

COACH WILSON IN 7TH SEASON

Coach Fred Wilson's successful tenure "on the hill" has produced one outright Northwest Conference title and a share of two others in six seasons. The fiery head football man at Lewis and Clark begins his seventh season with a record of 34-19.

In 1965, Wilson's first season as head coach, the Pioneers were plagued by injuries (more than half of the original starters were out for the season by the third game) and the final record that year read 3-5. Wilson led LC all the way back the next season, finishing 8-1 and winning the NWC crown outright. He gained NAIA Dist. 2 Coach of the Year honors for that accomplishment.

Wilson learned his football from the man who preceeded him as head coach--Joe Huston. Fred played for Huston, now LC Athletic Director, from 1947 to 1950 and was all-NWC halfback and defensive captain on the great undefeated 1950 team. He also was a standout basketball and baseball player for LC. He coached at Rainier and Albany high schools before returning to his alma mater as head baseball and assistant football coach in 1957. He gave up the baseball job in 1968 and now serves as Pioneer golf coach. This fall he also assumes responsibilites as assistant athletic director at the college. Fred and his wife Virginia have two sons, Terry and Danny.

PIONEERS AIM FOR WINNING RECORD IN FINALE WITH CENTRAL WASHINGTON

Of all the missles which are the objects of attention in sports, none takes more unpredictable or crazy bounces than the football. And, that's the story of the 1971 football season at Lewis and Clark which winds up today with a non-conference test with Central Washington. It's a season which has seen a young Pioneer team nearly rewrite the offensive record books on Palatine Hill yet wind up "tied" for last place in the Northwest Conference; seen the team win only one of its first four games yet be able to shoot for a winning season this afternoon; seen the Pioneers lose to lowly College of Idaho yet beat two of the Northwest's small college powerhouses - Pacific Lutheran and Puget Sound.

So bounces the football and today's game on Portland Civic Stadium's Tartan turf could provide a fitting climax to a crazy year. Both the Pioneers and invading Wildcats from Ellensburg have been in the top 10 NAIA total offense teams nationally all year. Both teams are averaging nearly 400 yards a game offense -- and are giving up about as much to their opponents. Central comes into the game with a disappointing 3-6 record and almost identical success against two foes it had in common with L-C this season -- Linfield and Whitworth. The 'Cats lost to Linfield, 17-9, L-C lost to the same team, 17-14. And, CWSC edged Whitworth 24-20. The Pioneers downed the same team, 23-21.

Like Lewis and Clark, Central builds its attack around an excellent passing guarterback. CWSC senior Jeff Short ranks right behind L-C's Pat Miguel with 1,587 yards passing on 130 completions in 277 attempts. Miguel is 124 for 222 for 1,616 yards. L-C has two fine runners in Mike Gano (983 yards) and Larry Mellum (311 yards) while CWSC can counter with R.J. Williams (799 yards) and Cal Allen (579 vards). Sophomores Mike Strader and Bill Gassner both have 37 receptions for L-C while Terry Anderson is

Central's top receiver with 39. Outcome of the game, it appears, will rest on which team can do the better defensive job. But all signs point to a high scoring 1971 football finale.

In addition to aiming for a winning season with a victory today, the Pioneers also will be out to keep their slate clean against Central Washington of the Evergreen Conference. L-C has a perfect 3-0-1 mark against the Wildcats. The last meeting between the two teams was in 1964 and ended in a 7-7 tie. Lewis and Clark's three victories were 12-7, 14-13 and 41-13 from 1953 through 1955. Should the Pioneers win, they will finish the season 5-4. L-C has finished below .500 only six times in the last 25 years of football. The Pioneers' 2-4 finish in NWC play and a tie for fifth place marked only the fifth time in 25 years they have ended up lower than third place in conference play.

SIX SENIORS PLAY FINAL GAME

Six seniors are playing their final game in the Pioneer Black and Orange this afternoon. They are four year veterans Larry Bowe (defensive back and kicker from the Hood River Valley); Luther King (linebacker from Rex Putnam High of Milwaukie); Larry Mellum (halfback from South Eugene); Monty Rurey (linebacker from Marshall H.S. of Portland), and Bob Phillips (middle guard from David Douglas H.S.). Gary Baton (center from Milwaukie) is a twoyear veteran.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM WINS DISTRICT 2 CROWN

Coach Eldon Fix's Lewis and Clark cross country team won the NAIA District 2 championship last Saturday by literally running away from the field at Portland's Pier Park. L-C scored 47 points, way ahead of runner-up Southern Oregon's 75. OCE was third in the eight-team field with 87. The Pioneers finished second to Whitworth in the Northwest Conference meet the previous Saturday.

TIP-OFF TOURNEY TO OPEN BASKETBALL SEASON

PROBABLE STARTING LINEUPS

Lewis and Clark will be host to the northern half of the 13th annual NIA District 2 Tip-Off Tournament which begins its three nights of action on Thursday, Dec. 2. Lewis and Clark will meet Northwest Nazarene in the second game of Thursday's doubleheader, with defending champ Linfield and Oregon Tech going in the opener. Winners and losers will meet on Friday. Finals will be Saturday in Oregon College of Education's new Sports Center in Monmouth. Participants in the southern half on Thursday and Friday are OCE, Willamette, Pacific and Southern Oregon.

Tickets for the tourney are now available at the Lewis and Clark athletic department.

Coach Dean Sempert's Pioneers will play their first home game on Dec. 15 against Occidental College of Los Angeles.

The Pioneers are expected to be strong contenders for NWC honors this season. Chief reason is the return of four starters, including three all-conference performers, from last year's team which finished second then won the NAIA District 2 title. Top returnees include Doug Skille, Gary Warren and Ron Watt.

SOCCER TEAMS DEMONSTRATE AT HALFTIME

Lewis and Clark's "A" and "B" soccer teams will put on an exhibition of the original "football" during intermission of today's game. George Holt, the Pioneer soccer coach, has interest high in the game at Lewis and Clark. The "A" team was undefeated in Oregon Collegiate Soccer League action until last Saturay's controversial loss to Reed. The "B" team, made up primarily of newcomers to the game, is playing an independent schedule but has posted victories over such teams as Portland State. Coach Holt, a former British Army officer and soccer player in England, is working on a project which he hopes will take the L-C team to the British Isles next year during the Christmas break.

PASSEL OF RECORDS IN JEOPARDY

Bill Gassner needs 24 yards to break Jack Head's season reception record of 657 and Gassner and Mike Strader both need 8 receptions to better Head's mark of 44.
