- Namesake of Ellensburg.
- "Mother of Ellensburg" on earlier tombstone.














#### Mary Ellen Stewart Shoudy Letter, December 1895


- •Letter to her children noting she arrived at Kent, WA to visit family.







#### Land Plat for Ellensburg, 1875



Lived 1862-1940.

Married to Austin Mires from 1884 until his death in 1936. Austin was first mayor of Ellensburg.

Austin Mires Papers at WSU MASC in Pullman.

Lived at 407 N. Ruby Street.

Registered to vote on July 28, 1916 at 54 years old.

Ellensburg's first female photographer.










#### Mamie Evans Robertson

- •Church and rectory located at 402 and 404 N. Main Street.




## Mamie Evans Robertson's Daughter, Second Husband, and Stepson

- •Edith Robertson attended Central from 1939-1942 and majored in English.
- •Mamie married William Robertson in 1926. He died in 1972 and is buried next to her. William's jobs included gardener and caretaker of the post office.

•Mamie's stepson Edward Robertson graduated from Central in 1958 with a B.A. in Education degree. He served as secretary and president of the AME Church.

#### Amanda Hebeler

- Lived 1890-1969
- •Earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Michigan State Normal School and Teacher's College of Columbia University.
- Faculty member at Central 1924-1960.
- •Director of teacher training program, later College Elementary School.
- Taught in the Education department.
- Oversaw planning of new CES/teacher training school.



#### Small Lady Leaves Big Imprint

Amanda Hebeler is a woman small in physical stature, but one who has helped influence and shape the lives of countless students.

Although she retired in 1960, Miss Hebeler still has an active interest in the college student, and keeps abreast of the new developments in education.

Miss Hebeler came to Ellensburg in 1924 as supervisor of Edison Training School. In 1925 she began working with student teachers.

Because she felt that she was not fully qualified to teach at the Washington State Normal School, Miss Hebeler left for two and a half years study at Columbia University. While there she earned her BA and MA degrees.

Upon her return to Washington, Miss Hebeler acted as director of the Edison School.

Miss Hebeler played an active part in the planning of the College Elementary School built in 1938.

"The College Elementary School was designed to be functional and flexible because it was to be the center of many campus functions," Miss Hebeler said.

Miss Hebeler remained as director of the College Elementary

School until 1956, when she became a full time instructor.

When asked to compare today's college students with those of earlier years, Miss Hebeler replied, that college students today are more aware of the importance of an education. The notable distinction Miss Hebeler made was that today's students are more willing to go on for more education. They are not content with four years of college.

Miss Hebeler complimented today's coed when she said that today's girls are more sophisticated. She attributed this to the fact that it is no longer necessary for girls to finance their own college education.

Coeds are allowed many more freedoms today, according to Miss Hebeler, and she finds many of these hard to accept.

Miss Hebeler feels that some college people become remote from the community in which they teach. Miss Hebeler said she tries to keep in close relationship with the community. She has been active in many civic affairs. At present she spends one afternoon each week as a volunteer at the hospital.

As a reminder of the contributions Amanda Hebeler has made to the college and the community, the College Elementary School was renamed in her honor in 1963.




