



GIL COLEMAN

First year

Gil Coleman, a 1981 Central Washington University graduate, begins his first season as the Wildcats' basketball coach this winter.

He replaces the legendary Dean Nicholson and is the 12th coach in school history and only the third since 1929.

Coleman was an assistant coach last winter under Nicholson. Previously he had been a highly successful prep coach.

He was CWU's junior varsity coach in the 1980-81 season, guiding the JVs to an 8-14 record.

He then coached at Onalaska High School for three seasons, compiling a won-loss record of 60-12.

His 1983 team won the State Class B title and posted a perfect 28-0 record. That team was led by Ron vanderSchaaf, who went on to earn All-American honors at CWU.

For the next five seasons, Coleman guided Juanita High School to a 83-43 record. His 1988 team placed fifth in the State AAA tournament and his 1989 team also qualified for the event.

His overall record in eight years at the high school level was 143-55 (72.2) and he won six league titles.

Coleman, 34, graduated from Morton High School in 1974. At Morton, he earned letters in basketball and cross country. He was the team captain in basketball and helped Morton earn three trips to the Class State B tournament in Spokane.


He ran the 800 and 1600 meters in track and also was the captain for the track team.

He then played basketball at Sheldon Jackson in 1978 when the school was a junior college and was voted the team captain.

The CWU coach earned a B.A. in education and social science from CWU in 1981. He has also attended WSU.

Coleman said fans won't notice much change in style of play this winter. "I'll draw from a lot of different people, but 90 percent of what I believe in has come from him (Nicholson)," Coleman said.

Misc: Born 6-10-56 at Morton. Wife's name is Lorrie. Has son, G. E., who will be nine in January. . . Also served as CWU's cross country coach in 1989.

CARL HOWELL

Assistant Coach (Second Year)

Carl Howell begins his second season as a varsity assistant coach this winter.

Howell, 25, has completed his requirements for a physical education degree and is completing his minor. He then plans to pursue a master's degree in athletic administration.

The CWU assistant coach is a 1984 graduate of Morton High School. At Morton, he earned four letters in basketball and two in football. In basketball, he was all-league and all-state his senior season.

Howell also played one season at Skagit Valley. He played in the same backcourt with former CWU All-American Jim Toole.

He also played five games on the Wildcats' 1985-86 junior varsity before a stress fracture ended his season.

Howell, who also has attended the University of Puget Sound, served as an assistant coach at Tacoma Community College under Ron Billings between 1987 and 1989.

In his three seasons at Tacoma, TCC compiled a record of 64-30 and placed second in the 1987 NWAACC state tournament and fifth in the 1989 tournament.

KEN BROCHES

Assistant Coach (First Year)

Ken Broches, 42, is beginning his first season as an assistant coach at Central Washington University.

Broches is a 1966 graduate of Chief Sealth High School. He earned a B.A. degree from Central Washington in 1970.

For the past 15 years, he served as an assistant basketball and baseball coach at Juanita High School.

He has also been an assistant football coach at Juanita since 1978 (except for the 1979 season).

Broches has also coached summer baseball. Between 1975 and 1979 he was an assistant for the Tyee-Kelkirk Senior Babe Ruth League team. In 1975, they won the Babe Ruth World championship.

In 1980 and again in 1990, he was an assistant coach for Kirkland's American Legion baseball team.

Misc: Born May 21, 1948.



Did You Know: Central Washington University has made more appearances in the NAIA national tournament and has won more games than any other school. The Wildcats have participated in 23 tournaments and won 40 games. Dean Nicholson has coached 38 of the victories (he played in the other two) and is the winningest coach in the history of the tournament.

SCOTT DITTER

Strength Coach (1st year)

Scott Ditter, a two-year letterman for CWU's football team, is serving as strength and conditioning coach this winter for the Wildcat men's basketball team.

Ditter is a 1986 graduate of Ocosta High School where he earned all-state honors as a running back.

He rushed for 1700 yards during his senior season. He also played free safety earning Team Defensive MVP honors.

Ditter played strong safety for two seasons at Wenatchee Valley College before transferring to Central.

In the 1988 season, he ranked eighth on the team in tackles with 30 and also intercepted one pass.

In 1989, he was ninth in tackles with 39, including three quarterback sacks. He intercepted one pass. He also served as team captain.

Ditter, 22, is completing his requirements for a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Misc: Born 5-8-68 at Marion, Ohio. Has four brothers and two sisters.



RON PETERSEN

Junior Varsity (First Year)

After two years as a player for Central Washington University's junior varsity team, Ron Petersen joins the coaching staff this winter.

Petersen is a 1987 graduate of Sumner High School where he earned two letters each in football, basketball and track.

In football, he played defensive end and tight end and earned the Gold Helmet award his senior season. He was also voted the team captain.

In basketball, he won several awards including the Team Captain, Inspirational, rebound and 110 percent award.

Petersen saw limited duty in his two years at Central. Last year, he scored eight points and had 25 rebounds in 14 games.

He scored 11 points and had 19 rebounds in 14 games in his freshman season.

The Sumner grad is a construction management major at CWU and plans a career in road construction.

Misc: Born 2-1-69 at Tacoma. Has two sisters.



CWU at National Tournament

No team, particularly in the 1980s, pulled more surprises at the NAIA national tournament than Central Washington University.

A Final Four participant in 1985, 1987 and 1989, the Wildcats did it from the No. 10 seed in 1987 and the No. 13 seed in 1989. They were unseeded in 1985.

The last time CWU lost to a team which was seeded lower was in 1982 when unseeded Hampton Institute beat the 15th seeded Wildcats. Since then, CWU has won seven games over teams seeded higher, including upsets of the third, fourth (twice), fifth, seventh and 12th (twice) seeded teams.

In 1977, 16th seeded CWU upset the tournament's top seed Newberry, S.C. and in 1969, the 15th seeded 'Cats surprised No. 2 seed Howard Payne on the way to a Final Four berth.

1990-91 Basketball Preview

For the first time in 61 years, a Nicholson won't be directing Central Washington University's basketball fortunes this winter.

Gil Coleman, a 1981 CWU grad, has replaced the legendary Dean Nicholson as head coach. In Dean's 26-year tenure, he won 609 games and took the 'Cats to 22 national tournaments.

Dean's father, Leo, won 505 games here between 1929 and 1964. Together, they are the winningest father-son coaching combination in collegiate basketball history with 1114 victories.

Last year's squad won 31 games and lost five and advanced to the quarterfinals at the NAIA national tournament. Two starters return off that team - sophomore forward Jason Pepper, who averaged 7.1 points and 4.2 rebounds, and sophomore center Terry Britt. Britt was CWU's second-leading rebounder, averaging 6.1 per game.

Pepper and Britt are among eight players off last year's District 1 championship team. Also returning are forward Jason Eckert (6-6, Sr., Bainbridge Island); guards Jay Shinnick (6-3, So., Marysville - Pilchuck) and Brian Link (6-1, Jr., Kent - Decatur); forwards Greg Sparling (6-7, Sr., Kirkland - Juanita & Highline CC) and Jason Pedersen (6-5, So., Kent - Kentridge) and center Otto Pijpker (6-9, So., Langelo, Holland).

CWU's top three scorers - guards Scott Kenney and Jim Toole and forward David Jones - are among the four players lost off the 1990 squad.

Kenney and Toole will be tough to replace in the backcourt. Kenney averaged 13.6 points, while Toole, a third team All-American, averaged 11.9 points and had 226 assists.

Joining Shinnick and Link in the guard picture are Norm Calhoun (6-0, Sr., Denver, Colo. - Montbello), Eastern Washington transfer Jeff Albrecht (6-1, So., Issaquah - Juanita) and Larry Foster (6-3, Jr., Tacoma - Foss & Tacoma CC).

Calhoun played in three games last year before sustaining a season-ending knee injury. Two years ago, he averaged 24.6 points and 4.8 assists for Shoreline CC.

Albrecht saw limited duty at EWU. He played for Coleman at Juanita High School and averaged 16 points and nine assists in his senior season. Foster was the leading scorer in the NWAACC last year averaging 23.6 points and 6.7 rebounds.

Link averaged 2.7 points last year in limited action, but has improved his offensive skills and is an excellent perimeter shooter. Shinnick, who plays good defense on the ball, averaged 5.8 points per game in his freshman season.

Pepper returns at small-forward. He and Sparling will serve as team captains. "Jason is a tenacious defensive player," Coleman said. "He plays well in traffic and has improved his shooting ability."

Eckert and Walla Walla transfer Frank Dearmon could also play the small-forward position. Eckert demonstrated his ability to shoot from the outside last year, setting a school record with eight three-pointers against Alaska Southeast.

Dearmon (Jr., Tacoma - Foss) averaged 11.1 points and 7.4 rebounds and is a great rebounder for his 6-2 size, but is coming off arthroscopic knee surgery.

In the post, Britt, Sparling, Pedersen and Pijpker all return. Britt, who averaged 5.7 points a year ago, is an outstanding rebounder, but has been plagued by fouls.

Sparling averaged 2.2 points and 2.3 rebounds in limited duty, but has added strength and will be more of a factor offensively. He is also a threat to shoot the three-point shot.

Pedersen led the junior varsity in scoring and has improved his strength and has good quickness in the post. Pijpker, who averaged 5.8 points and 4.6 rebounds and blocked 36 shots, should be more of a factor offensively.





THE PAST

Leo & Dean Nicholson: 1114 Wins

Central Washington University keeps making history on the maplecourt.

The Wildcats are the winningest team in the history of the NAIA national tournament with 40 victories.

CWU also holds the record for most appearances and consecutive appearances. The Wildcats have participated in 23 national tourneys, including nine in a row from 1974 to 1982.

In 80 seasons, CWU teams have won 1238 games and lost 733, a winning percentage of .624. Even more remarkable is the fact a father-and-son coaching combination is responsible for nearly 90 percent of the wins. Leo Nicholson coached 505 victories in 33 seasons winning nine conference titles before retiring in 1964.

Son Dean won 609 games in 26 seasons. Dean, with 38 coaching victories at Kansas City, is the winningest coach in the history of the tournament.

CWU won 14 Evergreen Conference titles and shared the WIBA championship in 1980 (its only year of existence) under the younger Nicholson's coaching.

The Nicholsons are the winningest father-son coaching combination in the history of college basketball with 1114 victories. The historic 1000th win came Dec. 12, 1986, when CWU defeated Northwest Nazarene 76-71 in a tournament at Whitworth College.

Dean joined his father in the exclusive 500 victory club on Jan. 6, 1987 when the Wildcats stopped Pacific Lutheran 70-53 at Nicholson Pavilion.

In district playoff competition, the 'Cats have won 63 games and lost 21 and have won 23 district titles, 22 in Dean Nicholson's 26-year tenure as head coach. The 'Cats won 19 straight district playoff games between 1976 and 1982.

CWU's best finish at the national tournament came in 1970 when it finished second and Nicholson was selected NAIA National Coach-of-the-Year.

The 'Cats also finished third in 1967, 1969, 1987 and 1989 and fourth in 1985.

CWU has reached the quarterfinals of the national tournament in each of its last five appearances, three times earning a berth in the Final Four.

First team All-American honors have been won by three CWU players - Mel Cox in 1967, Paul Adams in 1970 and Rich Hanson in 1973. Fifteen other players have either won second team, third team or honorable mention honors.

In 1987, Ron vanderSchaaf was named to the second team and was later selected in the seventh round of the NBA draft by the World Champion Los Angeles Lakers. Carl Aaron was a second team All-American selection in 1989. Jim Toole earned third team honors in 1990.

CWU has had three coaches and administrators inducted into the NAIA Basketball Hall-of-Fame. Leo Nicholson was honored in 1964. Perry Mitchell, a long-time CWU administrator and former university president, was selected for his general contributions to NAIA sports. Dean Nicholson was inducted to the hall in 1986. Dean was also named to the NAIA's 50th Anniversary all-star team in 1987.

Two Wildcat players have been tapped for special national tournament honors. Dave Benedict won the Charles Stevenson Hustle Award in 1967 and Dave Allen won the same award in 1970. The CWU team won the coveted James A. Naismith - Emil S. Liston Sportsmanship Award in the 1967 tournament and again in 1989.

The Leo Nicholson Award

In 1971 a group of Ellensburg businessmen purchased a trophy to be presented each year to the top small-college basketball team in the Pacific Northwest.

The trophy is awarded to the school determined to be the outstanding team by a panel of sportswriters, broadcasters and sports information directors, who also select a Coach-of-the-Year.

The award honors the memory of the late Leo Nicholson, who won 505 games at Central from 1930 to 1964.

Central, under the direction of Leo's son Dean, has won the award nine times and the younger Nicholson was been voted Coach-of-the-Year three times.

ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

For nearly a century Central Washington University has provided quality education for the citizens of the state of Washington. It is one of six state-supported institutions offering baccalaureate and graduate degrees.

Originally known as Washington State Normal School, the institution became Central Washington College of Education in 1937, Central Washington State College in 1961 and Central Washington University in 1977.

Now CWU is considered one of the top smaller comprehensive universities in the country. Central earned that distinction when U.S. News & World Report published results of an extensive national survey of college presidents.

CWU tied for seventh place in the smaller comprehensive universities category for schools west of the Mississippi River and placed in the Top 15 in the nation.

Students have outstanding facilities for their learning experiences. More than half of the major campus buildings have been constructed since 1966. Gary Smith, 52, has been the athletic trainer at Central Washington University since 1968. He is in his 23rd season with the Wildcats.

Smith, a past President of the NAIA Athletic Trainers' Association, is a member of the NAIA Hall-of-Fame. He was elected for meritorious service and was inducted in March, 1985, during the NAIA national basketball tournament. He was only the second trainer so honored.

He is also a member of the NAIA Medical Aspects Committee and has served as the head trainer for NAIA College Baseball World Series at Lewiston, Idaho.

He spent two weeks working at the Olympic Developmental Camp in Colorado Springs, Colo., in the summer of 1987. He has also worked at NAIA national championships in wrestling and track-and-field and at the Hula Bowl football game.

Smith was born July 27, 1938 at Charlevoix, Mich., and graduated from Charlevoix High School in 1956. After a stint in the military, he attended North Central Michigan College, earning an associate of science degree in 1962.

He then enrolled at Northern Michigan University and was granted a bachelor of science degree in 1964. Smith received his master's of science degree from Indiana University in 1965.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

GARY FREDERICK

Athletic Director (11th year)

Gary Frederick has been athletic director at Central Washington University since Sept., 1980. During that time, he has developed CWU's athletic program into one of the top small-college programs in the country.

For the past eight years, the Wildcats have been ranked in the Top 10 in the NAIA Men's All-Sports competition.

CWU won the 1986-87 all-sports title and placed seventh last year. The 1986-87 championship was the first national all-sports title for the Wildcats. Its previous best finish was a pair of seconds in 1970-71 and 1984-85.

Frederick, 53, has a long affiliation with Central. After graduating from Raymond High School in 1955 where he was all-conference in football, basketball and baseball, he enrolled here.

Frederick lettered in football three years (1956-58) and earned second team all-conference honors in 1957 and first team honors in 1958 at offensive center.

He graduated in 1959 with a bachelor of arts degree in education and later earned a masters in physical education from Central and a doctorate in secondary education from the University of Idaho in 1974.

Frederick coached basketball and baseball at Thorp High School (1959-60); football, basketball and track at Waitsburg High School (1960-63) and football and baseball at Central Kitsap (1963-67) before returning to Ellensburg in 1967.

From 1967 until 1983, he served as an assistant football coach and was head baseball coach from 1968 until 1978 when he resigned to take over the chairmanship of the physical education department.

He gave up the that job when he was named to succeed Adrian "Bink" Beamer as athletic director in the fall of 1980.

Frederick is CWU's winningest baseball coach. In 11 seasons his teams won 234 games and lost 147 and qualified for the NAIA College World Series in 1968 and 1970.

For the past eight seasons, Frederick has also served as CWU's women's basketball coach. He led CWU to a 31-5 overall record and its first-ever District 1 title in 1987-88 and was named the district's Coach-of-the-Year for the second time. In eight seasons, his teams have won 135 games and lost 104.

DEAN NICHOLSON: 609 Wins

Dean Nicholson, who coached 26 years at Central Washington University and 14 at Puyallup High School, embarked on a new career this winter as head coach for the Yakima SunKings in the Continental Basketball Association.

Joining Nick with the SunKings was point guard Jim Toole, who earned third team All-American honors last winter for the Wildcats guiding them to a 31-5 record. Toole is the first CWU player to play professional basketball in a U.S. based league.

Nicholson's final season with the 'Cats was a historic one. He became only the 17th coach in the entire history of intercollegiate basketball to win 600 games.

He qualified his team for the NAIA national tournament in Kansas City for a record 22nd time and he became the winningest coach in the history of the national tournament with 38 victories.

The 'Cats won 20 straight games before losing in the national quarterfinals to Wisconsin-Eau Claire. It was the second longest winning streak during Nicholson's 26-year career at CWU.

Nicholson also was inducted into the Washington State Basketball Coaches Association Hall-of-Fame. He previously had been inducted into the CWU and NAIA Hall-of-Fame. He was a charter member of the CWU Hall-of-Fame.

Only twice in 26 years at CWU did he fail to win at least 20 games. Six times he guided teams into the NAIA Final Four, placing second in 1970, third in 1967, 1969, 1987 and 1989 and fourth in 1985.

His 1970 squad won 31 games, including a school-record 25 straight, and he was voted NAIA Coach-of-the-Year. In 1987, the 'Cats posted a school-record 32 wins and Dean was selected Northwest Small-College Coach-of-the-Year for the second time in his career. His 1989 team equaled that school record with 32 victories. Last year he earned the Northwest Small-College Coach-of-the-Year award again.

On seven different occasions he was voted NAIA District 1 Coach-of-the-Year. In 1987, he was voted as one of the five coaches on the NAIA's 50th anniversary all-time team.

Nicholson received numerous other honors during his illustrious coaching career. In 1970 he coached at the USA - Pan American Developmental Camp. He was the NAIA representative to the U.S. Olympic Basketball Committee and coached at the Olympic camp and trials in 1971 and 1972.

He was the head coach for AAU teams which toured South America in 1972 and 1973 and for the NAIA All-Star team in the Cup of Nations tournament in Colombia in 1974.

He was an assistant coach for the West team in the 1982 National Sports Festival in Indianapolis, Ind., and served as a member of the NABC's Hall-of-Fame committee. A charter member of the CWU Hall-of-Fame, he was inducted into the NAIA Hall-of-Fame in 1986, joining his father in that institution.

Nicholson and his father Leo are the winningest father-son coaching combination in the history of collegiate basketball with 1,114 victories. Leo won 505 games from the fall of 1929 before retiring in 1964.

Nicholson also enjoyed a great playing career at CWU. He earned all-conference honors four straight seasons in basketball, leading the Wildcats to a conference title in 1947 and their first NAIA national tournament berth in 1950.

He scored 1377 points which still ranks sixth on the school's all-time list. In 1950, he made 83 percent of his free throws, the seventh best single-season mark in school history.

Nicholson also lettered in tennis and baseball. He led the Evergreen Conference in hitting in 1950. Off the field, he was elected president of the student body.

After earning a bachelor of arts degree in 1950, he taught mathematics and served as the head basketball coach at Puyallup High School for 14 years, winning five Puget Sound titles and compiling a record of 192-113.

In the fall of 1964 he returned to Ellensburg after being named to succeed his father as head basketball coach. In addition to coaching basketball, he was the school's baseball coach in 1967 and tennis coach in 1965 and 1966 and from 1968 until 1978.

Nicholson earned his masters degree from CWU in 1957. He also attended the University of Washington, Oregon State University, Seattle Pacific University and Western Washington University. In 1983 he was honored with CWU's Distinguished Teacher award.

Nicholson was born June 28, 1926 in Seattle. He graduated from Ellensburg High School in 1944 where he earned all-state honors in basketball and was a Yakima Valley tennis champion.

He and his wife, Charlene, were married June 18, 1948. They have two grown sons, Joel and Gary.

Nick's All-Time Team

***Rich "Handshake" Hanson (1971-73)** - A three-time All-American, he was a great All-Around player. He was a smart player and he played great defense. He was just a pleasure to coach.

***Paul Adams (1969-70)** - He was the key to our 1970 team that finished 2nd in the nation with a 31-2 record. He was just a super talent.

***Dave Benedict (1967-68)** - He was Mr. Excitement. He is the player everyone remembers. He was an amazing athlete. He could run like a deer and had great spring and quickness.

***Mel Cox (1964-67)** - Mel didn't have a lot of flash, but he was Mr. Production. He was very consistent. He'd give you 22 points and 10 rebounds every night.

***Dave Allen (1967-70)** - Dave was Mr. Hustle. He was a key factor on three NAIA Final Four teams and played in 18 games at Kansas City in four years.

***Les Wyatt (1974-77)** - Les was a solid performer for four years. He started as a frosh and he had four great years.

***Theartis Wallace (1968-69)** - He was a super player at both ends of the court and was a great team player. He played tough defense and was a great shooter. He had a skinny frame, but was a hell of a rebounder for his size.

***Ron vanderSchaaf (1984-87)** - Ron, who led CWU to two Final Fours, made great improvement each year. He improved as much as any player I ever had and he was a great shooter for a big man.

***Carl Aaron (1988-89)** - Carl, along with Theartis Wallace, was the best shooter we ever had. Carl could get it done even when he was closely guarded.

***Doug Harris (1983)** - Doug led the nation in field goal percentage (70.0) the only year he played for us and he had a great year.

***Dennis Johnson (1979-80)** - Dennis was a hell-of-a-player. He not only was a great player, but he was a great person. He played tough defense, boarded well and was the ultimate team player.

The best clutch players? - Jon Jordon (1984-85) and Mel Cox (1964-67). . Jon was our last shot specialist. He won a lot of games for us and he should have won the 1985 NAIA semifinal. (Jordon's two free throws with eight seconds left gave CWU a 64-63 lead, but Fort Hays State hit a prayer shot at the buzzer). . Cox was just a great competitor. He always came up with the stellar performance.

The best players in using their abilities? - Roger Boesel (1984-85) and Byron Angel (1975-76). . Roger was just a hard-nosed overachiever. Byron improved as much in one year as any player we had. He wasn't a great athlete, but he gave us some great play.

The best shooters? - Theartis Wallace (1968-69) and Carl Aaron (1988-89). . Theartis was just a picture-perfect shooter. He would have loved the three-point rule. He was very selective, maybe to a fault. He was deadly in the 18-to-20 foot range. . . Carl could shoot in a crowd. He had a great touch.

The best rebounders? Mitch Adams (1969-71), Bruce Sanderson (1969) and Dave Biwer (1987-89). . Mitch wouldn't be denied. He was great at both ends. He took great pride in both his defense and rebounding. No one went after the ball with more intensity. . . Bruce led the national tournament in rebounding in 1969. He had a great nose for the ball. . . Dave was a relentless rebounder. If he had a chance for the ball, he got it.

The best defensive players? Dave Allen (1967-70), Roger Boesel (1984-85) and Mitch Adams (1969-71). . Dave wore people down. He was strong and quick. He exemplified the concept of playing hard. He played hard all the time. . . You can name the same thing about Roger. He was a tough, aggressive competitor. . . Mitch played defense with the same intensity he took to the boards.

The best point guards? Dave Allen (1967-70) Joe LaDuca (1969-70) and Jim Toole (1989-90). . Allen was just a great player at both ends of the floor. LaDuca was a pleasure to watch. He had grace and was very fluid. Jim did a great job for two years and gave us some of the best point guard play we ever had.

The most memorable games? All five games in 1970, the West Virginia Wesleyan and Fort Hays State games in 1985, the 1987 St. Thomas Aquinas game, the 1977 Newberry game and the 1968 Alcorn A&M game. . In 1970, every game we played was tight and very tough. The same could be said about 1985 when he edged West Virginia Wesleyan before losing to Fort Hays State. In 1987, we came from 15 points down (with 4:12 left) and that certainly had to be the greatest comeback we ever had. We beat a great Alcorn team in 1968 and Newberry was unbeaten and ranked No. 1 when we beat them in 1977.

Your best team? In terms of ability, the 1969 team. We didn't have two starters until January, but we were deeper than in 1970. In terms of what they accomplished the 1970 team, which finished second at nationals, was the best. In terms of getting the most out of their ability, the 1973 and 1990 teams may have been the best. The 1973 team won 20 and lost nine and lost in the district finals. Talent-wise, it was one of our poorer teams. The 1990 team was so young.

Your favorite teams? 1965, 1970, 1985 and 1990. . The 1965 team was my first team and we were like family. I'm still close to all of them. The only time we reached the title game was 1970. In 1985, we came from nowhere, beat (top-seeded) Seattle in the district finals and then reached the Final Four. Last year, we exceeded all my expectations.

Did You Know: Since Nicholson Pavilion opened in the fall of 1959, CWU has had six unbeaten home seasons and in 11 campaigns has lost just once at home. The Wildcats haven't suffered back-to-back losses in the Pavilion since the 1965-66 season.
