# Terminations -- Kraft, May

Mr. Bohne explained that recent action by the Higher Education reponnel Board on termination appeals from institutions of higher action has shown they will honor action taken only by the Board the school. Mr. Bohne indicated that all such actions will be regist to the Board of Trustees until a change in the Rules and law be made to allow the Board to delegate this responsibility.

MOTION NO. 3467: Mr. Frank moved, seconded by Dr. Brain, to approve the letter to terminate Mr. Edwin Kraft (Maintenance Mechanic) whose allowable leave without pay has expired. The motion carried.

MOTION NO. 3468: Mr. Caron moved, seconded by Dr. Brain, to approve the discharge action taken by the administration against Mr. Montie May (Warehouseman I) and direct Mr. Stanford R. Bohne, Vice President for Business Affairs to notify Mr. May of the action of the Board. The motion carried.

#### Approval of Housing and Food Service Rates

Mr. Hill presented the recommendations for room and board rates if apartment rents for 1971-1972. Mr. Hill stated the recommendations the based on (1) keeping the rates as low as possible, (2) having rates set are equitable to all, and (3) filling the requirements of the bond wolutions passed by the Board of Trustees. Mr. Hill indicated the nvices had been reviewed with students and staff to determine those st might be discontinued in order to keep rates as low as possible. If following services will be discontinued: (1) furnishing linens those who live in residence halls, (2) cleaning students rooms tween Fall and Winter, and between Winter and Spring quarters, unless of the occupants move from a room, (3) serving Saturday morning takfasts, (4) serving meals on the day of or the day after Thanksgiving, d on the Fourth of July, and (5) serving week-end meals furing summer takion.

MOTION NO. 3469: Mr. Frank moved, seconded by Mrs. Minor, to approve the housing and food service rates as presented by the administration. The motion carried. (See attachment #1)

Four plans for meal tickets will be offered students next fall, Nowing students to make choices of the meal plans that are closest their actual eating patterns. Dr. Brain commented that there were no students present (Mr. Sims and not arrived at this point in the meeting).

#### Adoption of Statement on Human Rights

Dr. Price presented a revised statement on human rights. Mr. Sims sid the minority students were in agreement with the statement and soped it would lead to other steps being taken which would increase inority employment, etc.

MOTION NO. 3470: Mrs. Minor moved, seconded by Mr. Frank, approval of the Policy Relating to Discrimination and Human Rights. The motion carried.

CENTRAL WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE POLICY RELATING TO DISCRIMINATION AND HUMAN RIGHTS

It shall be the policy of the Board of Trustees of Central Washington State College, within the realm of their authority and in keeping with their responsibility to the public, to prohibit discrimination based on race, creed, ethnic origin, or sex. This prohibition applies to all aspects of the College's functions, program and activities, the utilization of its facilities and the official use of the College's name; the employment, housing, financial aid, and educational opportunities it provides.

The Board of Trustees, furthermore, affirms its intent and desire to establish practices consistent with those prescribed for other agencies of the State of Washington through the governor of the State and through this policy expresses its intent to modify any present practices of the College to accomplish this end.

The Board of Trustees hereby directs the President of Central Washington State College to establish administrative procedures, rules, and regulations which will fulfill this policy and which will provide him with means to monitor and maintain such rules and regulations. Furthermore, the President is directed to report, from time to time, to the Board of Trustees progress and problems related to the execution of this policy.

# Faculty Appointment, 12 months -- Nelson

MOTION NO. 3477: Mrs. Minor moved, seconded by Mr. Caron, that the appointment of Jerald W. Nelson, Associate Professor of Education and Director of the Washington Center for Early Childhood Education, be approved effective July 1, 1971. The motion carried.

#### Sabbatical Leaves

Dr. Harrington presented the list of faculty recommended to be granted sabbatical leaves during the coming academic year, subject to the availability of funds from the legislature and to continuance of sabbatical leaves in their present form by the legislature. Discussion ensued during which Mr. Frank expressed his concern that to approve sabbatical leaves would not be prudent at this time of difficult financial situation of the state. Mr. Frank pointed out some legislative councils and committees have already indicated their intent to investigate the various sabbatical leave programs. Mr. Frank commented that although he was not opposed to the sabbatical leave program he felt it would be unwise to consider it at this time when the College is trying to do everything it can to keep costs down. He suggested Dr. Harrington withdraw his recommendation.

Dr. Harrington and Dr. Martin felt that because of faculty morale and to allow contingent planning it was desirable to have the Board take action. Dr. Harrington also indicated that if the Board passed the motion he would be meeting on Monday with the faculty members involved to explain very carefully to them the provisions of the motion so there would be no misunderstandings. Dr. Brain, Dr. Brooks, and Dr. Harsha felt the Board action and sabbatical leaves could be defended to the legislature. Mrs. Minor said she agreed with Mr. Franks concern about the timing of the board action, but that she would have to vote for the motion because of her belief in the sabbatical leave program. Mr. Panattoni indicated that Central's Board has always supported sabbatical leaves for the faculty but he also expressed his concern about the timing of the action.

MOTION NO. 3478: Dr. Brain moved, seconded by Mrs. Minor, that the board approve sabbatical leaves for the five faculty listed below for the 1971-72 academic year at 75% salary subject to availability of college funds from the legislature and to continuance of sabbatical leaves in their present form by the legislature. The motion carried with Mr. Frank and Mr. Panattoni voting no.

- Mr. Curt Wiberg, Associate Professor of Biology

   (Mr. Wiberg requested leave for three quarters for the purpose of pursuing the "environmental crisis" by means of travel in Scandinavia and work with the United Nations.)
- Br. John DeMerchant, Assistant Professor of Music (Br. DeMerchant requests a leave for three quarters in order to attend concerts and opera in the New York area and to continue work on musical compositions.)
- Dr. Steven Farkas, Associate Professor of Geology (Dr. Farkas requested leave for three quarters in order to continue intensive work in the Columbia Basin lava flows and to collaborate with colleagues in England and Scotland.)
- Dr. Richard Doi, Associate Professor of Art (Dr. Doi requested leave for three quarters in order to travel to Japan for a concentrated study of children's art.)
- Mr. James Sahlstrand, Assistant Professor of Art (Mr. Sahlstrand requested leave for three quarters for the purpose of pursuing studio work and for the study of photographic work at various centers of activity around the country.)

Following passage of the motion Mr. Frank again asked the board preconsider. No further action was taken.

MOTION NO. 3480: Dr. Brain moved, seconded by Mrs. Minor, to accept the resignation of Michael Braver, Lecturer in Sociology, effective June 30, 1971. The motion carried.
