





CENTRAL FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

John Zamberlin (Head Coach, 1st Year)

John Zamberlin, who played seven seasons in the NFL with the New England Patriots and Kansas City Chiefs, begins his first season as Central Washington University's head football coach this fall.

Zamberlin, 41, replaces Jeff Zenisek, who resigned in January to rejoin former CWU head coach Mike Dunbar, who was named the new head coach at Northern Iowa.

Zamberlin has nine years experience as a NCAA Division 1 assistant, however, this is his first head coaching job at any level.

For the past two seasons, he was the defensive coordinator at the University of Richmond. He also previous coached at Eastern Washington University (1992-94) and at the University of Massachusetts (1987-90).

Last year Zamberlin's defensive unit ranked 12th nationally among NCAA Division 1 schools in total defense

sive attacking style of football."

"We will play hard, tough disciplined football," Zamberlin, who will also coach CWU's inside linebackers, said. "My basic philosophy is to teach an aggres-

Prior to embarking upon a coaching career, Zamberlin played linebacker for four seasons with New England (1979-82) and three seasons with Kansas City (1983-85).

He is a 1979 graduate of Pacific Lutheran. At PLU, he was a four-year letterman in both football and baseball. He was selected to the Associated Press small-college All-American football team and was named a NAIA All-American in 1978.

During his collegiate career he had 184 unassisted tackles, 10 interceptions and six quarterback sacks. Three times he was named all-conference and all-district. His number 56 is the only retired PLU football jersey.

In baseball, he was a two-time all-conference outfielder.

Zamberlin, who was inducted into PLU's Hall-of-Fame in 1996, was selected in the fifth round of the 1979 NFL draft by New England.

Coincidentally, Zamberlin began his collegiate coaching career at Massachusetts in 1987 when Dunbar left that school to return to CWU to take over as head coach.

"Mike recommended me for that job," said Zamberlin, who played for Dunbar when he was an assistant at PLU.

Zamberlin is a native of Tacoma. He graduated from Wilson High School in 1974. At Wilson, he earned four letters each in football and baseball. He earned honorable mention All-City honors in football and was a first team selection in baseball.

Misc: Born 2-13-56 at Tacoma. . . Married Mary Ellen Wolf on June 28, 1997. Mary Ellen previously was an assistant trainer at the University of Richmond. Has two children by previous marriage (daughter Megan, 12, and son Kyle, 8).

JOHN PICHA (Offensive Coordinator. 9th year)

John Picha, 31, begins his third season this fall as a full-time member of CWU's football coaching staff. Picha is also CWU's head men's and women's track-and-field coach.

Picha, who previously served as a graduate assistant or part-time coach for six seasons, coached the inside linebackers after joining the full-time staff in 1995. He was named the offensive coordinator and offensive line

coach prior to the beginning of the 1996 season. Picha replaced Charles Chandler on the full-time staff. He also replaced Chandler as CWU's men's and women's track-and-field coach.

Picha led CWU's men to the 1995 Pacific Northwest Athletic Conference track-and-field title and a 17th place finish in the NAIA National meet and was selected the PNWAC Men's Coach-of-the-Year.

Last spring both his men's and women's track squads placed second in the conference meet . His men's squad also finished 23rd in the NAIA national meet.



Picha previously served as an assistant track-andfield coach for three seasons, first during the 1990 and 1991 campaigns and

then again in 1993. He was in charge of the throwing events.

The CWU coach first joined the football coaching staff as a graduate assistant in 1988. In 1988 and 1989, he coached the tight ends. He then coached the defensive line in 1990, 1992 and 1993.

A 1984 graduate of Rogers High School in Puyallup, Picha is a former two-year letterman for the Wildcats. He earned honorable mention all-league honors in 1987 and was the recipient of CWU's Best Blocker award in 1986.

Picha played two seasons at Wenatchee Valley College before enrolling at CWU, earning second team NWAACC honors during his sophomore season.

In 1987 he started all 10 games at center for CWU as the Wildcats averaged 252.7 yards rushing and set a CFA record with 34 rushing touchdowns.

Misc: Born 2-9-66 at Puyallup. Earned B.A. degree in history. Brother Tom played football at UPS. Also has three sisters. Married. Wife's name is Brenda.

JOHN GRAHAM (Defensive Coordinator, 3rd Year)

John Graham, 28, begins his third season on Central Washington University's coaching staff this fall. It will be his second year as the defensive coordinator.

For the previous two seasons, Graham, who also coaches the defensive backs, had been the head football coach at DeSales High School in Walla Walla.

At DeSales, Graham's teams compiled a won-loss record of 12-7, winning the 1993 conference championship and advancing to the semifinals of the Washington State Class B state playoffs.

Graham also served as an assistant basketball and assistant track-andfield coach at DeSales. Prior to joining the DeSales staff, he was an assistant coach for one year at Kent-Meridian High School in Kent.

Graham is a 1992 graduate of CWU, earning a bachelor of science degree in business education. He played two seasons for the Wildcats (1990 and 1991), earning honorable mention all-conference defensive back honors in his senior season. In the 1991 season, Graham intercepted three passes and also was credited with 30 tackles.

Prior to enrolling at CWU, he played two seasons at Walla Walla CC where he earned first team all-conference honors at defensive back.

Graham is a 1987 graduate of Reardan High School. At Reardan, he eamed four letters each in football,

basketball and track. He was a three-time all-league linebacker and twotime all-league quarterback and also was the team captain and Most Inspirational award winner.

Misc: Born 2-7-69 at Ellensburg. Married. Wife's name is Becky. Has two-year-old son, Andrew.

BEAU BALDWIN (Quarterbacks, 4th Year)

Beau Baldwin begins his fourth season as CWU's quarterback coach this fall. It will be his second season as a full-time staff member.

Prior to joining the coaching staff three years ago as a graduate assistant,

Baldwin played four seasons for the Wildcats, and ranks 14th in career passing despite the fact he was never a full-time starter.

Baldwin, 25, completed 121 of 197 passes for 1,655 yards and eight touchdowns. His 61.4 career passing percentage is a school record.

He engineered two of the greatest comebacks in school history. In 1991, he set school single-game marks for passing attempts (52), completions (32), yards (467), total plays (66) and total yards (550) in a 38-35 win over Simon Fraser. His six-yard touchdown pass to Eric Boles with four seconds left gave Central the win.



In 1992 he came off bench to lead CWU to the greatest fourth-quarter comeback in Columbia Football Association history. He completed 21 of 33 passes for 222 yards as the Wildcats scored 26 points in the period to overcome 28-3 deficit.

Baldwin graduated from Curtis High School in 1990 where he earned three letters in football and three in baseball. He led Curtis to the 1989 state football title.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS: Twelve Have Earned Top Scholastic Award

Since the NAIA Academic All-American awards program was initiated in 1982, a total of 12 Central Washington University lootball players have won 14 certificates. That is more than in any other sport at CWU except swimming.

Larry Bellinger and Jeff Nordstrom became the first two-time All-Americans in 1993 and 1994. Andy Lwanga earned Academic All-American honors in 1995. Winners of the academic award have also included defensive back Mark Bergsma and defensive tackle Tim DeGross in 1983, tinebacker Dennis Edwards in 1984, wide receiver Mark Robinson, defensive back and punt return specialist Ron Nelson and running back Ed Watson in 1986, offensive lineman Wayne Kilbum in 1987 and linebacker Eric Granberg and defensive tackle Alan Kesti in 1989.

In addition to being named to the Academic All-American team, DeGross and Bellinger were selected the District 1 Scholar-Athletes for football in 1983 and 1993, respectively. That program was disbanded following the 1993 season.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTS

Joining the four full-time members of CWU's coaching staff this fall are nine graduate assistants, including seven former Wildcat players.

Members of the staff include ex-Wildcats Ryan Fournier (wide receivers), Mike Henry (assistant offensive line), Shawn John (running backs), Gary Michael (defensive backs), Todd Murray (tight ends), Greg Stoller (kickers and Shelby Zamberlin (assistant inside linebackers).

Also on the staff are Josh Fetter (defensive line) and Brian Strandley (defensive tackles). Both Fetter and Strandley both played four seasons at the University of Idaho.

Fournier, Henry, Murray and Stoller were members of last year's Wildcat squad.

Fournier started at quarterback and passed for 1,940 yards and 20 touchdowns. His yardage total ranks sixth in CWU history. He had a season-best 373-yard performance against Southern Oregon and threw for 200 or more yards six times.

Henry played four seasons on the Wildcat offensive line, making a total of seven starts. Murray is CWU's all-time receiver at the tight end position, catching a total of 76 passes for 960 yards and five touchdowns. Three times he earned all-conference honors, including twice first team honors.

Stoller was the NAIA's national punting leader last fall, averaging 42.4 yards to earn NAIA Division 2 All-American first team honors.

John played four seasons for CWU between 1990 and 1993, making a total of 39 starts. In 1993, he was voted CWU's Outstanding Blocker award winner and earned first team Mt. Rainier League and Little All-Northwest honors.

Michael played defensive back for four seasons for the Wildcats, prior to joining the coaching staff last year. He made 27 starts and was twice selection the team's Most Inspirational winner, including two years ago when the Wildcats won the national title.

Zamberlin, the nephew of CWU's head coach, played for the Wildcats in 1991 and 1992.

Fetter played linebacker for the Vandals between 1991 and 1994. Strandley also played between 1991 and 1994 and had a total of 101 career tackles from his tackle position, including 39 in his junior season when he helped the Vandals advance to the semifinals of the NCAA Division 1-AA national playoffs.



Playoffs Still a Possibility For Central

Central Washington completes its 1997 regular-season schedule today by hosting Humboldt State University, the newest member of the Columbia Football Association.

The Wildcats need a win to earn a tie with Western Oregon, which has completed its conference season, for its first CFA title since 1991.

Southern Oregon could make it a three-way tie with a victory at Western Washington. If that happens, the CFA's automatic berth in the NAIA national playoffs would be awarded to the team ranked highest in tommorrow's final national poll. (Call the CWU sports hotline 509-963-1486 after 11 a.m. for first-round playoff pairings).

If the 'Cats don't get the automatic berth, they will need to be ranked no lower than 16th and perhaps as high as 14th or 15th to earn an at-large berth.

Before the 'Cats even think about any playoff possibilities they, however, must dispose of the Lumberjacks.

Humboldt brings a 1-8 record into today's game, including a 49-7 loss to Southern Oregon last week and a 45-7 loss to Western Washington five weeks ago.

Those are the two teams the 'Cats have previously beaten this fall at Tomlinson Stadium. So, obviously, Central will be heavy favorites.

Still, first-year head coach John Zamberlin considers the 'Jacks

a dangerous team. "They've struggled, " Zamberlin said, "but defensively they are capable of putting pressure on you and offensively they are capable of making some big plays."

Humboldt ranks last in the CFA in all the key team statistical categories - total offense (282.7), scoring offense (14.8), total defense (370.6) and scoring defense (33.6).

But, in each case, their numbers are not that far out of line from the league's five other members.

Offensively, the 'Jacks will use play-action from their spread offense. Their main threat is running back Matt Dwane, who has rushed for 587 yards and five touchdowns. Dwane, who hails from Vancouver, B.C., is among the all-purpose yardage leaders in the CFA with 1,106, including 415 on kickoff returns.

Three players have shared the quarterback duties, though recently, Steve Cheek has taken most of the snaps. Cheek has completed 62 of 116 passes for 662 yards and two touchdowns.

The Lumberjack top receiver in Armond Gray, who has 31 receptions for 253 yards. Chris Wisdom has 30 catches for 346 yards.

Defensively, Mike McInerny is the leader of Humboldt's 4-3 defense. McInerny leads the team in tackles with 91 and also has four forced fumbles.

Strong safety Rusty Dudley has 70 tackles, including five for losses. He also has broken up nine passes. Free safety Juan Viramontes is the interception leader with four.

Central brings a two-game win streak into the game. The 'Cats have won three of their last four, including a 36-22 victory over archrival Western Washington last Saturday at Tomlinson Stadium.

A near-capacity crowd of 3,500 watched the Wildcats beat the Vikings for the 10th straight time since 1977 on CWU's home turf.

Quarterback Casey Jacox completed 19 of 32 passes for 343 yards and three touchdowns, increasing his season passing total to 2,016 yards.

Jacox is the top passer in the CFA, averaging 252.0 yards per game. He ranks eight nationally.

Jacox became just the third quarterback in school history to join the 2,000 yard club, joining Ken Stradley (1991) and Jon Kitna. Kitna, the No. 2 quarterback for the Seattle Seahawks, accomplished that feat three different times, including 1995 when he threw for a national-record 4,616 yards.

Jacox also leads the CFA in total offense, averaging 235.1 yards per game. John Hallead is the CFA leader in punt returns, averag-



ing 12.9 yards per return.

Two Wildcat players rank second in the CFA in a major statistical category. Running back Dan Murphy, the conference's No. 4 rusher with 708 yards, ranks second in scoring with 78 points.

Wide receiver Tony Frank ranks second in receptions with 39 for 726 yards. Frank had a spectacular day in the win over Western Washington, catching seven for a season-high 156 yards. He was selected CWU's Offensive Player-of-the-Game by the coaching staff.

"Tony made some great catches and he also did an excellent job of blocking," Zamberlin said. "He also gives us great leadership and hustle."

On the year, Frank has 39 catches for 726 yards. In a two-year career, the Walla Walla CC transfer has 67 catches for 1,206 yards. He ranks ninth in school history in career receiving yardage.

Backup strong safety Marcus Garretson(pictured) was selected the Defensive Player-of-the-Game.

Garretson's 40-yard interception return for a touchdown in the third quarter was a decisive play in the win.

Garretson came on when Hallead hurt his back. The two combined for 12 tackles from the strong safety spot, including a team high nine by Hallead, who had two for losses of four yards.



Rawley Robins was selected the Special Teams Player-of-the-Game. Robins had a big hit


on the kickoff coverage team and did a good job of protection on the kickoff team, Zamberlin said.

LAST YEAR/SERIES: Humboldt State leads the all-time series 4-0-1, but the teams haven't played since 1968 when the Lumberjacks defeated the Wildcats 50-0. HSU also won 24-14 in 1961, 7-0 in 1965, 6-2 in 1966 and the two teams tied 27-27 in 1958. All but the 1961 game were played in Arcata. You have to go back to 1961 and a total of 12 quarters to find the last time CWU scored a touchdown against the Lumberjacks.

THE COACHES: Fred Whitmire (Humboldt State '64) is in his seventh season at his alma mater and has a 37-33-2 career mark. Among his assistants is former CWU assistant football coach and head wrestling coach Scott Ricardo. . . . John Zamberlin (Pacific Lutheran, 1979) is in his first season at CWU after spending nine seasons as an assistant at Massachusetts (1987-90), Eastern Washington (1992-94) and Richmond (1995-96).

MORE ABOUT THE LUMBERJACKS: Just two years ago, the Lumberjacks were contending for a NCAA Division 2 national playoff berth, but they fell to 3-7 last year prior to this season's 1-8 mark. . Elijah Gildea, one of three quarterbacks who has seen action this fall, was switched to flanker two games ago and he had the secondbest receiving yards total by a CFA player this fall. Gildea caught five passes for 170 yards in a 31-21 loss to Western Oregon. . .Though they are just 1-8, the Lumberjacks led Western Oregon 21-17 until two late Wolf touchdowns two weeks ago. And last week the 'Jacks trailed Southern Oregon by just one touchdown before the Raiders exploded for 35 second-half points. . .Humboldt State will be a conference opponent for CWU in all of its sports beginning next year. They are one of nine new schools joining the PacWest Conference. The 16-team conference will be divided into two divisions. Humboldt will join Central, Western Washington, Simon Fraser, Western Oregon, St. Martin's, Seattle Pacific and Lewis-Clark State in one division.

MORE ABOUT THE WILDCATS: This year's Wildcat team is one of the youngest in recent years with just nine seniors on the squad. Playing their final regular-season home game Saturday will be wide receivers Davis Lura, Tony Frank and Josh Woodard; tight end Dolan Holt; defensive linemen Scott Morgan, Mike Talamaivao and Wayne Moenoa, linebacker Rico Iniguez and defensive back Hawley McIntosh. Two other players - offensive guard Jason Frederick and outside linebacker Seanal Stuart - have eligibility remaining, but will probably graduate . . . Iniguez leads the team in tackles with 58, while Morgan is the team leader in quarterback sacks with 11... The Wildcats will return 16 starters next year - eight on offense (if Frederick returns) and eight on defense - for head coach John Zamberlin's second season. . . CWU rallied from a 16-0 first-quarter deficit, outscoring the Vikings 23-0 in the second period to win last Saturday's game. . . . Freshman defensive end John Fields figured in two of the key defensive plays in the game. His fumble recovery in the second quarter was the momentum changer that enabled CWU to turn a 16-3 deficit into a 23-16 lead at the end of the period. Then in the third quarter, he tipped the pass that Garretson returned for a touchdown that extended Central's lead to 14 points. . . Prior to Saturday's game, Central had picked off just eight passes in its first seven games. The 'Cats swiped five against Western, including two by free safety Scott Henry and one each by Garretson, cornerback Leland Sparks and Iniguez. . . Defensive tackle Jason Woods had his second consecutive huge performance, earning CFA Defensive Player-of-the-Week honors for the second week in a row. Woods had eight tackles, including two quarterback sacks for losses of 15 yards and two other tackles for losses of four yards. He also deflected a pass. . . Ryan Baker's 33-yard field goal in the second quarter was his longest of the year.

TRAINING STAFF

GARY SMITH (Athletic Trainer, 29th Year)

Gary Smith, 57, has been the athletic trainer at Central Washington since 1968. He is in his 29th season with the Wildcats.

Smith, a past president of the NAIA Athletic Trainers Association, is a member of the NAIA and Central Washington University Hall-of-Fames.

He was elected for mentorious service and was inducted in the NAIA Hall-of-Fame in March, 1985. He was only the second trainer so honored. Smith was inducted into CWU's Hall-of-Fame in 1991.

A member of the NAIA Medical Aspects committee, Smith has worked at national championship events in baseball, wrestling and track-and-field and at the Hula Bowl football game.




