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

## **STUDENT CATEGORY**

# New Post-Baccalaureate ......

Students who have completed a bachelor's degree but are not pursuing a Master's degree program. Students may be working toward 5th year, vocational, or professional certification, or taking courses for personal enrichment.

## PROCEDURE

Complete form on page 38A of this catalog, or request a "short" Graduate Application from the Admissions Office. Application, official transcripts of all work completed, and a \$15 application fee must be received by May 31.

#### High School Students .....

Top high school students who wish to enroll for one class during Summer Session may do so with the written approval of both the high school principal and a CWU admissions officer. Complete form on page 38A of this catalog, or request a "Special" Uniform Application for Admission. Students in this category will be assigned a late registration time. A \$15 application fee will be required for students who have not been previously enrolled at CWU.

Complete form on page 38A of this catalog, or request a High School Enrichment Form from the Admissions Office. Have your high school principal sign the form and attach your transcript. Bring the form with the transcript attached, and a \$15 application fee, to the Admissions Office on June 24 or 25 for approval. You will register on June 25, the first day of classes.

#### International Students .....

Students who are in the United States on a non-immigrant visa. (This does **not** include permanent residents, refugees, or Canadian students).

Canadian Students

Follow procedure for your appropriate academic category.

Application deadline is May 31. Contact the Admissions Office for instructions on admission procedures.

**LATE APPLICANTS:** Those students who have not submitted the proper application form, \$15 nonrefundable application fee where appropriate, and official transcripts by May 31 will register as late applicants. Late permits will be issued indicating the time and place of registration. Walk-ins must fill out the necessary forms in the Admissions Office in order to receive a late registration time.



# REGISTRATION

There is no advance registration for regular Summer Session courses. Both new and continuing students must register in person in the SUB Ballroom on June 24. Students attending Second Term only may register on July 26, in the Registrar's office in Mitchell Hall.

## PERMIT-TO-REGISTER

A "Permit-to-Register" is required to be admitted at registration. Permits will be mailed around June 1 to all students who have been in attendance the previous year or summer or have been recently accepted. Registration times will be specified on the Permit-to-Register.

## **ON-SITE REGISTRATION PROCEDURES**

- 1. Report to SUB Ballroom on June 24 at the time designated on the Permit-to-Register. Bring a tentative schedule of courses.
- 2. The Registration Form is available at the entrance to the Ballroom.
- 3. Seek advice as needed. Advising tables are located in the main area of the ballroom.
- 4. Select desired courses from the Class Schedule. Refer to the Changes in Course Offerings, and to the TV monitor for closed classes.

It is VERY IMPORTANT to check the Sequence Number entries before registering. If a sequence number does not match the course number and other details, the wrong class will be registered in the terminal. This can create multiple problems.

- 5. Courses that require departmental approval must carry appropriate signatures on the Registration Form. Include the sequence number, department, course number, credits, days, time, building, and room.
- 6. When the class schedule has been completed, please complete the following: name, student number, quarter, year, university address, home address and telephone number.
- When the Registration Form is ready for processing with all the information completed, including the class schedule, please report to the Terminal Entrance. From there a Terminal Operator will be assigned.
- 8. Present the Registration Form to the Terminal Operator for processing.

- 9. In the event the Terminal Operator cannot offer the classes that have been requested, and additional time is needed for registration, return to the Advising Area for additional counseling.
- 10. When the Terminal Operator has completed the registration, please take the Registration Form to the Cashier's Station in Mitchell Hall, second floor, for payment of fees.
- 11. Other services will be available: e.g., Parking Permits and Insurance may be purchased at the Cashier's Station.
- 12. Any changes made in the schedule after registration, may be done by reporting to the Registrar's Office June 25-28. Second term changes can be made July 29 and July 30.

# **TUITION AND FEES**

Students will receive their tuition-fees billing at the time of registration. Payment is due no later than June 24 and may be paid in person at the Cashier's Office in Mitchell Hall.

## REFUNDS

A student will receive a full refund of tuition and fees if withdrawal from the university occurs by the last day of the "Change of Schedule" period.

A student will receive a 50 percent refund if withdrawal from the university occurs between the last day of "Change of Schedule" period and the 10th day of classes for first or second term or the 20th day of classes for full session.

No refund of tuition and fees is made after the above deadlines.

Students who are found not eligible to register will be given a total refund of all payments and charges.





## **GENERAL INFORMATION**

## **CLASSIFICATION OF STUDENTS**

Class rank is based upon the number of quarter hours earned as follows:

Freshman, 0 - 44.9 quarter hours Sophomore, 45 - 89.9 quarter hours Junior, 90 - 134.9 quarter hours Senior, 135 + quarter hours

### NUMBERING OF COURSES

Courses are numbered as follows:

Freshman - 100 through 199 Sophomore - 200 through 299 Junior - 300 through 399 Senior - 400 through 499 Graduate - 500 through 700

Students may elect courses one year ahead of their present status except when otherwise designated. Courses numbered 500 and above are normally for graduate students. Senior students may take 500 level courses only with the approval of both the Department Chairperson and the instructor of the class. The 500 level may be used for undergraduate

credit or graduate credit (**but not both**). In order to receive graduate credit, the student must be in his/her senior year of undergraduate work and must obtain approval from the Dean of Graduate Studies.

## **STUDENT LOAD POLICY**

#### **ONE SESSION**

#### Undergraduate

9 credits or less -- No permission required 10 credits -- Department approval required 11 credits or more -- Dean's approval required

#### Graduate

8 credits or less -- No permission required 9-10 credits -- Department approval required 11 credits or more -- Dean's approval required

#### **FULL SESSION**

#### Undergraduate

17 credits or less -- No permission required 18-20 credits -- Department approval required over 20 credits -- Dean's approval required

#### Graduate

16 credits or less -- No permission required 17-20 credits -- Department approval required over 20 credits -- Dean's approval required

## AUDIT

A student eligible to enroll in a course for credit may enroll as an auditor except in laboratory courses, provided that space is available and permission is secured from the instructor prior to registration. To receive credit for an audited course, the student must enroll for credit in the same course in a subsequent quarter.

When a student class load exceeds nine credits, including credits of audited courses, he must pay the regular student fees. A student enrolled in nine credits or less, including audited courses, pays the special student fees.

Instructors may not compel auditors to write papers or take examinations, but may insist upon other course requirements. The instructor may request of the Dean that the auditor be officially withdrawn from the course if these requirements are not met. Audited classes require written permission from the department.

## **CREDIT BY EXAMINATION**

The university has published a "Course Challenge List" in the general catalog. Regularly enrolled, (full fee-paying), students may challenge for credit any course which appears on the current "Course Challenge List." To challenge a course, the student may be required to take examinations and carry out procedures according to the practice established by departments.

To challenge a course, the student must apply to the Registrar's Office for request forms and payment of a \$5 fee, which is non-refundable. Students must apply after the current Change of Schedule. The course challenge must be completed and in the Registrar's Office three weeks prior to the end of the quarter.

Results of the Course Challenge shall be recorded as "Satisfactory" or "Unsatisfactory" on the student's transcript and will not be used to compute the grade point average.

The application for Course Challenge may be denied if the student has previously received credit for the course at this or another institution; if the student has previously failed the course; or if the student has previously challenged the course and received an "Unsatisfactory" grade.

## **CREDIT/NO CREDIT OPTION**

Students are urged to use the Credit/No Credit option as a way to explore academic areas of interest. All students except first-quarter freshmen and students on academic probation may select one class per quarter under this option. A maximum of fifteen credits earned in Credit/No Credit courses may be allowed toward the 180 required for the bachelor's degree.

The courses must be selected from Breadth Requirements and free electives; they must not be courses in the basic, major, or minor concentrations or the professional education sequence.

Students designate the course as Credit/No Credit during registration or during "Change of Schedule" period. Courses for which a grade has been recorded may not be repeated on a Credit/No Credit option.

Credits earned under the Credit/No Credit option are not included in computing the grade point average. The grade recorded on the student's transcript will be "CR" if the course grade is C- or above; if below C-, the entry will be "NC".

# PROCEDURE FOR ENROLLING IN INDIVIDUAL STUDY COURSE

Forms are available at the counter in the Registrar's Office, the Depart-

mental Offices, and also at Registration from the Advising Tables. Permission must be granted from the instructor and department chairperson. Then complete the form, including the 25-space descriptive title.

During Registration, an Individual Study Form must be submitted to the Terminal Operator if it is listed in the class schedule. If the Individual Study is not listed in the class schedule, you must report to the Registrar's Terminal Operator before proceeding to the Terminal Entrance for registration.

If a student adds an Individual Study during the Change of Schedule Period, the Individual Study Form must be submitted to the Registrar's Office.

## PROCEDURE FOR ENROLLING IN CONTRACTED FIELD EXPERIENCE

Field Experience Agreement forms are available at the Departmental Offices or the Cooperative Education Office. It is advisable to allow at least a week in which to obtain required approval signatures, in sequence, on the bottom of the form. *All approval signatures are required before registration will be permitted*. All parts of the form must be completed, including complete mailing addresses in Part A. The form is collected by the terminal operator at Registration. The Cooperative Education Office will mail a copy of the CFE form to you a few days after you register.

If the Contracted Field Experience is not listed in the class schedule, you must report to the Registrar's Terminal Operator before proceeding to the Terminal Entrance for Registration.

If the student adds a Contracted Field Experience during the Change of Schedule Period, the completed Field Experience Agreement form must be submitted to the Registrar's Office.

## **PROCEDURE FOR ARRANGED COURSE PERMIT**

An Arranged Course Permit is used when students wish to register for a class that is not listed in the class schedule booklet, providing the class is shown in the current catalog. Any class that is currently being offered cannot be registered on an Arranged Course Permit.

SEMINARS, WORKSHOPS, AND SPECIAL TOPICS COURSES MAY NOT BE REGISTERED AS ARRANGED COURSES.

Forms are available at the counter in the Registrar's Office, the Departmental Offices, and also at Registration from the Advising Tables. Permission must be given by the instructor and department chairperson before completing the Arranged Course Permit.

During Registration, you must report to the Registrar's Terminal Operator before proceeding to the Terminal Entrance.

If a student adds an Arranged Course during the Change of Schedule

Period, the Arranged Course Permit must be submitted to the Registrar's Office.

## POLICY FOR WITHDRAWAL FROM CLASS

Because of abbreviated terms in summer, withdrawal dates are different than regular quarters.

#### Check the summer session calendar for withdrawal dates.

A student may make an uncontested withdrawal from a course through the end of the 10th day of instruction. Between the 11th day of instruction and the 25th day of instruction a student may withdraw with the signature of the instructor and will receive either a W or an E.

Withdrawals after the 25th day of instruction will be allowed only in cases of extreme hardship. A student wishing to withdraw during this period must present a written petition to the Dean of Admissions and Records. If the Dean of Admissions and Records determines that there are extenuating circumstances, the student will receive a W.

## GRADUATION

An application for graduation may be made at the Registrar's Office during the quarter preceding the quarter in which the degree is to be received or not later than the deadline date published in the quarterly calendar.

Students must assume the responsibility for meeting all degree requirements and total credits for graduation.

- 1. Basic and breadth requirements must be completed.
- 2. A total of 180 quarter credits is required for graduation.
- 3. Credits earned by correspondence or in extension classes do not count toward meeting residence requirements.
- 4. The final quarter preceding graduation must be in residence.
- 5. The cumulative grade point average must be a 2.0 with a grade point average of at least 2.0 for the last three quarters. A 2.25 G.P.A. must be earned in the major field.
- 6. Not more than one-fourth, (45 quarter hours), of the program leading to the Bachelor's degree may be taken in extension and/or correspondence courses. *All out-of-residence courses must be completed prior to the final quarter in residence.*
- 7. Sixty (60) credits must be in upper division coruses; i.e., courses numbered 300 and above.
- 8. A maximum of fifteen (15) credits of "CR" taken under the Credit/No Credit Option, may be counted toward the B.A. degree.
- 9. Only thirty (30) credits of Contracted Field Experience will count toward the B.A. degree.
- 10. Transfer students must take a minimum of ten (10) credits in the major field and five (5) credits in the minor field of study at Central Washington University.

# HOUSING

Central Washington University takes justifiable pride in its Housing and Food Services system. Easily one of the most comprehensive, quality systems in the country, diverse accommodations are available for single students, married students and student families at Central. Housing options include residence halls; one, two and three-bedroom apartments; and a University Conference Center for short-term or special occasion overnight accommodations. Students will find quality housing and food services, at remarkable low rates.

# RESIDENCE HALLS FOR SUMMER SESSION STUDENTS

North and Wilson Residence Halls will be open this summer for those students living on campus for a minimum of one term (4½ weeks). The residence halls offer a room-and-board package. Those students who require accommodations for less than one term will be provided a place in the Conference Center. All room in the residence halls are furnished. However, each student may choose to bring the accessories he/she will need additionally while living in the residence hall. Both halls are centrally located on campus, near Holmes Dining Hall. All rooms in these two-story residence halls are single or double-occupancy, with separate baths and lounges. One floor will be for women, the other for men.

## **APARTMENTS**

The Student Village offers 173 apartments to juniors, seniors, graduate students and married students without children. Apartment sizes vary to include studio, one, two and three-bedroom apartments. All apartments are fully furnished. Anderson (32 units) and Buttons (6 units, women only) Apartments will be available also.

Central offers a family housing program, also. Currently, there are 300 one, two and three-bedroom apartments designed specifically for married students and student families. There are both furnished and unfurnished apartments. The second and third bedrooms in the larger units of both family and single apartments are not furnished.

## **FOOD SERVICES**

Holmes Dining Hall is conveniently located near the center of the cam-

pus and will be open to provide students with a variety of good meals:

- (1) 5-day meal plan, Monday breakfast through Friday lunch
- (2) 7-day meal plan, excluding breakfast on Saturday and Sunday

In addition to the Monday-Friday breakfast, a continental breakfast will be offered mid-morning for late risers. Food Services will also provide low carbohydrate, high-protein menus for students on weight-control diets, and, if possible, will be happy to provide special diets for students as prescribed by their physicians. Central's Food Services Department also offers off-campus students, faculty, and staff members eight different low-cost meal plans for good eating at Holmes Dining Hall this summer. The Off-Campus Meal Tickets are available at the Food Services Office in Holmes Dining Hall during regular office hours. Meals will not be served on July 4, 1985.

Those who are interested in residing in University housing facilities should complete the housing form on page 38A of this bulletin and mail it to the Director of Housing, Barge Hall 103, Central Washington University, Ellensburg, Washington 98926. Telephone inquiries can also be made to the Housing Office by calling (509) 963-1831.

## **TEACHER CERTIFICATION**

## Dr. Ron Frye Director of Certification • Black Hall 216 • 963-2661

A teacher in the state of Wahington is required to convert the provisional or initial teaching certificate to a continuing teaching certificate. Conversion requires a minimum of three full years of successful teaching and completion of either a fifth college year or a continuing certificate program (45 quarter hours). The continuing certificate is valid for teaching in the common schools of the state of Washington on a continuing basis and for a period of seven years after the individual leaves full-time teaching.

Students pursuing a fifth year or continuing certificate program should obtain plan forms and guidelines from the Office of Certification, 216 Black Hall. Prior to engaging in course work, the proposed plan should be filed with the Office of Certification. The plan for each student is developed by the student, the University advisor, and local school officials, and should be approved before courses are taken.

## APPLICATION AND ADMISSION TO GRADUATE STUDY

## Dr. Kent Richards Dean of Graduate Studies • Bouillon 207D • 963-3101

Each prospective graduate student must submit a formal application for admission to the University. Admission to the University does not constitute admission to a Master's degree program. A graduate student is expected to have a bachelor's degree from a college or university accredited by recognized accrediting associations prior to registering for courses. Students with a baccalaureate degree from an institution holding candidacy status will be considered only after reviewing the Analysis Report and Evaluation Committee Report of the accrediting association which must be provided by the institution before admission is determined.

All prospective graduate students must apply for admission to graduate study in either a degree program, fifth year program, or non-degree study (professional improvement, scholarly development).

Processing of applications takes time. To insure the thorough evaluation of transcripts, letters of recommendation, etc., it is required the applications including all supporting materials (transcripts, GRE scores, references, and statements of objectives) be submitted by April 15 for admission for Summer Quarter.

The application to graduate study can be obtained from Graduate Admissions & Records or the Office of Admissions. The application together with GRE scores, transcripts, letters of recommendation, and a statement of educational objectives and professional aims must be submitted to meet the April 15 date. Admission to the University does not constitute admission to a Master's degree program. Applicants to Master's study are only admitted by formal letter from the Dean of Graduate Studies.

A Master's degree program involves a close graduate faculty-student relationship in order to plan a study program most appropriate to the professional goals and purposes of each individual applicant admitted. Consequently, no more than fifteen (15) quarter credits completed before formal admission will be accepted on the official course of study for the Master's degree. This does not preclude the student from taking prerequisite or other background courses prior to admission that do not count towards the degree.

Any graduate student or prospective graduate student may petition the Dean of Graduate Studies to modify Graduate School regulations applying to his own admission or program.

Improving interpersonal communications skills, recognizing the impact of your professional image, understanding the importance of office politics, and identifying a career path.

#### BSED 498 - Microcomputer Word Processing and Spreadsheet Applications for Teachers (4A) Daily • 9:50 - 10:50 a.m. • 3 Credits

Development of the ability to use word processing and spreadsheets of software for classroom and administrative tasks (e.g., record keeping, grading, letters, and reports).

#### BSED 498 - Integrating Microcomputers into Accounting (4B) Daily • 8:40 - 9:40 a.m. • 3 Credits

Selection and use of appropriate software for teaching secondary school accounting. Courseware development, teaching methods and strategies, and identification of support materials.

#### ADOM/BSED 498 - Integrated Microcomputer Applications (4B) Daily • 12:10 - 1:10 p.m. • 3 Credits

Use of spreadsheets, word processing, data base, and graphic application software in an integrated manner. Prerequisite: Experience in microcomputer word processing, spreadsheets, and simple data based software.

## CHEMISTRY

#### 498A - Atomic Theory and the Periodic Law (S) July 9 - 11 • 1:00 - 4:30 p.m. • 1 Credit

The purpose of this course is to provide knowledge of the chemical concepts found in this area to the public junior or senior high teacher who has found him/herself teaching chemistry or chemistry concepts without having adequate academic preparation in this area of chemistry.

## 498B - Chemical Bonding and Stoichiometry of Chemical Reactions (S)

#### July 12 - 16 • 1:00 - 4:30 p.m. • 1 Credit

The purpose of this course is to provide knowledge of the chemical concepts found in this area to the public junior or senior high teacher who has found him/herself teaching chemistry or chemistry concepts without adequate academic preparation in this area of chemistry.

#### 498D - Innovative Chemistry Curricula July 17 - 19 • 1:00 - 4:30 p.m. • 1 Credit

The purpose of this course is to examine and analyze curricular trends in chemistry at the high school and junior high school levels.

Review of classical chemistry curricula. A discussion of exemplary chemistry programs as new models. Curricular case studies.

Taught by David Tucker of Mt. Baker Jr.-Sr. High School, recipient of the President's award for Excellence in Education: Chemistry/Physics.

## EDUCATION

For word processing and spreadsheets for educators and integrated microcomputer applications, see the Business Education and the Mathematics sections.

#### 498 - Computer Literacy for Classroom Teachers (S) June 25 - July 10 • 3:00 - 6:00 p.m. • 3 Credits

Lecture-demonstration and laboratory hands-on experience using computers and preparation required to use them effectively, including basic terminology, introduction to computer games, evaluation of computers and software and teacher support activities with the computer.

#### 498 - Developing Microcomputer Software for Classroom Use (S) July 11 - 24 • 2:30 - 5:30 p.m. • 3 Credits

Theoretical and practical aspects of creating educational software for microcomputers using BASIC and authoring languages. Prerequisite: Proficiency in programming in BASIC or permission of the instructor. Apple Lab.

#### 591 - Comprehension: Classroom Applications of Research (S) July 8 - 12 • 2:30 - 6:00 p.m. • 1 Credit

The purpose of this workshop is to provide a setting in which teachers can gather ideas and develop materials which will enable them to translate the results of the research in reading comprehension into classroom applications. Emphasis will be on story grammar, questioning strategies, and modeling.

#### ED/ANTH 498 - Principles of Anthropology for Teachers (4A) Daily • 7:00 - 8:30 a.m. • 4 Credits

Designed especially for public school teachers in response to the directive for increased understanding of our multi-cultural world. Identifying basic principles of human biological and cultural adaptation; exploring those similarities and differences among societies which emerge from cross-cultural studies; examining broad concepts and methods for applying them at various levels in the public schools. Enrollment is limited to a maximum of 15.

#### 498 - Developing Language Skills Through Dialogue Journal Writing (4A)

#### MTW • 2:30 - 4:30 p.m. • 2 Credits

Reviewing dialogue journal writing research and examining ways that language arts skills can be enhanced through participation in journal writing.

#### 598 - Legal Rights of Limited English Proficient (6) MTTh • 11:00 a.m. - noon • 2 Credits

Develops knowledge in and understandings of the historical developments and legal foundations in bilingual education with particular attention to Washington State law and federal legislation. There are no prerequisites.

#### 598 - Studies and Problems in Educational Linguistics (6) MTTh • 8:40 - 9:40 a.m. • 2 Credits

Prerequisites: Educational Linguistics or English as a Second Language (ESL) methods course, or equivalent, and classroom experience. Designed to provide graduate level students with the competencies necessary to assess the needs, identify the goals and address the objectives of second language instruction programs in the public schools. The course consists of four components: (1) research, (2) current practices. (3) issues and innovations, and (4) problems.

#### 598 - Studies and Problems in Intercultural Education (6) MTWTh • 12:10 - 1:10 p.m. • 3 Credits

Research and analysis of models in intercultural/interpersonal school relations. Awareness of the student/teacher relationship in creating school climate in multicultural settings. Analysis of the principles used to interpret these interactions, and practice in brief interventions involving staff, teachers and students.

## ENGLISH

#### 498 - Teaching Composition on the Word Processor (4A) Daily • 11:00 a.m. - 1:10 p.m. • 5 Credits

Students will learn to use the equipment, types of programs available,

and what the teacher should best be doing after the word processor has done its work.

#### 498 - Science Fiction for the Adolescent Reader (9) Daily • 9:50 - 10:50 a.m. • 5 Credits

A broad sampling of science fiction, both the traditional and the current, that is particularly appropriate to young people; strategies for eliciting full and rich responses to the literature from the students.

## **GEOGRAPHY AND LAND STUDIES**

#### 498 - World Problem Areas (6) MTWTh • 9:50 a.m. - noon • 5 Credits

Impacts that climate, landforms, soils, population growth, resource exploitation, settlement patterns, and other geographical phenomena have on problems in many parts of the world, especially the Third World.

Critical examination of specific cases to increase understanding of basic processes and problems. This course should be useful to teachers at all levels as well as students interested in resources, international trade, and the Third World.

## **HEALTH EDUCATION**

#### HED/LeS 398 - Grantsmanship (4A) Daily • 9:50 - 10:50 a.m. • 3 Credits

General introduction to grant resources and grantwriting appropriate for education and social services personnel. Foundations, federal and state government and individual gift giving. The grantsmanship process, including locating funding sources, application and document writing processes, submission and follow-up. Post award grant administration technique.

# 498 - Creative Methodology for Health Promotion in the Classroom (4A)

#### Daily • 12:10 - 1:10 p.m. • 3 Credits

Course will introduce over 100 creative and exciting methods which enable students to learn about health.

#### 498 - Drug Education for Teachers (4A) Daily • 9:50 - 10:50 a.m. • 3 Credits

Updated information for instructors and health educators with emphasis on alternative and preventive drug programs. Detailed information on: motivations for drug use (i.e., peer group influences, media, etc.), physiology of drug actions/interactions, over the counter drugs, and drug categories/specifics.

## HOME ECONOMICS -- FAMILY AND CONSUMER STUDIES

#### HOEC 598 - Causes and Prevention of Family Abuse (S) July 29 - August 9 • 5:00 - 8:00 p.m. • 3 Credits

Examination of the causes and conditions of abuse among family members. Psychological, sociological and environmental factors in abuse, with implications for prevention. Application to school and community education.

#### HOEC 598 - Consumer Education for Young People (S) July 29 - August 9 • 8:00 - 11:00 a.m. • 3 credits

Development of consumer education classes unique to the needs and interests of young people. Application strategies for secondary schools, community colleges, or private educational settings.

#### HOEC 598 - Alternative Clothing Construction Techniques for Home and School (4A) Daily • 7:30 - 9:40 a.m. • 3 Credits

Exploration of optional techniques of clothing construction in application to selected fabrics and notions. Teaching strategies for home and school

### HOEC 598 - Current Issues in Parenting Education (4A) Daily • 6:00 - 7:00 p.m. • 3 Credits

sewers. Students will supply materials. Lab class.

Examination of current trends in sex roles as they relate to parenting; challenge of parenting for fathers, and for employed mothers; social and economic policies affecting child care. Curriculum exploration.

## HOEC 598 - Leadership Development in Home and Family Life Classrooms (4A)

## Daily • 2:30 - 3:30 p.m. • 3 Credits

Planning, managing and evaluating leadership development as an integral component of the H&FL curriculum.

#### HOEC/PE 598 - Nutrition, Weight Control and Exercise (4A) Daily • 1:20 - 2:20 p.m. • 3 Credits

Study of factors related to the cause of excessive weight gain and modification of diet, activity, and behavior required for successful weight control. Examination of the role of dietary factors in health and body function.

## LEISURE SERVICES PROGRAM (P.E.H.L.S.)

#### LeS/HED 398 - Grantsmanship (4A) Daily • 9:50 - 10:50 a.m. • 3 Credits

General introduction to grant resources and grantwriting appropriate for

education and social services personnel. Foundations, federal and state government and individual gift giving. The grantsmanship process, including locating funding sources, application and document writing processes, submission and follow-up. Post award grant administration technique.

## 498 - Games and Adventure Activities for Elementary School Children (4A)

#### Daily • 11:00 a.m. - noon • 3 Credits

Course on leadership of games and adventure activities for elementary school children. Introduction to a variety of games and activities appropriate for the school playground or outdoor recreation setting as well as the classroom. Includes activities for socialization, trust-building, cooperation, learning skills, adventure, creativity, "ice-breakers," and others. Emphasis on organization and leadership as well as values toward child growth and development through recreation.

## MATHEMATICS

For computer literacy, word processing, microcomputer applications, and other related classes for educators, see the Business Education and the Education sections.

#### 598 - Computers in the High School Mathematics Classroom (S) July 9 - 11 • 1:00 - 4:30 p.m. • 1 Credit

The course is specifically concerned with the use of the computer in the mathematics curriculum. There will not be a heavy emphasis on programming languages, hardware or other aspects of computer science. Participants should have had some experience in elementary BASIC programming and using computers.

This course will be taught in 3 sessions. One session will address geometry, another will address algebra, and the third will address general and prealgebra mathematics. Time will also be spent on problem solving throughout and some work on probability.

#### 598 - Mathematics for the Middle School (S) July 12 - 16 • 8:30 a.m. - noon • 1 Credit

This course is designed for the middle school mathematics teacher whose mathematics background does not extend to calculus. The participant will acquire subject matter and problem-solving skills which will complement the activities traditionally included in school mathematics texts.

#### 598 - Problem Solving in Middle School Mathematics (S) July 17 - 19 • 8:30 a.m. - noon • 1 Credit

The National Council of Teachers of Mathematics publication Agenda For Action (1980) gives high priority to the teaching of problem-solving skills in the mathematics classroom. This course will use a number of interesting problems as vehicles for examining the techniques used in solving problems; the skills and the sample problems will adapt readily to the middle school classroom. For teachers with limited mathematics backgrounds.

#### 598 - Computer Spreadsheets in Mathematics Classrooms (S) July 25 - August 7 • 2:30 - 4:30 p.m. • 2 Credits

The course will be based upon problems adaptable to the classroom, especially grades 7 through 12, chosen for their possibilities for both analytical development and for exploration using the unique capabilities of a computer spreadsheet such as VISICALC. Topics include the Euclidean algorithm for finding the greatest common factor of two numbers, development of formulas for arithmetic sums, and the relation of discrete mathematics to analytical mathematics (geometry, calculus, etc.)

The methodology will be based upon problem solving. The context for each problem will be reviewed, followed by exploration using traditional methods or the electronic spreadsheet. Recursive algorithms and inductive proofs will be emphasized.

#### 599 - Probability and Statistics Topics for Teachers, Grades 3-8 (S) June 25 - July 10 • 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. • 2 Credits

Probability and statistics are receiving ever greater emphasis in elementary and junior high school mathematics programs. This seminar is designed for teachers who have little or no background in these areas. Activities will provide an informal, intuitive introduction to selected topics, with a series of ideas that can be adapted to the classroom.

# **599** - Problem Solving Seminar for Elementary School Teachers (S)

#### June 25 - July 10 • 7:30 - 9:30 • 2 Credits

Open-ended problems drawn from the mathematical areas of number, shape, measurement and probability will be pursued both during and outside of class. Specific problem-solving processes to be examined include hypothesis-testing, simplifying, guessing, analogy, organizing, looking for patterns, generalizing, and extending the problem. Related mathematical concepts will include prime numbers, area, factors, properties of shapes, odd and even numbers, figurate numbers, elementary probability and statistics, proportionality, fractions, and other topics that may naturally arise in the course of pursuing an investigation. Participants are required to complete and present investigations of their own.

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION

#### 491 - Stress Management in Athletics (S) July 8 - 12 • 2:30 - 5:30 p.m. • 1 Credit

Physiology of stress and its relationship to athletic performance.

#### 498 - Dance and Rhythmic Activities for the Intermediate and Middle School (4A)

#### Daily • 11:00 a.m. - noon • 3 Credits

Classroom activities, locomotor skills, folk dances, round dances, square dances and rhythmic exercise.

#### 498 - Fitness Appraisal and Prescription (4A) Daily • 8:40 - 9:40 a.m. • 3 Credits

Assessment techniques of physical fitness status and identifying and prescribing programs for improvement.

#### 498 - Issues Facing Athletic, Physical Education, and Activity Directors (4A)

#### MTWTh • 12:10 - 1:10 p.m. • 2 Credits

This course is designed to benefit athletic directors, physical education and activity coordinators. Emphasis will be placed on issues such as fund raising, computer/word processing, evaluation tools, liability insurance, public relations, etc. Specialists will be brought in to discuss these areas of concern.

# **498** - Microcomputer Applications for Athletics and Physical Education (4A)

#### Daily • 1:20 - 2:20 p.m. • 3 Credits

This course is designed to assist those teachers, coaches and administrators in implementing and organizing either microcomputers or mainframe computers into their daily operations. The course will present theory, philosophy and demonstration of applications. Some hands-on experience with microcomputers.

#### 498 - Women in Sport - Past, Present, and Future (4A) Daily • 9:50 - 10:50 a.m. • 3 Credits

A look at the past history of women in sport in order to gain an understanding of the present and to speculate on the future.

#### PE/HOEC 598 - Nutrition, Weight Control and Exercise (4A) Daily • 1:20 - 2:20 p.m. • 3 Credits

Study of factors related to the cause of excessive weight gain and modification of diet, activity, and behavior required for successful weight control. Examination of the role of dietary factors in health and body function.

# 598 - Excellence in Education - The Role of Sport and Physical Education (4B)

#### Daily • 9:50 - 10:50 a.m. • 3 Credits

The current national interest in educational excellence has once again focused attention on all aspects of education. The role of physical education and sport in the educational process will be studied with an objective being to determine how they can best contribute to this important goal.

## PHYSICS

#### 398 - "Halley's Comet" (S) July 9 - August 1 • TTh • 8:00 - 11:00 p.m. • 2 Credits

This course is designed to help prepare persons for the appearance of Halley's comet in November of this year through the early part of next year. It will focus on the nature of comets, possible origins, how they orbit the sun (Kepler's Laws), how to visualize the earth as a spaceship and relate the appearance of the comet to our relative places in the solar system. Techniqus of observation and photography as well as best observation sites will also be discussed. Some time will be spent learning the starfields the comet will pass through. There will be use of the Lind Hall telescope and a visit to the Manastash Ridge Observatory.

#### 498 - Physics Revisited - A Laboratory Approach (S) July 9 - August 2 • 7:30 - 11:00 a.m. • 4 Credits

Prerequisite: Participants must have taught, or currently be teaching Physics at the high school level or get permission from the instructor.

Course is to provide the students with a set of laboratory observations and experiments. The participants will study the theoretical basis of experiments, analyze and interpret data and write analyses of the experiments.

## **POLITICAL SCIENCE**

#### 498 - US, USSR and Nuclear War (4B) Daily • 11:00 - noon • 3 Credits

The main areas with which the course deals are past and present efforts by the US and the USSR concerning agreements and negotiations on strategic, or nuclear wars; the nature of the weapon systems themselves; the complexities of the political factors involved; and the intentions and motivations of the US and the USSR.

## SCIENCE EDUCATION

#### 498 - Major Concepts in Life Sciences for Elementary Teachers (S) June 25 - July 10 • 10:00 - noon • 2 Credits

This is a course designed to provide quality background content which elementary school teachers need to better understand the major concepts in life science. It will be useful for both personal growth and for reinforcement of present life science concepts being taught. A discussiondiscovery format will be used which will actually involve teachers in the learning process.

# **498** - Major Concepts in Physical Science for the Elementary Teacher (S)

#### July 9 - 19 • 1:20 - 4:00 p.m. • 2 Credits

Physical science concepts normally found in elementary science curricula. Presentation will be through lecture/discussion, supported by many demonstrations used to help develop the concepts. The concepts will range in cognitive level from concrete to abstract. Intended to broaden the content background for the elementary teacher, helping that teacher to become more proficient and confident in the teaching of elementary physical science concepts.

#### 498 - Language of Science for Elementary Teachers (S) July 22 - August 2 • 10:00 - noon • 2 Credits

Designed to help elementary teachers to build their science vocabulary, and to promote better understanding of scientific terms and how they are established. The course will center around activities designed to do the above.

## INDUSTRIAL AND ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY

#### 598 - Trends in Power Technology (S)

#### July 8 - 19 • 1:20 - 3:30 p.m., Wednesdays 7:00 - 10:00 p.m. • 3 Credits

Curriculum, instructional materials, and hands-on laboratory experiences in the areas of hydraulics, pneumatics, diagnostic oscilloscope operation, and dynamometer testing. Students will operate microcomputers using power technology software and develop course materials appropriate to their needs.

Directors, designers, actors, technicians, administrative personnel will meet with the class to discuss the problems, prospects and techniques peculiar to their specific craft as it pertains to the summer theatre process and demands. Participation in crew work or running a show is encouraged but not required.

Guest lecturers: play directors, Bonnie Walsh, professional actors, Dr. Betty Evans, Terry Parkers; scene and costume designers, lighting and property designers. Box office/management staff - Larry Sharpe, last business manager. Company members: actors, actresses, technicians.

# 498 - Bringing Children's Stories to Life Through the Arts (R) July 8 - 16 • 9:00 - noon and 1:00 - 4:00 p.m. • 4 Credits

Exploring ways to vitalize and present children's stories through theatre, animation, storytelling and puppetry. Working from a multi-art approach, the student will work with guest artists to define and practice new ways to experience classical and contemporary stories for children. Aimed at the goals of teachers, leisure specialists, counselors, artists and the gifted.

# **EDUCATION**

# 498 - Selection of Computer Software for Classroom Teachers (R) July 1 - 12 • Daily • 6:00 - 9:45 p.m. • 3 Credits

Introduction to laws and basic tools needed for selection. Includes: school selection policies and committees, reviewing media, reviewing data banks, reviewing tools, copyright laws. Includes experience in reviewing software of the following types: tutorial, drill and practice, games and simulation, problem solving and demonstrations. # 598 - Alternative Education: Methods and Materials (R) June 21 - 23 • ThFS • 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. • 2 Credits

The course will feature the instructional approaches and curriculum materials used in alternative schools throughout Washington state. Topics to be covered include: Learning Styles, Individualizing Instruction, Writing Across the Curriculum K-12, Alternative Olympics, and Using the Community as a Resource. Instructors will be teachers and administrators from alternative schools. (Reservation and deposit required.) Information will be sent upon receipt of reservation form.

# ENGLISH

# **498** - Literature for the Gifted Student (4A) Daily • 3:40 - 4:40 p.m. • 3 Credits

This class will deal with the specific problems of choosing and presenting literature that is appropriate to the gifted student. Students in the class will learn of the literature that is available and of strategies that can be used to involve gifted students more fully with the material they read.

# **498** - Teaching Verse Writing in the Elementary School (4A) Daily • 1:20 - 2:20 p.m. • 3 Credits

Teachers will work on strategies for encouraging youngsters to draft and edit their own poetry. Included will be work with individual topics and structuring those topics progressively. Students will be asked to do their own writing as well, to demonstrate how the strategies can work in their own classrooms. Some attention will be paid to examples of children's writing.

# 498 - Literature: Purpose, Selection, Values (4A) Daily • 2:30 - 3:30 p.m. • 3 Credits

This course will deal with these questions: What is the role of values in the literature class? What is the difference between education and propaganda? How does one speak to the issue of censorship by the community? How can one get the students involved with the questions of value at work in a literary work without seeming to become an advocate of perhaps unpopular ideas?

# FOREIGN LANGUAGES

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FR 151, 152, 153 - First Year French (R)
FR 151 - June 25 - July 12 • Daily •10:00 - noon and 1:00 - 3:00 p.m.
FR 152 - July 15 - August 2 • Daily • 10:00 - noon and 1:00 - 2:00 p.m.
FR 153 - August 5 - 23 • Daily • 10:00 - noon and 1:00 - 2:00 p.m. •
5 Credits
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Designed for anyone wishing to learn French in a shortened period of

time. High school and community college students, travelers and educators will find this an excellent method for mastering basic reading, writing, listening and speaking skills. May enroll for all three three-week sections or each section individually. Special presentations of French folk music along with various films on French folk music along with various films on French culture and history will also be shared. This course will satisfy the first-year language requirement at CWU.

# SPAN 498 - Spanish Pronuncation and Conversation (6) Daily • 3:30 - 4:30 p.m. • 3 Credits

This course will provide students the opportunity to improve their understanding and speaking in Spanish. The rules of Spanish phonetics will be presented and practiced. Contemporary reading materials, selected for their cultural content, will serve for practice in improving one's pronunciation and fluency, and as a basis for conversation.

# SPAN 498 - Spanish Orthography, Grammar and Composition (6) MTWTh • 2:30 - 3:30 p.m. • 3 Credits

This course will provide the opportunity for native Spanish speakers and others with considerable oral proficiency to improve their ability to spell and to write Spanish, and to increase their knowledge of Spanish structure. Although Spanish will be spoken in class and thereby one's oral ability will improve, primary emphasis will be given to improving writing skills and to increasing one's knowledge of Spanish morphology, syntax and orthography. A review of accentuation, spelling difficulties and specific grammar points will serve as a point of departure to achieve those objectives.

# GEOGRAPHY

# 493 - Geography Field Experience: Geography of the Columbia River Gorge (R)

# June 17 - 21 • All Day • 3 Credits

Designed to develop a special geographical awareness of the spectacular Columbia River Gorge and the intense resource management conflict that surrounds it. The course will examine geological, geographical and historical aspects of the Gorge, visiting sites that have ecological, historic, geographic, geologic and scenic interest. Attention will be given to the economic importance of the region, focusing on industry, trade and transportation. A paper is required; teachers may substitute a unit for classroom use. Students will camp out or stay in motels.

Interested persons should contact Dr. James Brooks, Director, as soon as possible but no later than June 3, 1985. Enrollment limited.




