Guptill) - Won 13 All-American awards, including six individual national championships between 1985 and 1988. Three-time national champion in 100 breast (1986-88). Three-time national champion in 200 breast after finishing second freshman season. Also swam on national championship 400 medley relay team in 1986. Helped lead Wildcat teams to team national championship in 1986 and 1987. School record holder in 100 and 200 breaststroke.

Nick Snyder, Football (Nominated by Bob Bunton) – Played for Wildcats in 1987 and 1988. Selected Best Tackle award winner in both seasons. Was first team all-conference both seasons. Honorable mention All-American in 1987. . .As of 2000, only one other player in school history who played only two seasons had more tackles. Graduated in 1990. . .“Nick could flat out play. Undersized, but had great speed and nose for the fall.

Bill Beattie, Football (nominated by CWU Hall-of-Famer Jack Curtright). . . Was honorable mention offensive line All-American for Wildcats in 1982. Won CWU Best Blocker award the same year. Three-year starter for Wildcats. . .According to Curtright is one of the top football coaches in the state of Washington at Olympia High School. . .22 years as head coach, 7 at Elma and 15 at Olympia. . .151-73 record including 8-2 in 2009 qualifying for the playoffs for the 12th time in 22 years. . .Won 11 conference titles. . .Has reached quarterfinals 3 times and semifinals once. . .Twice his teams have been State Academic champions. . .Has had more than 60 players play at the college level. . .Four of his former assistant coaches have gone on to be head coaches. . .Coach of the Year 10 different times. District III Coach of the Year in 2003. . .Has participated in State All-Star game in three different capacities – as a player (1978), as an assistant coach (1996) and as a head coach (2005). . .Oversees a program that annual draws 150 participants (varsity, 2 JV teams and a freshman team). . .Recognized by Seahawk Football as State Coach-of-the-Week twice (2001 and 2008). . .Originated Bear Buddy program at Olympia in which high school players mentor and follow young kids through their seasons.

Gerry Abbott, Football and Booster for Meritorious Service (Nominated by Dave Coffman) – Played football between 1965 and 1968. Served on CWU Foundation Board for four years (1998-02) providing strong support for Central athletics. Also served on several committees in providing direction for the Foundation Board. . .Past president of Wildcat Club. Organized Tom Parry recognition banquet.

Mike Dunbar, Football Coach (Nominated by Marc Yonts) (Note: Our current ByLaws require that a coach have 10 years of service to CWU. Dunbar has 9, 6 as a head coach and 3 as an assistant so consideration of his nomination would require unanimous consent to waive that rule) – Was assistant football coach at Central Washington between 1980 and 1982 and twice was head coach, first in 1983 and then again between 1987 and 1991. Second winningest coach in school history with record of 54-9-1 including 33-3-1 conference record in six seasons. By far, the winningest coach based on percentage in both CWU and Columbia Football Association history. . .Won six different Coach-of-the-Year awards (Northwest and Mt. Rainier League in 1987, Mt. Rainier and Kodak Region V in 1988, Kodak Region V in 1989 and Mt. Rainier in 1991). . .Led CWU to five straight post-season berths 1987-91 reaching semifinals in 1989 and 1991. . .Helped set the stage for perhaps the two best teams in school history. . .Came in as an assistant in 1980 and his recruiting was a key in helping turn around a program that had won just one game in previous two seasons. After he left for the University of Massachusetts, CWU reached the national semifinals in 1984 with a team largely built by Dunbar. . .After returning in 1987, he once again left for Division I following the 1991 season and many of his final year recruits were key players on the 1995 national championship team including Jon Kitna. . .He served as a head coach at Northern Iowa for four seasons between 1997 and 2000 compiling records of 7-4, 7-4, 8-3 and 7-4 for a career head coaching record of 83-24-1 in 10 seasons. Has been an assistant at Northwestern, California and Minnesota. .CWU put together a 41-game regular-season unbeaten streak starting in 1987 and ending in 1992 during Jeff Zenisek’s first season as head coach.

Melissa Sawyer, Women’s Soccer 1995-98 (Nominated by Michael Farrand) – Best defender in school history earning second team All-American honors the only CWU athlete to ever win such an accolade in women’s soccer. Three-time all-conference. Played on some of the best soccer teams in CWU history in the late 1990s. Scored eight goals in career, a very high number for her position.

Byron Johnson, Football (nominated by Vernell Chandler): Played for Wildcat football team between 1962 and 1965. Was offensive end and defensive tackle. Four-year letterman. All-conference honorable mention sophomore, second team as junior and first team as senior. Drafted by Dallas Cowboys. Also played basketball. . .Was long-time football coach and history teacher at Franklin High School. Died of diabetes in 1998 at age of 53.

Jim Carmody, Football (Nominated by L.G. Carmody) - Excerpts from LG's letter: "was one of the best backs in post-World War 2 era. . .played under three coaches in four years. . .as one of his coaches, I was in position to evaluate his ability, his attitude and dedication as a football player and as a student and loyal alumni. Never in the years he played at Central did he not give the very best in any endeavor he undertook. If more were around to help me recall Jim as a player his selection would be almost automatic. . .he was known to make plays when needed - to be called upon to make difficult blocks, because of his speed, to be a rugged defensive back in the days when the two platoon was just beginning - to play 60 minutes was common, yet difficult to imagine by today's standards." . . .Earned honorable mention all-league honors in 1946. .hit like a ton of bricks. . . .Had ability elude, outrun and when necessary run over defenders. . . .Was outstanding in setting up blocks for teammates. . . .Was a successful business man who at times was invited to lecture at CWU guest speaker.

Robin MacAlpine, Wrestling (Nominated by Bob Guptill) - Won 1984 national title at 126 pounds after finishing second in 1983. Career mark of 52-30-1. While that record doesn't sound overly impressive take into account the many of his losses were to Division I athletes. With a strong endorsement from Jim Pappas was almost elected in 1999.

Scott Iwata, Mascot, 2000-04 (Nominated by Lucas ??? & Renee Allwine) – Has run several marathons for non-profit causes. PRSA (Public Relations Society of America) National, PRS NYC, Team in Training through the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society & the NY City Road Runners. . .Scott spearheaded a fundraising drive for new mascot outfit. He personally raised \$5,000 from private donors to make over the new Wellington. Since graduating, he has competed in the Country Music Marathon, the Bronx Half Marathon and presently is in training for the San Francisco Marathon and Philadelphia Half Marathon, all while fundraising more than \$6,000 for blood cancer research. . .Is an Associate Account Manager at America Online Platform-A Online Division. Won the Zango Bullseye Award which is an employee of the year award only given to 12 people nationwide. . .

THE WATCH LIST

COACHES

Bob Gregson, Swimming Coach – Long time swim coach who has refused to be considered in past. Has credentials in his sport equal to Beardsley, Parry, Nicholson, etc. Should be in Hall of Fame. After the passage of time, perhaps he might consider.

Jeff Zenisek, Football Coach and Player - Best Blocker award winner in 1981. Coached Wildcats to only national championship in team sport. Had record of 35-17-1 in five seasons as head coach.

Gil Coleman, Basketball Coach – Though he career was cut short accomplished enough to be selected to the Washington State Coaches Hall of Fame in 2008. Had outstanding prep, though short, career as well leading Onalaska (with Ron vanderSchaaf) to state title.

FOOTBALL

Kenny Thompson, Football and Track – Team MVP in 1991. First team All-American, Rushed for 1,455 yards and 22 touchdowns in two seasons. 6.4 per averaged second best in school history behind Hall of Famer Pat Patterson. Also school record holder in high jump with best of 6-11. Placed sixth in national indoor meet in 1991 (6-9) and fifth in 1990 in outdoors (6-11).

Jimmie Dillingham, Football – Ranked third on all-time rushing list with 2,405 yards (as of 2001) and 22 touchdowns. No. 2 in all-purpose yardage with 4,181 (as of 2001), including 1,241 on kickoff returns.

Kyle Fowler, Football - Caught 72 passes for 1,221 yards and 17 touchdowns. Led CWU to first-ever NAIA national berth in 1984. Only played two seasons and doesn't have the career numbers of some other players, but probably best overall receiver CWU has had past 20 seasons (though Brian Potucek and Kenny Russaw fans might argue that point). “Great hands”.

Craig Danielson, Football - First team All-American offensive lineman in 1985. Also All-American in wrestling placing seventh in 1987 national meet. Only offensive lineman every to be named Team MVP.

Tyson Raley, Football – One of six players in CFA history to earn first team all-conference honors four times. 3,982 all-purpose yards (3rd as of 2001). As of 2001, ranked second in career catches with 160 and also rushed for 1,521 yards.

James Atterberry, Football – Caught 147 passes for 2318 yards. Yardage was second best in school history through 2001. Ranks right there with Fowler, Spevak and Potucek among all-time great Wildcat wide receivers.

Mike Grant, Football - First team All-American wide receiver. Caught 86 passes for 1585 yards.

Rick Harris, Football - Voted Best Tackler award winner four years in a row (1975-78) though he played on some bad teams. Team captain and Most Inspirational award winner in 1978. Twice first team all-conference linebacker. From Toppenish.

Tim Kofstad, Football - First team All-American linebacker in 1981. Ranks 15th (as of 2001) in career tackles, despite playing just two seasons.

Tracy McKenzie, Football - Great linebacker on 1988-91 teams. First team All-American. As of 2001, eight in school history in tackles with 227.

Pat Maki, Football – Was CWU all-time leader in interceptions with 19 (in an era when the passing game was not as dominate) before Jason Patterson broke the record in 2001.

CROSS COUNTRY AND TRACK

Keith Baker, Track – Five-time All-American, finishing sixth, fourth and second in 110 high hurdles in 1990, 1991 and 1992 and second in 60 indoor hurdles in 1992. Won 1991 national indoor hurdles title. School record holder in 110 hurdles.

Toby Suhm, Track & Cross Country - Had highest finish ever in NAIA men's national meet (13th in 1977) prior to ninth place finish by Eric Tollefson. Won two district 5,000 meter titles and one 10,000 meter title.

Bill Jurgens, Track - Placed second and third in shot put at 1953 and 1954 national meet.

Jon Torrance, Track - Only male athlete ever to win national individual title in track-and-field. Won 1987 hammer title and placed sixth in discus in 1986 national meet. Two-time district discus champion. Twice selected track MVP (1986-87). Was also CWU's first Academic All-American in track-and-field in 1987. Shared team captain that year with Charles Chandler.

Mike Pace, Track & Cross Country - Finished fourth in 1987 NAIA national meet in 1500 and second in 1988. School record holder in 1500. Team MVP in cross country.

SOCCER

Judy Koenigs, Women's Soccer - CWU's all-time leading scorer with 27 goals and 65 points. Two-time all-conference. Married to Scott Earle who is one of the winningest baseball pitchers in school history. Both are probably future Hall-of-Famers.

Darcy Neil - Four time Team MVP as defender (1992-95). Three-time all-Conference. Honorable Mention All-American.

BASKETBALL

Theartris Wallace - Averaged 12.6 points and had 255 rebounds. Maybe not Hall-of-Fame numbers, but was second team All-American in 1969 and here is what Dean had to say about him when he ranked him among his all-time Top 10: "He was a super player at both ends of the court and was a great team player. He played tough defense and was a great shooter.. He had a skinny frame, but was a hell of a rebounder for his size." .

Dave Oliver, Basketball - Two-time honorable mention All-American in 1976 and 1977. One of top scorers and rebounders in school history among two-year players.

Ray Orange, Basketball - Second Team All-American in 1980. Honorable mention All-American in 1979. One of best shot blockers in school history.

Kristi Wilson, Basketball - Career rebounding leader with 640 and ranks fourth in career scoring with 846. Two-time Team MVP.

Carl Aaron, Basketball - Scored 1,410 points in two seasons 1987-88. One of only two players (20.7) along with Mel Cox (21.2) to average 20 points a game in career. Definitely one of top 10 players in school history, but probably didn't get a degree so may not be eligible without waiver.

Leon Johnson, Basketball - Third best career average in school history (18.9). Along with Aaron only two-year player in school history to score 1,000 career points.

SWIMMING

Craig Weishaar, Swimming - Won 14 All-American certificates, including national title in 1978 200 breaststroke. Three time national runner-up in 400 IM (1975-77).

Russ Ferguson, Swimming - Won 16 All-American certificates, including national title in 1977 100 breaststroke. Also finished second twice in 200 breaststroke.

Tom Drury, Swimming - After transferring from University of Washington, won 1987 national title in 1650 free. Finished third twice in 500 free and once in 1650. Also swam on two second place relay teams.

Cyndi Hudson, Swimming - Won 20 All-American awards between 1986-88. Finished second in 1986 and 1987 50 free. Swam on four national championship relay teams. Elected not to turn out senior season.

Tani Thorstenson, Swimming - Won 19 All-American awards between 1984-87. Swam on two national championship relay teams. Highest individual finish was third.

WRESTLING

Bill Elliot, Wrestling Coach - On CWU's first wrestling team. Long-time successful high school coach at Cashmere and member of High School Coaches Hall of Fame.

Joe Sanford, Wrestling and Pro Rodeo Clown - 1978 National champion. Later was fairly well-known professional rodeo clown.

Bill Hoglund, Wrestling - 1982 national champion at 118.

Lenal Brinson, Wrestling - 1987 national champion at 126.

BASEBALL

Marc Greeley, Baseball - Honorable mention All-American in 1988. Key figure on national qualifying 1988 baseball team. Set CWU career leader in games, at bats, runs, hits, total bases, RBI, walks, stolen bases. Second in home runs. Had .330 career average. Twenty years later still ranks second in games, third in at bats, second in runs, third in hits, fourth in triples, third in home runs, third in total bases, second in RBIs, second in walks and first in stolen bases.
