The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Central Washington state College was called to order by the Chairman Mrs. Frederick W. pavis in Grupe Conference Center on the campus of Central Washington state College in Ellensburg, Washington.

PPROVAL OF MINUTES

MOTION NO. 966: Mr. Panattoni moved, seconded by Dr. Wilson that the minutes for the meeting of March 4, 1967 be approved as presented. The motion carried.

pr. Brooks indicated there were no reports. He noted that he had sending many reports through the mail to the members of the Board.

COMMUNICATIONS

Letters from Ralph H. Burkhard

pr. Brooks reviewed two letters from Mr. Burkhard (1) dated March 6, 1967, announcing an award by the American Iron & Steel Institute for the best high rise structure using steel in the U.S. for the 1966 year, and (2) dated March 3, 1967, enclosing an article from the Daily Journal of commerce in Seattle on the construction of the high rise dormitories on rentral's campus.

Resolution Ex21-Washington State Senate

Mr. Ward Bowden, Secretary of the Senate, transmitted a certified copy of Senate Resolution Ex21 which was adopted by the Washington State senate on March 24, 1967. The resolution asked that administrative action be taken to eliminate the unfair practice of admitting the general public to student showings of "entertainment films" on campus. Dr. Brooks indicated that Central had been complying with the intent of the resolution for at least two years.

Administration Building-Design Development Plans

MOTION NO. 967: Dr. Wilson moved, seconded by Dr. Wahle, that the design development plans for the new administration building as presented by Doudna, Williams and Phipps be accepted and that the architects be authorized to proceed to working drawings, subject to the review and approval by the Division of Engineering and Architecture of the State of Washington, Department of General Administration, and the State Fire Marshall. The motion carried.

Final Plans-Reception Center, Additions and Repairs to President's Home and Grounds

MOTION NO. 968: Dr. Wilson moved, seconded by Dr. Wahle, that the board approve the final plans for the Reception Center and additions and repairs to the President's home and grounds, and authorize the architects Doudna, Williams and Phipps to call for bids, subject to the review and approval by the Division of Engineering and Architecture of the State of Washington, Department of General Administration, and the State Fire Marshall. The motion carried.

Budget Changes

MOTION NO. 969: Dr. Wilson moved, seconded by Dr. Wahle, that the board approve all budget changes over \$2,500 as listed on the Report on Budget Changes dated April 13, 1967. The motion carried.

Educational Opportunity Grants Program

MOTION NO. 970: Dr. Wahle moved, seconded by Dr. Wilson, that the board accept the sum of \$63,050 awarded by the Office of Education, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare under the Educational Opportunity Grants Program for the period July 1, 1967 through June 30, 1968. The motion carried.

Non-discrimination Statement

MOTION NO. 971: Mr. Panattoni moved, seconded by Dr. Wahle, that the Board of Trustees of Central Washington State College and its designated college officials hereby publically agree to comply with Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) and all requirements imposed by the regulations issued by Federal, State, and local agencies pursuant to that title, to the end that, in accordance with Title VI of that Act and the Regulation, no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity in which the College engages.

This resolution is binding on the members of the Board of Trustees, transferees, and assignees, and the person or persons who are authorized to sign assurances or act on behalf of the Board of Trustees. The motion carried. Voluntary Salary Continuance Program (disability insurance)
