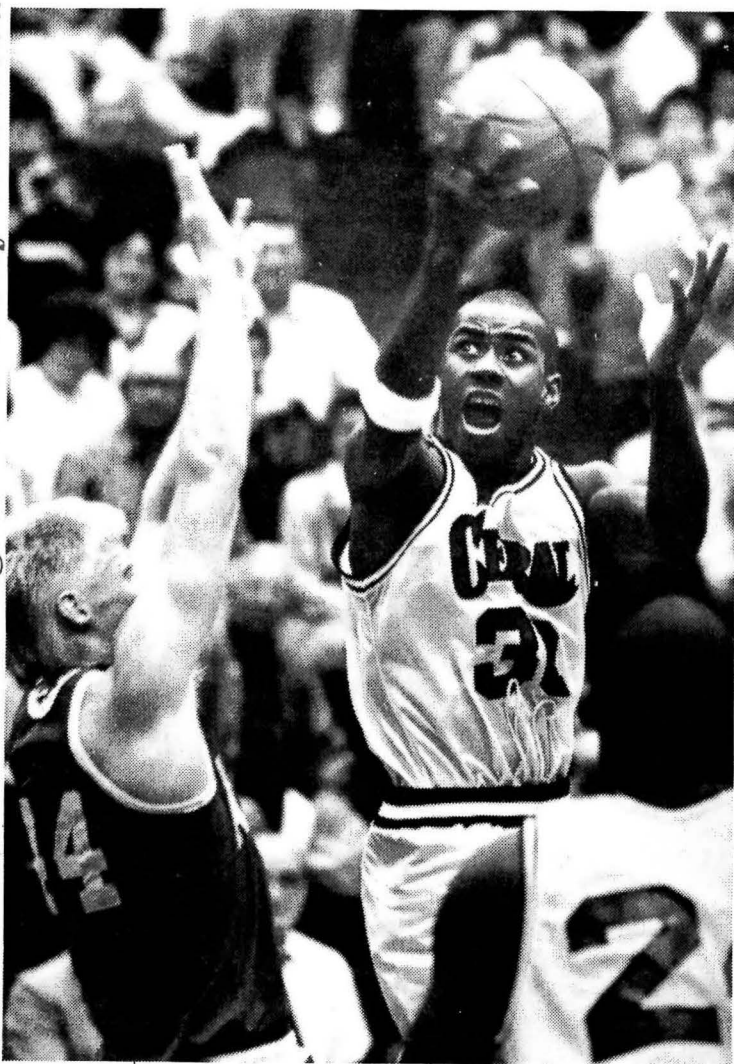

CWU COACHING STAFF

DEAN NICHOLSON (Head Coach, 26th Year, 578-214)

Dean Nicholson, nationally recognized as one of America's outstanding basketball coaches, begins his 26th season at Central Washington University this winter.

Nicholson has won 578 games in his illustrious career. He joined the 500-victory club in Dec., 1986.

He has qualified teams for the NAIA basketball tournament in Kansas City a record 21 times.

Only twice in 25 years has he failed to win at least 20 games. Six times he has guided teams into the NAIA Final Four, placing second in 1970, third in 1967, 1969, 1987 and 1989 and fourth in 1985.

CWU is the winningest team in the history of the national tournament with 38 victories. Nicholson is tied with Hamline's (Minn.) Joe Hutton as the winningest coach with 36 victories.

In CWU's last four tournament appearances it has lost to the eventual national champion, being eliminated in the semifinals by Fort Hays State (Kans.) in 1985, Washburn (Kans.) in 1987 and St. Mary's (Tex.) in 1989 and in the quarterfinals by David Lipscomb (Tenn.) in 1986.

Nick's 1970 squad won 31 games, including a school-record 25 straight, and he was voted NAIA Coach-of-the-Year. In 1987, the 'Cats posted a school-record 32 wins and Dean was selected Northwest Small-College Coach-of-the-Year for the second time in his career. Last year's team equaled that school record with 32 victories.

On seven different occasions he has been voted NAIA District 1 Coach-of-the-Year. In 1987, he was voted as one of the five coaches on the NAIA's 50th anniversary all-time team.

Nicholson has received numerous other honors during his illustrious coaching career. In 1970 he coached at the USA - Pan American Developmental Camp. He was the NAIA representative to the U.S. Olympic Basketball Committee and coached at the Olympic camp and trials in 1971 and 1972.

He was the head coach for AAU teams which toured South America in 1972 and 1973 and for the NAIA All-Star team in the Cup of Nations tournament in Colombia in 1974.

He was an assistant coach for the West team in the 1982 National Sports Festival in Indianapolis, Ind., and currently is a member of the NABC's Hall-of-Fame committee. A charter member of the CWU Hall-of-Fame, he was inducted into the NAIA Hall-of-Fame in 1986, joining his father in that institution.

Nicholson and his father Leo are the winningest father-son coaching combination in the history of collegiate basketball with 1,083 victories. Leo won 505 games from the fall of 1929 before retiring in 1964.

Nicholson, 63, also enjoyed a great playing career at CWU. He earned all-conference honors four straight seasons in basketball, leading the Wildcats to a conference title in 1947 and their first NAIA national tournament berth in 1950.

He scored 1377 points which still ranks sixth on the school's all-time list. In 1950, he made 83 percent of his free throws, the sixth best single-season mark in school history.

Nicholson also lettered in tennis and baseball. He led the Evergreen Conference in hitting in 1950. Off the field, he was elected president of the student body.

After earning a bachelor of arts degree in 1950, he taught mathematics and served as the head basketball coach at Puyallup High School for 14 years, winning five Puget Sound titles and compiling a record of 192-113.

In the fall of 1964 he returned to Ellensburg after being named to succeed his father as head basketball coach. In addition to coaching basketball, he was the school's baseball coach in 1967 and tennis coach in 1965 and 1966 and from 1968 until 1978.

Nicholson, a professor of physical education, earned his masters degree from CWU in 1957. He also attended the University of Washington, Oregon State University, Seattle



Pacific University and Western Washington University. In 1983 he was honored with CWU's Distinguished Teacher award.

Nicholson was born June 28, 1926 in Seattle. He graduated from Ellensburg High School in 1944 where he earned all-state honors in basketball and was a Yakima Valley tennis champion.

He and his wife, Charlene, were married June 18, 1948. They have two grown sons, Joel and Gary.

JACK MILLER Assistant Coach, Ninth Year

Jack Miller, 36, will serve as Dean Nicholson's top assistant this winter for the ninth year. Miller is a valuable assistant for Nicholson, handling scouting duties in addition to helping on the court.

In Miller's first eight seasons at CWU, the 'Cats have won 200 games and lost just 70, a

74.1 winning percentage. He also served as CWU's women's volleyball coach for one year.

Miller is a 1975 graduate of the University of Idaho. He coached two years at Worley, Idaho, and three years at Bonners Ferry prior to coming to CWU. He earned his master's degree in education from CWU in 1983.

At Worley he led his team to a fourth-place finish in the 1977 state tournament and was nominated for North Idaho Coach-of-the-Year. His overall record for five seasons was 49-66.

Miller was born June 6, 1953, at Sandpoint, Idaho, and graduated from Clark Fork High



School in 1971. He lettered in football, basketball and track. He then attended North Idaho College and was the most inspirational award winner on the track team before transferring to Idaho.

During the off-season, Miller works for the United States Forest Service. He is the father of two boys, J.D., 9, and Devon, 7.

GIL COLEMAN Assistant Coach, Second Year

Gil Coleman, after a highly successful prep coaching career, has returned to his alma mater this fall, to work on a master's degree and serve as an assistant basketball coach.

Coleman was CWU's junior varsity coach in the 1980-81 season, guiding the JVs to an 8-14 record.

He then coached at Onalaska High School for three seasons, compiling a won-loss record of 60-12. His 1983 team won the State Class B title and posted a perfect 28-0 record. That team was led by Ron vanderSchaaf, who went on to



eam All-American honors at CWU.

For the past five seasons, Coleman has guided Juanita High School to a 83-43 record. His 1988 team placed fifth in the State AAA tournament and his 1989 team also qualified for the event.

His overall record in eight years at the high school level was 143-55 (72.2) and he won six league titles.

Coleman, 33, graduated from Morton High School in 1974. At Morton, he earned letters in basketball and cross country. He was the team captain in basketball.

Coleman then played basketball at Sheldon Jackson in 1978 when the school was a junior college and was voted the team captain.

The CWU assistant coach earned a B.A. in education and social science from CWU in 1981. He has also attended WSU.

Misc: Born 6-10-56 at Morton. Wife's name is Lorrie. Has son, G. E., who will be eight in January. . . Also served as CWU's cross country coach this fall.

CARL HOWELL Assistant Coach, First Year

Carl Howell will serve as a varsity assistant coach this winter while he completes work on a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Howell, 24, then plans to pursue a master's degree in athletic administration next year at CWU.

The CWU assistant coach is a 1984 graduate of Morton High



At Morton, he earned four letters in basketball and two in football. In basketball, he was all-league and all-state his senior season.

Howell also played one season at Skagit Valley. He played in the same backcourt with CWU senior Jim Toole. He also played five games on CWU's 1985-86 junior varsity before a stress fracture ended his season.

For the past three seasons, Howell, who also has attended the University of Puget Sound, served as an assistant coach at Tacoma Community College under Ron Billings.

In his three seasons at Tacoma, TCC compiled a record of 64-30 and placed second in the 1987 NWAACC state tournament and fifth in the 1989 tournament.

JUNIOR VARSITY

DAN RAUCH Head Coach, Second Year

Dan Rauch, after serving as an assistant junior varsity coach last winter, moves into the head coaching position this winter.

Prior to joining the coaching staff, Rauch played two seasons for the JVs. He played in 17 games in 1987-88 and averaged 5.1 points and 3.9 rebounds. He ranked

third on the team in assists with 45.

He averaged 5.2 points and 2.9 rebounds for the 1986-87 junior varsity squad.

Rauch is a 1985 graduate of Marysville - Pilchuck High School where he lettered in football, basketball and tennis. He and tennis. He was the Most Inspirational award winner and team captain in football.

Rauch is a math education major at CWU and plans to be a math teacher and basketball coach.

Misc: Born 10-14-66 at Everett. His brother, Mark, played football at Wenatchee Valley College.



RANDY HAMMACK Assistant Coach, First Year

Randy Hammack, 29, joins the Central Washington University basketball staff this winter while he pursues a bachelor's degree at CWU.

For the past seven years, he has served on the Tye High School coaching staff. He was a varsity assistant for five years (1983-87) and was the freshmen coach the past two seasons (1988-89).

He was also an assistant football coach for five years (1984-88) and an assistant girls softball coach for four seasons (1986-89).

Hammack graduated from Decatur High School in Federal Way in 1978 where he



earned three letters each in basketball, baseball and football. In basketball, he earned second team all-league honors and was the team captain. In football he won the team captain and inspirational awards.

Hammack also played one season of basketball at Green River CC.

Misc: Single. Born 2-24-60 at Seattle.

ED SIMMONS Assistant Coach, First Year

Ed Simmons joins the junior varsity basketball staff this year as he pursues a bachelor's degree at CWU.

Simmons is a 1987 graduate of Colville High School. He earned two letters in basketball, three in baseball and two in football.

In basketball he was the Team MVP and earned second team all-league honors. He was also voted to the league tournament all-star squad.

In baseball, he was the Team MVP and team captain and also earned second team all-league honors. In football, he earned all-league honors and was voted Colville's Most Valuable Offensive Player.

Following graduation, Simmons played one season of basketball at Eastern Oregon State College.

GARY SMITH Athletic Trainer, 22nd Year

Gary Smith, 51, has been the athletic trainer at Central Washington University since 1968. He is in his 22nd season with the Wildcats.

Smith, a past President of the NAIA Athletic Trainers' Association, is a member of the NAIA Hall-of-Fame. He was elected for meritorious service and was inducted in March, 1985, during the NAIA national basketball tournament. He was only the second trainer so honored.

He is also a member of the NAIA Medical Aspects Committee and has served as the head trainer for NAIA College Baseball World Series at Lewiston, Idaho.



Smith was born July 27, 1938 at Charlevoix, Mich., and graduated from Charlevoix High School in 1956. After a stint in the military, he attended North Central Michigan College, earning an associate of science degree in 1962.

He then enrolled at Northern Michigan University and was granted a bachelor of science degree in 1964. Smith received his master's of science degree from Indiana University in 1965.

He played football and track in high school, earning all-conference honors in football. He also lettered in track at Northern Michigan.

DISTRICT 1 PLAYOFF PLAN

The 1990 NAIA District 1 playoffs will be a six-team event and begins with two elimination games Feb. 27.

Ten of the district's 13 schools are involved in a home-and-home scheduling alliance.

Each school plays 18 district games and the top four finishers qualify for the district playoffs.

Three teams - Pacific Lutheran, Whitworth and Whitman - are not involved in the scheduling alliance.

Each of those schools will also play 18 designated district games. The team with the best winning percentage among the three will also qualify for the playoffs.

One at-large team, either from the scheduling alliance or the two remaining non-alliance teams, will complete the six-team field.

Tie-breaking criteria:

1. Head-to-head if teams played home-and-home.
2. All common home-and-home district opponents.
3. Record against common District 1 opponents higher in district standings (done on per team basis starting with top team). Note: 2-0 record wins over 1-0 record.
4. Record against District 1 teams with a winning percentage of .500 or better.
5. Overall NAIA record.
6. All common non-District 1 opponents.

The opening round will match the No. 3 and No. 6 ranked teams and the No. 4 and No. 5 ranked teams.

The playoff schedule:

Feb. 27 - #6 at #3, #5 at #4.

Mar. 1 - 6/3 winner at #2, #5/4 winner at #1.

Mar. 3 - Two survivors begins best of three series at site of highest ranked team.

Mar. 5 - Game 2 at lower ranked team.

Mar. 7 - Game 3, if needed, at higher ranked team.

1989-90 BASKETBALL PREVIEW

Only two players return off last year's Central Washington University basketball team and the Wildcats could have as many as five freshmen among their top 12 players this winter.

Still, Dean Nicholson is optimistic as he begins his 26th season at CWU. Nicholson has guided six teams into the NAIA Final Four and has won 578 games. This year's team was ranked 13th in the pre-season poll.

Last year's team won 32 games and placed third in the national tournament, losing in the semifinals to eventual national champion St. Mary's, Tex.

It was the fourth time in five years CWU has lost to the eventual national champion at Kansas City.

"I think we'll have good team quickness and we'll be a good shooting team," Nicholson said. "We won't be real big, but we have the potential to be a good rebounding team."

The 'Cats will also have better balance than the last two seasons when they depended on All-American Carl Aaron for much of their scoring load,

Nicholson says this year's team is the youngest, both in terms of age and experience, he has had in his 26 seasons at CWU.

"When you combine our lack of experience with a very tough early schedule, it could make for a very challenging (November and) December," Nicholson said.

Starting point guard Jim Toole, who averaged 6.3 points and led the team in assists with 117, and small forward Scott Kenney, who averaged 7.1 points per game, are the lone returnees.

Toole, who was slowed at times last year by ankle injuries, had an excellent fall camp. "He's going to have an excellent year," Nicholson predicted.

Kenney, who played mostly small forward last year, figures to be used more at the off-guard position this winter. "Scott's playing with a great deal more consistency. Both he and Jim (Toole) will be key players for us," Nicholson said.

Another important player at the guard position will be Shoreline Community transfer Norm Calhoun. Calhoun becomes eligible in January.

Calhoun was the NWAACC Northern Region MVP in 1988-89. He averaged 24.6 points per game, converting on 88 of 201 three-pointers. He also had 155 assists.

Brian Link, up from the JVs, and freshman Jay Shinnick will also make contributions at guard. Last year, Link was the second leading scorer on the JVs, averaging 15.2 points per game. Shinnick has good quickness and excellent jumping ability.

At small forward, the top candidates are Lower Columbia transfer Jason Eckert, Selah freshman Jason Pepper and Dixie, Utah JC transfer Richard Ramey.

Eckert redshirted last year after transferring from Lower Columbia where he averaged 17.4 points and 6.5 rebounds to earn Western Region MVP honors.

Pepper is a transfer from Liberty Baptist in Virginia where he redshirted. He earned second team all-state honors at Selah and was the MVP in last year's state all-star game in Yakima, leading all scorers with 34 points.

Ramey was a McDonald's honorable mention All-American in high school and also earned JC All-American honors at Dixie. At Greenwood High School he averaged 26 points, 11 rebounds and three assists in his senior season. At Dixie, he posted impressive averages of 27 points, 13 rebounds and five assists. He was also the top scorer this summer in the Seattle Pro-Am league.

At big forward, David Jones, who averaged 13.9 points in seven games two years ago, figures to earn the starting nod. "He's our best front line defensive player and is also an excellent offensive player," Nicholson said.

Another forward candidate is Ron Charrier, who averaged 8.4 points in seven games for PLU in 1983-84 before joining the Air Force.

Up front, the top candidate to fill the center position is Terry Britt. He led the Seattle Pro-Am league in rebounding last summer, averaging 15 per game. He also averaged 17.9 points and was named the league's MVP.

Also inside will be Otto Pijpker, Jason Pedersen and Greg Sparling.

Pijpker, a 6-9 freshman from Holland, was a foreign exchange student four years ago at Warden, but was ineligible under WIAA rules because he had previously graduated from high school in Holland.

Pedersen, a freshman from Kentridge, has good jumping ability and is a strong rebounder and defensive player. Sparling played at Highline CC. He is a good shooter, boards well and plays good post defense.

NORM CALHOUN

6-0, Jr., Guard, Denver, CO

Graduated from Montbello High School in Denver in 1984. Earned two letters in basketball. Earned all-city honors senior season. . Played two seasons at Shoreline Community College. Second team all-league freshman season. First team NWAACC and Northern region MVP sophomore season. Averaged 24.6 points, 4.4 rebounds and 4.8 assists. Shot 50.2 percent from the floor (211-420), including 40.8 percent (82-201) from the three-point line. Scored a total of 787 points in 32 games. . Excellent scorer, but also can play defense. 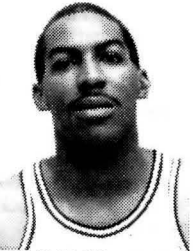

Also ahead of Nicholson are North Carolina's Dean Smith (666), Mount St. Mary's Jim Phelan (663), Florida's Norm Sloan (627) and Oklahoma City's Abe Lemons (579).

Leo & Dean Nicholson: 1083 Wins and Counting

Central Washington University keeps making history on the maplecourt.

The Wildcats are the winningest team in the history of the NAIA national tournament with 38 victories.

CWU also holds the record for most appearances and consecutive appearances. The Wildcats have participated in 22 national tourneys, including nine in a row from 1974 to 1982.

In 79 seasons, CWU teams have won 1207 games and lost 728, a winning percentage of .624. Even more remarkable is the fact a father-and-son coaching combination is responsible for nearly 90 percent of the wins. Leo Nicholson coached 505 victories in 33 seasons winning nine conference titles before retiring in 1964.

Since 1964, son Dean has won 578 games. Dean, with 36 coaching victories at Kansas City, is tied with Joe Hutton of Hamline, Minn. as the winningest coach in the history of the tournament.

CWU won 14 Evergreen Conference titles and shared the WIBA championship in 1980 (its only year of existence) under the younger Nicholson's coaching.

The Nicholsons are the winningest father-son coaching combination in the history of college

basketball with 1083 victories. The historic 1000th win came Dec. 12, 1986, when CWU defeated Northwest Nazarene 76-71 in a tournament at Whitworth College.

Dean joined his father in the exclusive 500 victory club on Jan. 6, 1987 when the Wildcats stopped Pacific Lutheran 70-53 at Nicholson Pavilion.

In district playoff competition, the 'Cats have won 60 games and lost 21 and have won 22 district titles, 21 in Dean Nicholson's 25-year tenure as head coach. The 'Cats won 19 straight district playoff games between 1976 and 1982.

CWU's best finish at the national tournament came in 1970 when it finished second and Nicholson was selected NAIA National Coach-of-the-Year. The 'Cats also finished third in 1967, 1969, 1987 and 1989 and fourth in 1985.

CWU has reached the quarterfinals of the national tournament in each of its last four appearances, three times earning a berth in the Final Four. Each time they lost to the eventual national champion.

First team All-American honors have been won by three CWU players - Mel Cox in 1967, Paul Adams in 1970 and Rich Hanson in 1973.

Fourteen other players have either won second team, third team or honorable mention honors.

In 1987, Ron vanderSchaaf was named to the second team and was later selected in the seventh round of the NBA draft by the World Champion Los Angeles Lakers. Carl Aaron was a second team All-American selection last year.

CWU has had three coaches and administrators inducted into the NAIA Basketball Hall-of-Fame. Leo Nicholson was honored in 1964. Perry Mitchell, a long-time CWU administrator and former university president, was selected for his general

contributions to NAIA sports. Dean Nicholson was inducted to the hall in 1986. Dean was also named to the NAIA's 50th Anniversary all-star team in 1987.

Two Wildcat players have been tapped for special national tournament honors. Dave Benedict won the Charles Stevenson Hustle Award in 1967 and Dave Allen won the same award in 1970. The CWU team won the coveted James A. Naismith - Emil S. Liston Sportsmanship award in the 1967 tournament and again in last year's tournament.

The Leo Nicholson Award

In 1971 a group of Ellensburg businessmen purchased a trophy to be presented each year to the top small-college basketball team in the Pacific Northwest.

The trophy is awarded to the school determined to be the outstanding team by a panel of sportswriters, broadcasters and sports information directors, who also select a Coach-of-the-Year.

The award honors the memory of the late Leo Nicholson, who won 505 games at Central from 1930 to 1964.

Central, under the direction of Leo's son Dean, has won the award eight times and the younger Nicholson has been voted Coach-of-the-Year twice.

Keith Bragg, CWU's 1985 Inspirational Award winner, is playing professional basketball in Australia and also works as a probation and parole officer.

Other distinguished alums include Dr. Jack Graham, a psychology professor at San Diego State University; Hal Jones, a flight researcher manager at Boeing; Ed Rogel, a personnel manager for Weyerhaeuser; Leo Beck, who is

superintendent of schools at West Valley in Spokane, and Byron Angel, an economic prognosticator for the state of Washington.

Joe LaDuca is the executive secretary for the Washington Horsebreeders Association. Others include Mitch Adams, an executive with the Xerox Corporation in Rochester, N.Y.; Paul Adams, a psychology teacher in Grand Rapids, Mich.; Jim Freer, an executive with Ernst and Whinney; and Bob Moawad, the founder and president of Edge Learning Institute.

Dave Oliver works for Rainier Bank in Seattle and Phil Fitterer, who was inducted into CWU's Hall-of-Fame last spring, publishes the Racing Form in Seattle.

CWU Athletic Administration

GARY FREDERICK Athletic Director (10th year)



Since taking over as athletic director in Sept., 1980, Dr. Gary Frederick has developed Central Washington University's sports program into one of the top small-college programs in the country.

CWU won the 1986-87 Men's National All-Sports championship and finished fourth in 1987-88 and fifth last year.

The 1986-87 championship was the first national all-sports title for the Wildcats. Its previous best finish was a pair of seconds in 1970-71 and 1984-85.

During Frederick's tenure as athletic director, Central has finished in the Top 10 seven times in the all-sports competition.

Frederick, 52, has a long affiliation with Central. After graduating from Raymond High School in 1955 where he was all-conference in football, basketball and baseball, he enrolled here.

Frederick lettered in football three years (1956-58) and earned second team all-conference honors in 1957 and first team honors in 1958 at offensive center.

He graduated in 1959 with a bachelor of arts degree in education and later earned a masters in physical education from Central and a doctorate in secondary education from the University of Idaho in 1974.

Frederick coached basketball and baseball at Thorp High School (1959-60); football, basketball and track at Waitsburg High School (1960-63) and football and baseball at Central Kitsap (1963-67) before returning to Ellensburg in 1967.

From 1967 until 1983, he served as an assistant football coach and was head baseball coach from 1968 until 1978 when he resigned to take over the chairmanship of the physical education department.

He gave up the that job when he was named to succeed Adrian "Bink" Beamer as athletic director in the fall of 1980.

Frederick is CWU's winningest baseball coach. In 11 seasons his teams won 234 games and lost 147 and qualified for the NAIA College World Series in 1968 and 1970.

For the past seven seasons, Frederick has also served as CWU's women's basketball coach. He led CWU to a 31-5 overall record and its first-ever District 1 title in 1987-88 and was named the district's Coach-of-the-Year for the second time. In seven seasons, his teams have won 122 games and lost 87.

Misc: Born 7-16-37 at Hoquiam. Wife's name is Bobbi. Has three adult sons, Brooke, Rick and Rob. Bobbi has two children, Anna, 19, and David, 17. District 1 baseball Coach-of-the-Year three times (1969, 1970 and 1971).

Did You Know: Central Washington University has made more appearances in the NAIA national tournament and has won more games than any other school. The Wildcats have participated in 22 tournaments and won 38 games. Dean Nicholson has coached 36 of the victories (he played in the other two) and is tied with Joe Hutton of Hamline, Minn., as the winningest coach in the history of the tournament.



Central Washington University

For nearly a century Central Washington University has provided quality education for the citizens of the state of Washington. It is one of six state-supported institutions offering baccalaureate and graduate degrees.

Originally known as Washington State Normal School, the institution became Central Washington College of Education in 1937, Central Washington State College in 1961 and Central Washington University in 1977.

Now CWU is considered one of the top smaller comprehensive universities in the country, Central earned that distinction in Nov., 1983, when U.S. News & World Report published results of an extensive national survey of college presidents.

CWU tied for seventh place in the smaller comprehensive university category for schools west of the Mississippi River and placed in the Top 15 in the nation.

Central is a residential university which offers one of the best living programs found anywhere. The accommodations, food and excellent staff provide for a rewarding experience.

Students have outstanding facilities for their learning experiences. More than half of the major campus buildings have been constructed

since 1966. The excellent facilities do not stop with new buildings. Central has increased its total number of library holdings to 454,651. And campus technical facilities range from television studios to science laboratories.

The university's 350 acres include 100 classrooms in 21 academic halls and 28 student housing complexes. And Central's faculty has earned a reputation for academic quality and integrity. CWU's faculty, including the coaches, are teachers above all else, and they take the time to meet the needs of their students.

Central, which was founded in 1891 with four teachers and 86 students, enjoys a setting convenient to the mountains in one direction and the desert in the other. Only minutes away through the surrounding farm and ranch lands of the Kittitas Valley are some of the best skiing and hunting in the state, as well as national parks, alpine lakes and meadows, wilderness areas and a rushing river for fishing and floating.

Ellensburg is a farming and ranching community which likes having a state university in its center.
