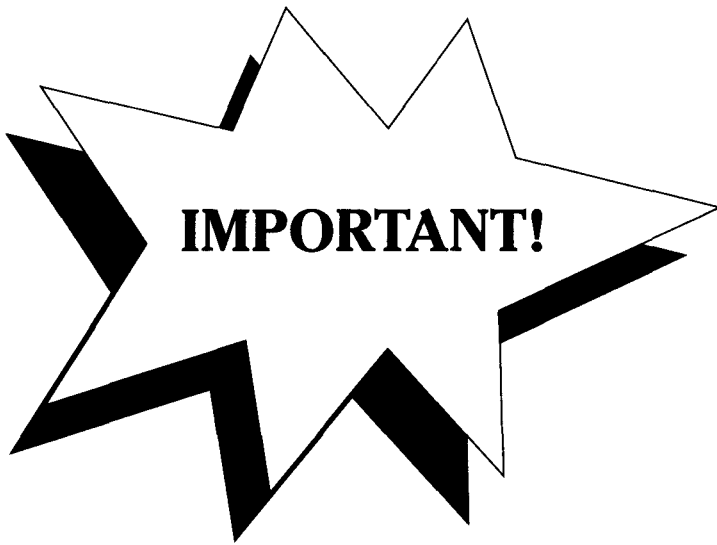

Student Responsibilities



PLEASE READ BEFORE REGISTERING FOR COURSES

As a CWU student, you are responsible for following the requirements and deadlines published each term in the schedule of courses. Please keep a copy of this schedule with your school records.

Tuition Payments: Registration, by telephone or in-person, obligates a student for payment of all tuition and fees. Students may check with the Cashier's Office to obtain the exact amount of tuition and fees due.

Your address is very important! Please keep it updated! Addresses can be changed at your registration office. Important materials are mailed periodically to all students throughout the quarter.

Schedule Confirmation: A student may call REGI and enter a 5 and a # sign to obtain a listing of their courses. Check your schedule carefully for discrepancies. You are responsible for ensuring that the courses you select will fulfill degree requirements. Registering for courses without the necessary corequisites or prerequisites can result in being disenrolled.

Drop by Instructor: If a student fails to attend a class, the instructor **may** drop the student from the class roll. Students should not assume they will automatically be dropped from a class they do not attend. Check with your registration office prior to the end of the change of schedule period. Non-attendance does not relieve you of your academic and financial responsibilities.

As a student, I understand the information included in the schedule of courses is important. I will be held academically and financially responsible for the course selections I make, and it is my responsibility to obtain academic advising for my program.

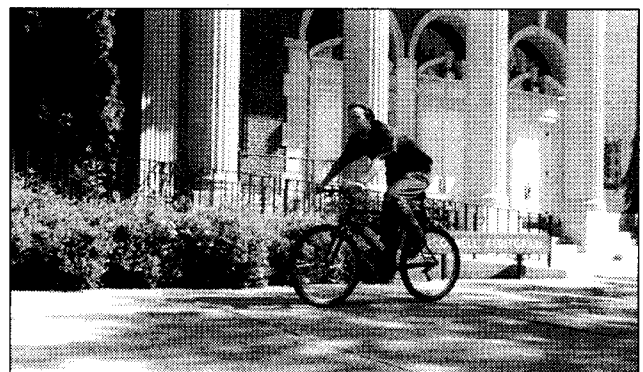

Admission and Readmission For Undergraduates and Non-Master's Students

Students may enroll for summer session courses under a variety of different conditions. Below are the various categories for enrollment and procedures for applying. If you are in doubt as to your category or have other questions about admission or readmission, contact the Office of Admissions (509) 963-3001.

CATEGORY 1. Fill out the Summer Information Form in this schedule and submit it to the office of the registrar prior to telephone registration. Include \$40 registration fee.

Continuing Students

Undergraduates and graduate students who were enrolled as matriculated students during the past year (summer, fall, winter, spring) and have attended no other institution.

Nonmatriculants

Students not working toward a degree or certification of any kind from CWU. Classes may be taken for personal enrichment or for transfer to another institution.

High School Students

Top high school students who wish to enroll during summer session may do so with the written approval of both the high school principal and the CWU office of admissions.

Obtain a High School Enrichment Form from the office of admissions, have it signed by your high school principal and attach your transcript. Bring the form, with the transcript attached, to the office of admissions for approval. After admission, submit the Summer Information Form in this schedule to the office of the registrar.

CATEGORY 2. Submit a Uniform Application for Admission Form and a \$35 application fee to the office of admissions. Application and transcripts of all work not already on file at CWU must be received by June 15, 1995. After admission, submit Summer Information Form in this schedule and \$40 registration fee to the office of the registrar.

Students who receive financial aid must apply and be admitted.

Returning Undergraduate or Graduate Students

Former CWU students who have not completed their course of study and were not enrolled during the past year (summer, fall, winter, spring), but who wish to return for summer session 1995.

New Undergraduate Students

New freshmen or transfer students never before

enrolled at CWU who plan to work on a degree or certification through CWU.

New Post-Baccalaureate Students

Students who have completed a bachelor's degree but are not pursuing a master's degree program. Students may be working toward initial or continuing certification for vocational or professional education through CWU. Post baccalaureate students who want to pursue certification are considered as new post-baccalaureate students.

International Students

Students who are in the United States on a nonimmigrant visa. (This does not include permanent residents, refugees, or Canadian students.)

Contact the office of admissions for instructions on admission procedures. Early application is encouraged. After admission, submit the Summer Information Form in this schedule to the office of the registrar.

Canadian Students

Follow procedure for the Uniform Application for Admission Form..

You are reminded to request an I-20 from the office of admissions. Please do this early enough to avoid problems with your border crossing. After admission, submit the Summer Information Form in this schedule to the office of the registrar.

New Master's Degree Students

Students who have completed a bachelor's degree, either at CWU or another institution, and who will begin the master's degree program for the first time at CWU. (This includes students who have attended CWU as undergraduate students.)

Each prospective graduate student must submit an application for admission to the university. Admission to the university does not constitute admission to a master's degree program. Graduate students may apply for admission to a master's degree program, continuing certificate program or non-degree study (professional improvement, scholarly development).

A graduate student is expected to have a bachelor's degree from a college or university accredited by recognized accrediting associations prior to registering for courses. Students with a baccalaureate degree from an institution holding candidacy status for accreditation are considered only after a review of

the Analysis Report and Evaluation Committee Report of the accrediting association, which must be provided by the institution before admission will be determined.

The application to graduate study can be obtained from graduate admissions & records (Barge 305, 963-3103). The application, \$35 application fee, GRE scores, transcripts, three letters of recommendation, and a statement of educational objectives and professional aims must be **submitted by April 1** for admission to a master's degree program for summer quarter. Applicants to master's degree study are admitted by formal letter from the dean of graduate studies.

Submit the Summer Information Form in this schedule and \$40 registration fee to the office of the registrar.

A master's degree program involves a close graduate faculty/student relationship in order to plan a program of study most appropriate to the professional goals and purposes of each individual applicant admitted. **Consequently, no more than nine quarter credits completed before formal admission are accepted on the official course of study for the master's degree.** This does not preclude the student from taking prerequisite or other background courses prior to admission that do not count toward the degree.

Graduate students or prospective graduate students may petition the dean of graduate studies to modify graduate school regulations applying to their admission or program. A complete description of graduate school policies may be found in the CWU General Catalog.

Teacher Certification

A teacher in the state of Washington is required to convert a provisional or initial teaching certificate to a continuing teaching certificate. Candidates for the continuing certificate must meet the following requirements:

- Have a minimum of two (2) endorsements on their teaching certificate*
- Verify at least one year of full-time teaching experience
- Complete 45 credits of upper-division (300 level or higher) coursework, including courses in abuse, staff development and supervision, research and evaluation, and referral agencies.

Application forms and further information can be obtained from the certification office located in Black Hall 216.

In order to qualify for endorsement to teach in more

than one specialization, students must meet the requirements for each specialization. Experienced teachers may petition the department of education for permission to student teach for less than the normal 16 credits.

To maintain the continuing (professional) certificate, each person must complete one-hundred fifty (150) clock hours of approved in-service education and/or fifteen (15) college or university credits every five years.

*Candidates for the continuing certificate must have been granted at least two subject area endorsements. Subject area endorsements, with the exception of broad subject area endorsements of English/language arts, science and social studies, require satisfactory completion of 24 credits in specified areas of studies. Broad subject endorsements require 45 credits.

Tuition and Fees

A \$40 registration fee will be assessed for all students. The fee is in addition to tuition. The mandatory \$40 registration fee must be paid prior to preregistration. The fee can be paid in person at the CWU cashiers' office or it can be submitted with the summer information form to the office of the registrar.

For those registering on or before June 19, 1995, full tuition and fees are due on or before June 19. For those registering after June 19, tuition and fees are due at the time of registration.

When a student registers for classes a financial obligation to the university is incurred and adjustments will be made according to the current refund policy.

VISA or MASTERCARD billing is accepted for all tuition and fee expenses for summer quarter. See summer information form in this schedule for the correct data entry.

Students who have not paid full tuition and fees by the published deadlines may be dropped from all courses and be liable for 50 percent of tuition and fees.

Because summer session is self-support, there is no non-resident fee structure. Also, there are no special waivers granted to SE Asia veterans or others in special tuition waiver programs.

Listed tuition and fees are subject to modification by the state or by Central's board of trustees.

*Students who have completed a bachelor's degree but are not pursuing a master's degree program.

Refunds

A continuing student will receive 100 percent of tuition and fees only if complete university withdrawal occurs prior to the published deadline.

There is **no refund for individual course withdrawals** after the change of schedule period.

There is no refund of tuition and fees if withdrawal from the university occurs after the published deadlines.

\$40 registration fee: Students who cancel their registration through the office of the registrar before June 2, 1995, may request a refund of the \$40 fee. **Any cancellation after June 2, 1995,** results in forfeiture of the \$40 registration fee.

Withdrawing

POLICY FOR WITHDRAWAL FROM CLASS

Because of short terms in summer, withdrawal dates are different than other quarters. Check the summer session calendar for withdrawal dates. No refunds are granted for individual course withdrawals.

TOTAL WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY REFUND SCHEDULE

Second Session:

- 100 percent tuition refund on or before July 24

REGI: Registration's Exceptionally Great Innovation

May 8 - June 2, 1995 - weekdays 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

1. Prior to preregistration submit Summer Information Form along with \$40 registration fee to office of the registrar.
2. Follow the directions on the "REGI" worksheets.

REGI, Central's VOICE RESPONSE TELEPHONE REGISTRATION SYSTEM is available for preregistration for summer 1995. The following pages and worksheet will explain the process in detail. It is easy if you use a true touchtone telephone, and remember to end each transaction with a pound sign. Be sure to register early – all courses are on a first-come first-served basis. Unless 10 graduate or 15 undergraduate students are enrolled, a course may be cancelled. If a course is cancelled, you may transfer to another open class with equal credit or request a tuition refund.

Preregistration by Telephone Only

Preregistration is only available by telephone May 8 through June 2. The Summer Information Form along with a \$40 registration fee is required in advance of registration. Please submit to CWU Registrar's Office, Ellensburg, WA 98926-7465. Allow time for processing before calling "REGI."

Registration Fee

The \$40 registration fee must be submitted along with your Summer Information Form to be eligible to register. Students who cancel their preregistration before June 2, 1995, may request a full \$40 refund. Any cancellation after June 2, 1995, results in forfeiture of the \$40 registration fee.

TO LIST YOUR SCHEDULE ON REGI: DIAL 5#
REGI will list your class schedule along with the **CALL NUMBER, MEETING TIME, AND LOCATION OF THE COURSE**. Please write this information down and verify for accuracy and the correct number of credits.

TO WAIT LIST A COURSE ON REGI: DIAL 95#
Initially enter **2*call number#**. If the course is full and has a **wait-list available, REGI will advise you**. At this point, enter 95# if you wish to be wait-listed. REGI will also notify you if additional sections of the same course are available at another time. TO OFFICIALLY REGISTER, OBTAIN DEPARTMENTAL PERMISSION. ADMISSION TO A WAIT LISTED COURSE IS AT THE DISCRETION OF THE INSTRUCTOR.

TO REGISTER FOR INDIVIDUAL STUDY COURSES:
Submit an orange individual study form to the department secretary for approval. Leave the form with the department. On REGI enter the individual study course call number listed in the schedule book. REGI will notify you that the course has a variable credit option and give you the minimum and maximum number of credits you can enter. Please be sure to input the number of credits that you have received department permission to enter.

Basic REGI Information

1. **REGISTRATION TIME:** If you try to call before your assigned time REGI will give you a message stating you are calling at the wrong time and the computer will hang up. Please DO NOT call before your assigned time.

2. **CALL NUMBER:** This is a five digit number listed in front of each course section in the schedule book. This is the number you use with REGI for adding or dropping courses.
3. **ACTION CODE:** An action code is a series of numbers that identifies the term and academic year for which you are registering. See REGI worksheet.
4. **PIN NUMBER:** This is your personal identification number. See REGI worksheet.
5. **PERMISSION ENTRY CODE:** Entry codes are five-digit numbers issued to you by departments to enroll in restricted course sections. Courses requiring entry codes are designated with the symbol > to the left of the course in the schedule book. Departments reserve the right to require entry codes whether or not the course is designated as such in the schedule. Once you use an entry code, REGI will not accept it again. REGI will prompt you for the permission entry code.
6. **ALTERNATE SECTIONS:** If the section requested is closed you will be informed by REGI of open alternate sections if available. Have a pencil ready and be prepared to write down the call number of the course. You can list your courses to determine location of the course.
7. **TIME CONFLICT:** You may not register on REGI for two courses that meet at the same time. You must add the second course in person at your registration office during open registration. Students should consult with the instructors of the conflicting courses before registering.
8. **CREDIT/NO CREDIT, REPEAT, AUDIT:** You may register for the course on REGI but you must go in person to your registration office to report the option by the end of the change of schedule period. AUDIT requires faculty permission prior to adding the option.
9. **OVERLOADS:** Additional credits require departmental approval. See policy under general regulations in schedule. Overloads may be added during the **change of schedule period** at your registration office.
10. **DISCONNECT ACTION:** Time limits are built into the system. If you are holding on the REGI line for an extended period of time you will be disconnected.

You need to take care of all university holds prior to registration. "REGI" will not permit you to register if you have a hold, (i.e. library fines, parking fines, etc.)

- Disconnect Action**

General Information

Classification of Students

Class rank is based upon the number of quarter hours earned as follows:

Freshman.....	0 - 44.9
Sophomore.....	45 - 89.9
Junior	90 - 134.9
Senior	135 - plus

Numbering of Courses

Courses are numbered as follows:

Freshman.....	100 through 199
Sophomore.....	200 through 299
Junior	300 through 399
Senior	400 through 499
Graduate.....	500 through 700

Students may elect courses one year ahead of their present status except when otherwise designated. Courses numbered 500 and above are normally for graduate students. Senior students may take 500 level courses only with the approval of both the department chairperson and the instructor of the class. The 500 level may be used for undergraduate credit or graduate credit (but not both). In order to receive graduate credit, the student must be in his/her senior year of undergraduate work and must obtain approval from the dean of graduate studies.

Student Load Policy

Undergraduate

- 17 credits or less - No permission required
- 18-20 credits - Major department chair approval required
- over 20 credits - Dean's approval required

Graduate (Post-Baccalaureate & Master's)

- 16 credits or less - No permission required
- 17-19 credits - Major department chair approval required
- 20 or more credits - Graduate Dean's approval required

Audit

A student eligible to enroll in a course for credit may enroll as an auditor except in laboratory courses, provided that space is available and permission is secured from the instructor prior to registration. Full tuition is assessed for audits, and no credit is earned.

Instructors may not compel auditors to write papers or take examinations, but may insist upon other course requirements. The instructor may request of the dean that the auditor be officially withdrawn from the course if these requirements are not met. Audited courses require written permission from the department.

Repetition of Courses

Some courses are approved for repetition with credit awarded each time the course is taken and passed.

Such approval is indicated in the course description. Other courses may be repeated: (1) Credit will be awarded only once; (2) When a course is repeated, only the last grade earned will be used in the computation of the cumulative grade point average. However, all grades will remain in the student's official record; (3) Major grade point averages will also be computed on the basis of the last grade earned when major courses are repeated.

Incomplete Policy

An "I" (incomplete) means the student was not able to complete the course by the end of the term, but has satisfactorily completed a sufficient portion of it and can be expected to finish without having to re-enroll in it. An "I" is not used in computing a grade point average.

Unless the incomplete is removed and a grade submitted by the instructor within the space of one calendar year, the "I" will convert to an F.

Credit/No Credit Option

All students except first quarter freshmen and students on academic probation may select one course per quarter under the credit/no credit option. Students are urged to use this option as a way to explore academic areas of interest. A maximum of 15 credits earned in credit/no credit courses may be allowed toward the 180 required for the bachelor's degree.

The courses must be selected from breadth requirements and free electives; they must not be courses in the basic, major, or minor concentrations or the professional education sequence.

Students designate the course as credit/no credit during registration or during "change of schedule" period. Courses for which a grade has been recorded may not be repeated on a credit/no credit option.

Credits earned under the credit/no credit option are not included in computing the grade point average. The grade recorded on the student's transcript will be "CR" if the course grade is C- or above; if below C-, the entry will be "NC".

Procedure for Enrolling in Individual Study

Forms are available in the registrar's office, center office and the departmental offices. Permission must be granted from the instructor and department chairperson. Complete the form, including the 18-space descriptive title and course outline on back of the card. Submit the approved form to the department secretary. Complete registration following procedures on page 10.

Procedure for Enrolling in Cooperative Education (Contracted Field Experience)

Cooperative Education Learning Agreement Forms are available at the departmental offices or the Cooperative Education Center. Students must plan adequate time to complete the form and obtain the required signatures. All signatures are required before registration can be completed. The Learning

Agreement must be submitted to the Cooperative Education Center at least a week before summer session begins. Registration is done by the Co-op Center staff. A copy of the Learning Agreement is returned to the student by mail. Please contact the Cooperative Education Center, (509) 963-2404, for forms or more information.

Academic Advising

Students should make arrangements for academic advising through the academic department that offers their intended major. For the names of departmental coordinators of advising, students may contact the departments or academic services (509) 963-3001.

Students in the continuing certificate program (fifth year) should direct questions to the certification office in Black Hall 216, (509) 963-2661.

Graduation

Application for baccalaureate degree graduation may be made at the office of the registrar during the quarter preceding the quarter in which the degree is to be received or not later than June 9, 1995, for summer.

Students must assume the responsibility for meeting all degree requirements and total credits for graduation.

Financial Aid

Students who want financial aid for summer quarter 1995 need to submit the 1994-95 Free Application for Federal Student Aid before May 1 if they have not already done so. No late applications will be processed.

Computer Lab Fee

All students enrolled in courses requiring a computer fee must obtain a computer lab sticker from the cashier's office or your center office.

Concurrent Enrollment

Students enrolled at CWU who are also enrolled at another institution during the same quarter must complete a Concurrent Enrollment Form. All student load policies will apply.

Procedure for Course Substitution and Waiver of Course Requirements:

Major or Minor: The student is required to provide the registrar's office with the substitution form to waive the requirement, signed by the appropriate chairperson and dean. Substitution forms are available at your registration office.

Professional Education Sequence: The student is required to provide the registrar's office with the substitution form to waive the requirement, signed by the education department chairperson and dean. Substitution forms are available at your registration office.

Basic, Breadth, or other Graduation Requirements: The dean of academic services handles most deviations from the catalog requirements. The petition forms are available at your registration office.

Residence Hall Accommodations For Summer Session Students

Residence hall accommodations are available this summer for those students living on campus for a minimum of one term (4 ½ weeks). The halls to be utilized were not designated at press time. Residence hall accommodations consist of the room and board combination, offering a choice of single or double occupancy. Rooms in the residence halls are furnished, however, each student may choose to bring accessories needed while living in the hall. Linens must be provided by the student, as the university does not provide bedding, towels, etc.

Those students who require accommodations for less than one term are housed in the Conference Center.

Apartments

The Student Village complex offers apartments to juniors, seniors, graduate students and married students without children. Apartment sizes vary to include studio, one- two- and three-bedroom apartments. All apartments are fully furnished.

There are furnished and unfurnished apartments. The second and third bedrooms in the larger units of both family and single apartments are not furnished.

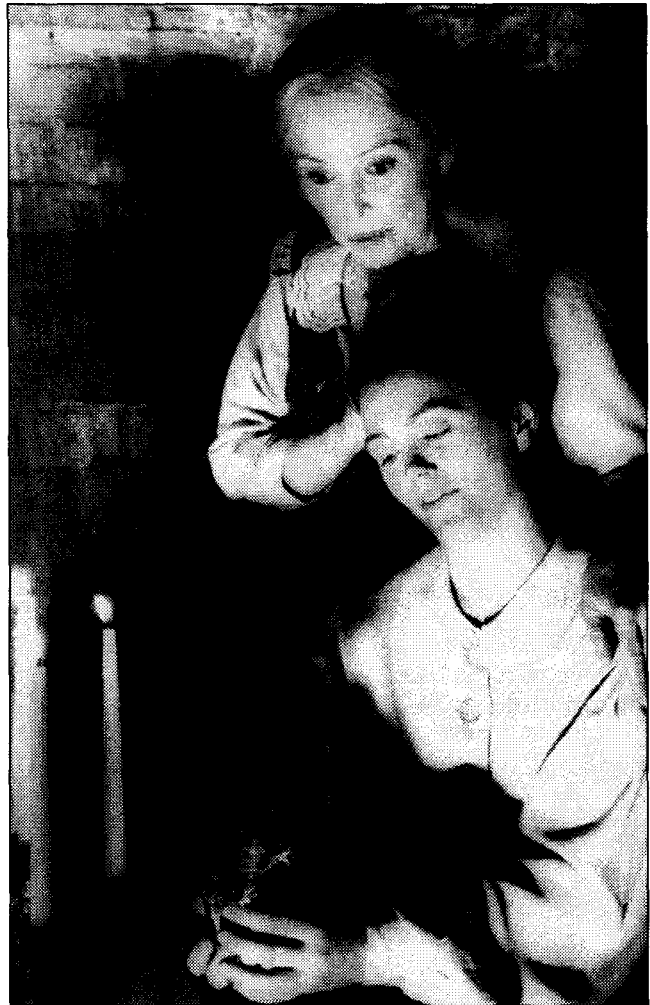

ANTH 130. Introduction to Cultural Anthropology (5)

June 26 - August 4

Strategies different people use in the game of *adaptation*. How to satisfy your needs and still have kinfolks and friends too. We will explore the behavioral bio-basis of the strategy humans use as individuals and groups.

ANTH 334. Culture and Criminality (3)

June 19 - July 19

Learn techniques of archaeological survey in the field, regional culture history, ecology, and environmental history, and cultural resource laws and ethical issues. *Must be taken concurrently with ANTH 495.2.*

ANTH 495.2. Advanced Methods in Archaeology (5)

June 19 - August 4

See Anth 493. Plus assigned readings are required for course completion. Must be taken concurrently with ANTH 493.

Business Education

BSED 498. Macintosh Computers for Educators (2)

June 26 - July 14

Designed for teachers who wish a hands-on introduction to MACs and the time to devote to development of usable competence. Cross listed with ED 498.

BSED 498. Classroom PC Multimedia (1)

July 10 - July 13

Creation on Hypercard stacks using HyperStudio software. Develop multimedia presentation including a Quick Time movie and photos, sound, paint tools, colors, titles, and animation.

BSED 498. Multimedia Presentations: DOS (2)

August 7 - August 11

Participants will develop multimedia presentations for business and education that incorporate text, sound, still images, animations, and video using multimedia software (Asymetrix Multimedia Toolbook for DOS/ Windows.) Business presentations will include kiosks, informational, and instructional. Educators will develop classroom, instructional, and kiosk presentations.

English

ENG 411. Studies in Major American Writers

ENG 515. Advanced Studies in American Literature (4)

June 19 - August 18

Examine the writings of Henry James. Six or seven of the most important stories will be discussed and analyzed, and film versions of them will be viewed side by side with the original text.

ENG 499/599. TESL/TEFL: Literacy (4)

June 19 - August 18

Students will examine the sociopolitical, economic, familial, and educational agendas that influence an individual's attainment of literacy in a new language.

ENG 499/599. Robertson Davis (3)

June 26 - August 4

Robertson Davis, born 81 years ago in rural Ontario, recently published his 11th novel. After a long career as fiction writer, playwright, journalist, editor, critic, and academic he remains both a major and a controversial figure in contemporary Canadian literature. The course will focus on four of Davis's novels and on Davis both as a Canadian writer and as an artist whose fictional "World of Wonders" seems infinite.

**ENG 499/599. Women's Prose and Poetry
about Nature (4)**

June 19 - August 18

Designed to help students become acquainted with a wealth of contemporary literature reflecting women's views of nature, including poems, short stories, essays, novels, journal entries, autobiography, and natural history.

ENG 598. Central Washington Writing Project (12)

June 26 - July 27

Development and implementation of successful strategies for teaching writing, writing in all the disciplines, portfolio assessment, whole language in K-college, integration of computers in the writing/language arts curriculum, implementation of in-service workshops for school districts. Twelve hours of credit may be applied to the M.A. in English (teaching option) or to the M.A. in Education (master teacher). All participants receive a scholarship from the National Writing Project. For K-college teachers in all subject areas. By permission of instructor only. Application deadline: April 24. Contact English department at 963-1546.

Geography

GEOG 101. Man's Changing Earth (5)

July 20 - August 18

Regions and nations of the world, with emphasis on environmental, political and human aspects. Short, local field trips will be available to observe first-hand, changes underway and their impacts. This course is of particular interest to teachers (K-12), business people and others wanting to understand international relationships.

GEOG 308. Cultural Geography (5)

June 26 - August 4

Study of how and why cultures and elements of culture differ, or are similar, from one place to another. Wide range of topics studied—Canadian ethnic diversity, rice farming in Bali, linguistic geography of Europe, religion in India and American popular culture. Visible elements of culture in the landscape will receive special emphasis.

GEOG 431. Introduction to GIS (4)

June 19 - July 19

A Geographic Information System (GIS) is a computer-based spatial information system. Individual maps are stored in layered form about a region of interest. Various questions about the maps can be "asked" of the system and new maps are produced. Distances and other measurements can be made on the maps. Elective for geography, resource management, geology, biology, anthropology, wildlife majors and other. We will use a Macintosh (color) environment and no previous computer knowledge is needed. Knowledge of maps is useful. Prerequisite to all other advanced GIS courses.

Geology

GEOL 145, 145.1. Physical Geology (4,1)

June 26 - August 4

Learn about drifting continents, plate tectonics, the Ice Age, the continually changing earth's crust and how to apply geological reasoning to any place on earth. Field trips near and around Ellensburg. GEOL 145 and 145.1 must be taken concurrently.

GEOL 498. Cascade Volcanoes (3)

June 19 - June 30

Study the volcanic giants of the Pacific Northwest, including Mt. Shasta, Three Fingered Jack, Mt. St. Helens and Mt. Rainier. Learn how plate tectonics shaped the Cascade Mountains and the strange origin of the Columbia River Basalt Plateau. Short field trips around Ellensburg.

Home Economics, Family and Consumer Studies

**HOEE 520. Supervision in Vocational
Home Economics (3)**

July 3 - July 14

Recent trends and issues in home economics education; identify and analyze professional competencies for beginning home and family life teachers and explore strategies for helping student teachers to develop needed competencies

Industrial and Engineering Technology

**IET 401. Principles and Philosophy of Vocational
Education (3)**

June 20 - July 1

An overview of Principles, Philosophy, Foundations and History. Will provide students with an understanding of the terminology, governmental structure, history and programs associated with public school vocational education in the United States. An emphasis will be placed on (1) students developing their own philosophy of vocational education, (2) the structure of vocational education in Washington state, and (3) the use of student organizations in vocational education. Required for all vocational certifications in Washington. Cross-listed with business ed, home ec and marketing ed.

Mathematics

Master of Arts in Teaching

Mathematics Degree Program

Central Washington University offers an MAT-Mathematics degree that can be completed in three consecutive summers. This program emphasizes both content and pedagogy. The degree is obtained by completing 36 quarter credits in Mathematics (including a project that can be used to enhance the teaching of mathematics) as well as nine quarter hours in educational research and foundations. Entry can be at any time as the courses are not sequential. A major point of the program is the emphasis on content and pedagogy as is outlined in the NCTM Curriculum and Professional Standards.

MATH 510. Games of Chance (3)

June 26 - August 4

Requiring only the fundamentals of basic probability, this course applies and investigates the popular casino games of chance, gambling systems and strategies, the "Law of Averages," cheating, and the "Gambler's Ruin."

**MATH 5241. Math Methods for Jr. High/
Middle School (3)**

June 26 - August 4

Prerequisite, one year teaching experience in mathematics or permission of instructor. Problems and methods associated with teaching mathematics in the junior high or middle school. NCTM Curriculum standards will be emphasized.

MATH 550. Transformational Geometry (3)

June 26 - August 4

Prerequisite, course in Euclidean and non-Euclidean geometry or permission. A study of the group of transformations of the plane: reflections, rotations, translations, and glide reflections. As time permits, the properties of dilations and affinity will also be discussed.

MATH 570. Calculus For Secondary Teachers (3)

June 26 - August 4

Prerequisite, two quarters of college level calculus and one year teaching experience. A re-examination of the processes of differentiation and integration emphasizing their applications to the natural, behavioral, social and managerial sciences.

Physics

PHYS 111. Introductory Physics (5)

June 26 - August 4

Provides a basic understanding of physical phenomena relating to position, rate of change of position, rate of change in velocity (acceleration), force, mass, Newton's law of motion, momentum, work and energy.

**PHYS 498. Physical Applications for the
Elementary School (5)**

June 19 - June 23

Physics and mathematics concepts will be taught through hands-on applications to physics. Learn answers to questions asked in the classroom and how to use materials that are already present in the classroom.

Safety Education

SED 180. Principles of Accident Prevention (3)

June 26 - August 4

The underlying principles and theories of accident causation and prevention. Impact of accidents on society today, psychological factors related to accidents, legal requirements, accident prevention in business and industry, the schools, and community.

SED 382. Driver Task Analysis (3)

June 26 - August 4

Prerequisite: SED 180 or concurrent enrollment. Introduction to traffic safety education, the highway transportation system, driver task analysis, classroom instructional techniques.

**SED 481. Teaching Traffic Safety Education:
Classroom and Simulation (3)**

June 26 - August 4

Prerequisite: SED 382 or concurrent enrollment. Methods, materials and techniques for teaching classroom and simulation. Experience in teaching beginning drivers.

**SED 482. Teaching Traffic Safety Education: In Car (3)
June 26 - August 4**

Prerequisite: SED 382 or concurrent enrollment.

Methods, materials and techniques for teaching in dual-control vehicles. Experience in teaching beginning drivers.

Science Education

**SCED 322. Science Education in the
Elementary School (3)**

June 19 - July 19 or July 20 - August 18

Creating and participating in hands-on activities that make science teaching and science learning effective and enjoyable.

SCED 398. What Do We See in the Sky? (1)

June 26 - June 30

How often do we think about what we see in the sky? Study the motion of celestial objects by direct observation and by creating and using models of star charts, celestial spheres, and hands-on activities involving lights and balls.

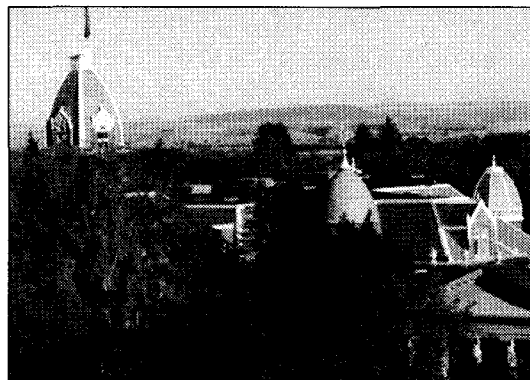

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CWU Drug and Alcohol Policy

I. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

The University's policy regarding the possession and consumption of alcohol and other drugs on campus has been developed in keeping with Washington state law (see RCW and WAC) and the Governor's policy on alcoholism and drug dependency. Members of the University community may review these current policies at the University library. The University Policy assumes that individuals of the University community have read, understood, and agree to abide by Washington state laws.

A. Some of the laws you may wish to be familiar with are:

- RCW 66.44.270 - Furnishing Liquor to Minors - Possession and Use.
- RCW 66.24.481 - Public Places and Clubs
- RCW 66.04.010 - Public Places
- RCW 66.44.100 - Opening or Consuming Liquor in Public Place Penalty
- RCW 66.44.150 - Buying Liquor Illegally
- RCW 66.44.291 - Minors Purchasing Liquor
- WAC 296-24-073 - Safe Place Standards

Article IV offenses and penalties, RCW 69.50.401 thru 69.50.412, described various penalties or sanction that may occur if one is illegally involved with controlled substances. If convicted, sanctions range from 90 days in jail and a \$1,000 fine, a misdemeanor, to a class B felony, ranging from 10 years in jail to a \$20,000 fine. The sanctions in Washington State vary sometimes depending on amount of substance and whether it is your first or second offense. Sanctions related to alcohol or other drug offenses in Washington state range from community hours (possibly including a fine) up to a class B felony charge. Further information is available at the CWU library.

WAC 10-120-027 Proscribed Conduct. A student shall be subject to disciplinary action or sanction upon violation of any of the following conduct proscriptions:

- (14) Possession, use, or distribution on campus of any controlled substance as defined by the laws of the United States or the state of Washington except as expressly permitted by law.
- (15) Violation of the university policy on alcoholic beverages which states:
 - (a) Persons twenty-one years of age or older may possess and/or consume alcoholic beverages within the privacy of their residence hall rooms or apartments. Washington State law provides severe penalties for the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages by persons under twenty-one years of age and for persons who furnish alcoholic beverages to minors. All University students should be aware of these laws and the possible consequences of violations.
 - (b) The University does not condone the consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors at functions sponsored by Central Washington University organizations. Organizations are held responsible for the conduct of their members at functions sponsored by the organization and for failure to comply with the Washington State law.
 - (c) The Campus Judicial Council may place on probation any organization or prohibit a specific campus social function when the consumption of alcoholic beverages has become a problem of concern to the University.
- (16) Violation of clearly stated proscriptions in any published rule or regulation promulgated by any official campus committee or commission or council acting within the scope of its authority.
- (17) Violation on campus of any state or federal law or violation of any state or federal law off-campus while participating in any University sponsored activity.

II. SERVING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ON CAMPUS:

Clubs and organizations are encouraged not to involve alcoholic beverages in any club function. If they choose to do so, they are urged to consider the effects and the responsibility they assume in making such decisions. If the members of the club or organization choose to involve themselves with alcoholic beverages, they must comply with the specified liquor guidelines.

All groups and organizations sponsoring social events held on the CWU campus and all recognized University groups holding events off campus which involve the serving and consumption of alcoholic beverages are obliged to comply with the following procedures and guidelines:

1. All events will be staffed by one or more certified Social Attendant(s) who has completed the required training course provided by the Washington State Liquor Control Board. The number of Social Attendants for a given event will be determined and subsequently hired through the University Substance Abuse Prevention Program.
2. If alcoholic beverages are to be served at a social event, the sponsoring University group is required to provide nonalcoholic beverages as well. The variety of alcoholic and nonalcoholic beverages available to be served shall be equal. In addition, the sponsoring group is encouraged to also provide food at the social event, in keeping with the intent of a banquet permit. Provision for serving such nonalcoholic beverages must be outlined on the University permit.
3. Personal identification will be checked to verify age and to prevent minors from consuming alcoholic beverages; identification will include a picture of the individual. Individuals whose age cannot be verified by identification provided to the Social Attendant will not be served beverages containing alcohol. Acceptance or rejection of identification is within the discretion of the Social Attendant.
4. If it is determined by the Social Attendant that an individual has consumed too much alcohol, she/he will no longer be served beverages containing alcohol.
5. If an individual becomes verbally and/or physically abusive, the Social Attendant will do any or all of the following:
 - a. Inform the coordinator of the event of the problem behavior;
 - b. Call the Student Union Building Night Manager;
 - c. Call Campus Security.
6. After the event, a written report will be completed by the Social Attendant which will describe any problems, concerns, or suggestions that pertain to the event. The report will be kept on file and reviewed if and when the sponsoring organization subsequently requests University space for social functions involving alcohol consumption. Documentation of problems or violations at previous social events may result in the group not being allowed an alcohol use permit in the future. In addition, any areas of concern will be provided, in writing, to the sponsoring organization after the event. A copy of this and any subsequent communication will be kept on file in the University Substance Abuse Prevention Program Office.
7. Sponsoring organizations should be aware of the consequences of failure to comply with the policy regarding the serving and consumption of alcoholic beverages. The individuals responsible for the event will be held accountable under all Washington state laws. Other possible consequences include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Sponsoring clubs and organizations may lose recognition as official university clubs and organizations.
 - b. Visiting groups may not be allowed to use University facilities in the future.
 - c. Other University groups may not be issued alcohol use permits in the future.

III. ADVERTISEMENT

There will be no marketing or advertising of alcoholic beverages on the Central Washington University campus, except as allowed by State law. The University name will not be associated with the advertising of alcoholic beverages.

IV. STUDENT ASSISTANCE AND INTERVENTION PROGRAMS

GENERAL STUDENT ASSISTANCE

In order to promote the health and well-being of our student population, the University employs a Student Assistance Program (SAP) when dealing with student alcohol and other drug abuse problems. Any student may take advantage of the SAP through self-referral or referral by other students, staff, or faculty.

The Student Assistance Program can assess the seriousness of a substance abuse problem, identify healthy alternatives for dealing with a problem, and make referrals to the appropriate services and/or treatment programs. The SAP also helps in the development of needed interventions with students, staff, and faculty. The SAP also coordinates case management/follow-up services for those in recovery and/or recently completing substance abuse treatment.

BEHAVIORAL PROBLEMS

When student behavioral problems associated with alcohol and other drug abuse occur, the University employs a team problem-solving approach. The Director of Housing, Director of Residence Living, and the Chief of Campus Police join the Assistant and Associate Vice Presidents for Student Affairs weekly to review Residence Living Incident Reports filed by Living Group Advisors (LGA's) and Managers, as well as Campus Police Reports which cover both on- and off-campus students. This problem-solving team then deals with student behavioral problems generally violative of the conduct proscriptions contained with the CWU Student Judicial Code (WAC 106120). It has been found that alcohol and other drug abuse is involved in the majority of student behavioral problems. The problem solving team works together to suggest intervention strategies which are considered to be the most appropriate and effective for eliminating specific negative student behaviors, especially those related to substance abuse. The team may suggest one of the following forms of intervention: (1) a meeting with members of the Residence Living student staff, (2) a meeting with one of the Residence Living or Housing Administrative staff, or (3) a meeting with the Prevention Program Coordinator or other full time, appropriate staff members.

Official hearings in the Vice President's Office are conducted when it becomes apparent to the problem-solving team that the initial and more informal forms of intervention with a student have been unsuccessful in positively modifying a student's behavior.

SANCTIONS

Official University action will be taken when violation of state law or University policy regarding alcohol and other illicit drugs occur. Repeated violations carry more significant consequences. The Vice President's Office may include in the sanction mandated contact with the Prevention Coordinator and/or direct referral for assessment through the Alcohol Drug Dependency Service (ADDS) in Kittitas County. If alcohol or other drug abuse is a related factor in the violation of other proscribed conduct the same mandate may be considered appropriate. Following are the sanctions available as they appear in the CWU Student Judicial Code:

1. Warning. Notice in writing that the student has violated University rules or regulations or has otherwise failed to meet the University's standard of conduct. Such warning will contain the statement that continuation or repetition of the specific conduct involved or other misconduct will normally result in one of the more serious disciplinary actions described below.
 2. Disciplinary Probation. Formal action specifying the conditions under which a student may continue to be a student at the University including limitation of specified activities, movement, or presence on the CWU campus. The conditions specified may be in effect for a period of time or for the duration of the student's attendance at the University.
 3. Restitution. An individual may be required to make restitution for damage or loss to University or other property and for injury to persons. Failure to make restitution will result in suspension for an indefinite period of time as set forth in subsection (4) below provided that a student may be reinstated upon payment.
 4. Suspension. Dismissal from the University and from status as a student for a stated period. The notice suspending the student will state in writing the term of the suspension and any condition(s) that must be met before readmission is granted. The student so suspended must demonstrate that the conditions for readmission have been met. There is to be no refund of fees for the quarter in which the action is taken, but fees paid in advance for a subsequent quarter are to be refunded.
 5. Deferred Suspension. Notice of suspension from the University with the provision that the student may remain enrolled contingent on meeting a specified condition. Not meeting the contingency shall immediately invoke the suspension for the period of time and under the conditions originally imposed.
 6. Expulsion. The surrender of all rights and privileges of membership in the University community and exclusion from the campus without any possibility for return.
- The Vice President's Office may invoke a Summary Suspension of any student from the University pending investigation, action or prosecution of charges of an alleged violation of proscribed conduct when there is reason to believe that their physical or emotional safety and well-being or the safety and well-being of other University community members, or the protection of property requires such suspension.
- When chronic alcohol or other drug use is involved, as is often the case when a student has been suspended or suspension is imminent, re-entry after a period of suspension or continuation in school on a deferred suspension may be contingent upon the student successfully completing an appropriate treatment program. The specific treatment would be recommended by the Coordinator of the CWU Substance Abuse Program and/or by members of the staff of ADDS. Generally, documentation from treatment counselors or program directors confirming successful completion of treatment and a positive prognosis for recovery are required for reinstatement or continuation in school.

V. POLICY IMPLEMENTATION AND APPLICATION

This policy applies to all members of the Central Washington University community at all events sponsored by the University and/or held in any University facility.

B. HEALTH HAZARDS AND REFERRAL SOURCES

In keeping with the Drug Free Schools and Counties Act, the University would like to provide you with the following information:

ALCOHOL CAN BE HAZARDOUS TO YOUR HEALTH

- Mouth and Esophagus - Alcohol irritates the delicate lining of the throat and esophagus. That's why it causes a burning sensation as it goes down.
- Liver - Alcohol inflames and destroys the cells of the liver. This condition prevents bile from being properly filtered through the liver. Jaundice develops, turning the whites of the eyes and the skin yellow.
- Brain - The most dramatic and noticed effect alcohol has is on the brain. It produces lack of coordination, confusion, disorientation, stupor, anesthesia, coma, and finally death.

MARIJUANA AND OTHER ILLEGAL DRUGS CAN BE HAZARDOUS TO YOUR HEALTH

- Eyes and Skin - Marijuana smokers may have inflamed, watery eyes, and develop wrinkled skin due to irritants present in smoke. Cocaine users have increased sensitivity to light, blurred vision, see "floaters", have double vision or image distortion.
- Heart - Smoking one marijuana joint may cause increases in heart rate and blood pressure by as much as 50 percent. Cocaine increases heart rate, and causes arteries to constrict. Restricted blood flow to the heart may cause a heart attack.
- Brain and Central Nervous System (CNS) - Marijuana use causes the synaptic cleft to enlarge which may result in impairment of speech, comprehension, memory, and sleep. Cocaine stimulates the CNS causing restlessness, tremors, and convulsions. Cocaine also alters normal electrical activity of the brain which can result in seizures or convulsions similar to epilepsy.

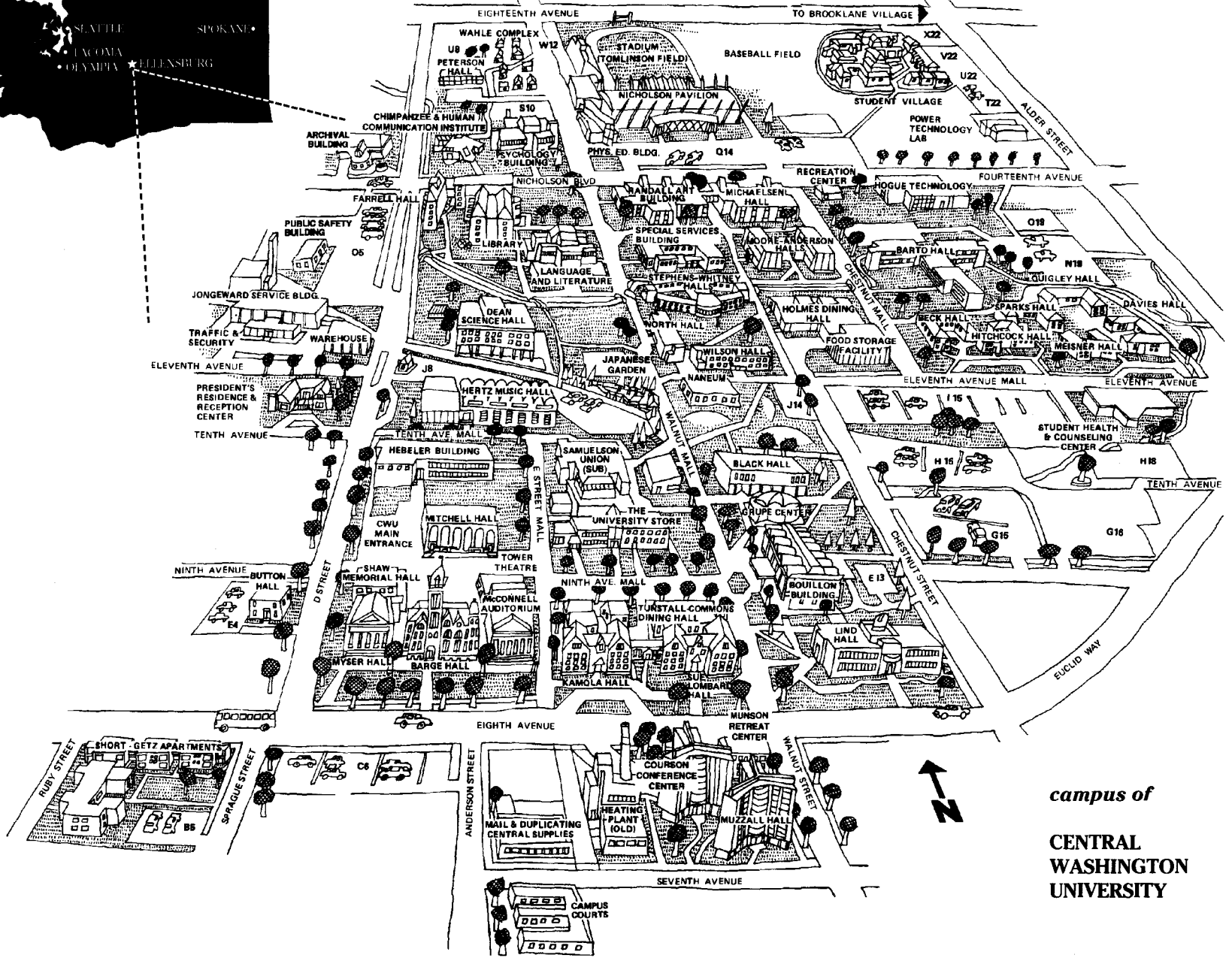
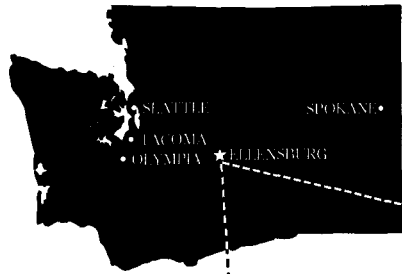
