A worth while tradition to uphold, certainly as worth while as dressing for Friday night's dinner, or as our annual Campus Day or Senior Sneak.

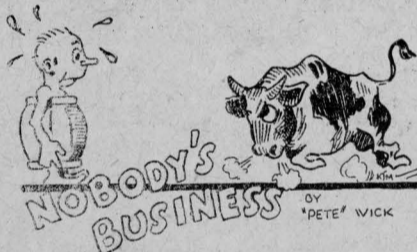
—AND BRICKBATS
