APPROVAL OF MINUTES

MOTION NO. 6193: Susan Gould moved to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held October 28, 1988. Motion seconded by Harvey Vernier and passed.

REPORTS

Board of Trustees

There was no report from the Board at this time.

President

President Garrity introduced to the Board the new Director of Governmental and Corporate Relations, Richard G. (Dick) Thompson whose appointment was effective December 1, 1988. On behalf of the Board, the Chair welcomed Mr. Thompson.

President Garrity reported that approximately one year ago, Western Washington University approached Central regarding a proposal they had received from their sister-university in Japan - Asia University in Tokyo. Asia University was interested in having their students stay for a period of months in the United States. When it was learned that the number they wished to send was between 600 and 700 students, Western immediately approached us and others to accommodate some of these students. Dr. Donald Schliesman, Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Dr. Dieter Romboy, Director of International Programs, and Dr. Dale Otto of the Education Department and the English as a Second Language Program carried on the discussions at CWU. It was determined we would be willing to take on initially a program with a maximum of 150 students.

The program they wish to receive is instruction in English, so we will start with an English as a Second Language component and an American Society and Culture class. It will not involve instruction in any of our coursework and we will not evaluate credit for the program. Asia University will evaluate it themselves. The program has no impact concerning our enrollment cap.

We will have our initial group of 125-150 students arrive in the latter part of March, 1989. They will all be students from the faculty of Economics. The session will last six months. The students will live in our residence halls with American students. It is hoped that this will lead to interaction beneficial to both Japanese and American students.

Other aspects of the program were discussed.

Provost

Provost Edington reported on a matter that may come before the Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB) at its meeting December 14 in Spokane. Last spring, the HECB suggested to the various colleges and universities language having to do with proposed roles and missions of the individual institutions. More recently the HECB staff has indicated they wish to consider those statements at the December meeting, especially for the regional comprehensive institutions. Central Washington University (CWU) and Eastern Washington University (EWU) have urged the HECB to delay consideration of this matter so that we could undertake broad discussions on campus and receive input from the Board of Trustees on this important matter of the role and mission statement for it defines what we do as a university and what takes place on our campus. So far the HECB staff has refused to delay action on the subject, but we are asking the Chair and the HECB members to understand our view on this and delay to an unspecified time in the future a discussion of the role and mission statement of Central Washington University. As of this meeting time, no response had been received from the Chair of the HECB.

Discussion of the issue ensued. In response to questions from the Trustees, Provost Edington acknowledged that Central presently has a role and mission statement and said that now there appears to be two items of interest to the HECB: 1) a definition of the regional service area and, 2) the matter of programmatic areas of emphasis that institutions might be involved in. Answering the question of the use to which the role and missions statement might be put, Provost Edington's assumption was that the HECB might make decisions regarding proposals from institutions in the state regarding branch campuses or centers.

Faculty Senate Chair

The Senate Chair had no report at this time but echoed the concern expressed regarding the fact that the faculty has not had input on any proposed revisions to the present University role and mission statement.

Student Government

No report at this time.

Association of Administrators

Nancy Howard, Chair of the Association of Administrators, reported that the Association had met since the last Board meeting and that she had shared the following information with the President: the Association has recommended that in order to examine an alternative to the present Administrative, Civil Service Exempt salary administration system, a committee be appointed to examine the issue and develop a system mutually acceptable to the President and the Association. They will begin by discussing a draft of an alternative system prepared by Vice President Courtney Jones in the near future.

Status of Reserves and Budget Changes

Vice President Courtney Jones presented the report of status of reserves and budget changes as of November 18, 1988. There were no questions.

The Board received with no questions the report of capital projects under \$100,000 from Vice President Jones.

This report had been requested by the Board at an earlier meeting. Dr. Greg Trujillo, Associate Provost for Institutional Research and Assessment prepared the report and was present to review the methodology employed. The Trustees discussed the information and expressed their thanks for the data.

Report on the repair of Courson Hall

Wendell Hill, Director of Auxiliary Services, reviewed the corrosion problem in Courson Hall which led to the closure of facility so that repairs could be accomplished. Discussion ensued. It is estimated the hall will reopen by the first of February, 1989.

COMMUNICATIONS

There were no communications to be acknowledged.

OLD BUSINESS

Salary increases in varying amounts have been authorized and funded by the Legislature effective January 1, 1989.

Salary increase - January 1, 1989 - Administrative exempt

Vice President Courtney Jones stated that the Legislature has funded and approved a salary increase as of January 1, 1989 and recommended the increase be approved by the Board as presented.

MOTION NO. 6194: Mr. Pitts moved, seconded by Mrs. Gould, that the salaries of administrative exempt personnel be increased 3% effective January 1, 1989, except for librarians and faculty counselors (who have faculty status), and academic deans. Motion carried.

Salary increase - January 1, 1989 - Graduate Assistants

Provost Edington reviewed the proposed increase for Graduate Assistants.

MOTION NO. 6195: Mr. Pitts moved, seconded by Mr. Tollefson, that the salaries of Graduate Assistants be increased 7.6% effective January 1, 1989. Motion carried.

Salary increase - January 1, 1989 - Academic Deans

Provost Edington presented the recommendation for the salary increase for the Academic Deans.

MOTION NO. 6196: Mrs. Gould moved, seconded by Mr. Tollefson, that there be a scale adjustment of 4.30% for all academic Deans plus a merit adjustment as recommended for each individual. Motion carried.

President Garrity pointed out that it has been the practice over the years that an adjustment be made to the faculty status of administrators with faculty rank so that they do not simply return to the faculty scale they started from if they were to leave administration and go back to the faculty. No costs are incurred.

Salary increase - January 1, 1989 - Faculty

Graham Tollefson, Chair of the Board of Trustees Budget Committee, presented the unanimous recommendation for the proposed distribution of the January 1, 1989 faculty salary increase provided by the legislature as formulated in the meeting of the Board Budget Committee and representatives from the Faculty Senate.

MOTION NO. 6197: Mr. Tollefson moved, seconded by Mr. Pitts, that the salaries of faculty, including librarians, faculty counselors, and certain part-time faculty, be adjusted effective January 1, 1989 as follows: 1) a scale adjustment of 4.30% for all faculty (compounded); 2) one professional growth step to be funded, excluding first-year and 1988-89 promoted faculty; 3) full merit list to be funded. Motion carried.

NEW BUSINESS

Distinguished Civil Service Recognition

Eugene Schnabel, Custodian in the Physical Plant Department, has retired from Central Washington University after 18 years of service. Mr. Schnabel contributed significantly to the success of the Custodial Department. In appreciation of his dedicated service to the University, it was recommended he be granted Distinguished Civil Service status.

MOTION NO. 6198: Trustee Gould moved, seconded by Trustee Pitts, that in recognition of his 18 years of dedicated service to Central Washington University, Rugene Schnabel be awarded Distinguished Civil Service status effective on the date of his retirement, October 11, 1988. Motion carried.

Faculty Retirements

Dean Robert H. Brown presented retirement statements and emeritus recommendations for faculty retiring from the College of Letters, Arts and Sciences as follows:

Dr. Frank Nelson, Associate Professor of Psychology, is retiring after 22 years of service to the University. He has contributed greatly to the programs of his department through teaching both on and off campus, advisement, research, and participation on committees. Dr. Nelson is recommended for retirement at the end of fall quarter 1988 with the status of Emeritus Professor of Psychology.

Dr. Anthony Canedo, Professor of English, will retire from the CVU faculty at the end of this year after 26 years of service. Dr. Canedo has done a fine job in many aspects of the academic profession; teacher, Acting Dean, Assistant Vice President, Department Chair, and Associate Dean and was recently named Distinguished University Professor for Teaching. Dr. Canedo is recommended for retirement at the end of the 1988-89 academic year with the status of Emeritus Professor of English.

Dr. Philip C. Dumas, Professor of Biology, plans to enter phased retirement at the end of this year after 23 years as a member of the CWU faculty. In addition to his teaching duties, Dr. Dumas has

served as Department Chair and has successfully participated in his field of scholarship through research, publications, and invited contributions to important books. Additionally, he has served on a great many committees and helped to achieve many special assignments. Dr. Dumas is recommended for phased retirement effective at the end of the 1988-89 academic year with the status of Emeritus Professor of Biology.

Dr. Rdward J. Harrington, Professor of Biology, will retire from the faculty of CWU at the end of this academic year. Since 1970, Dr. Harrington not only fulfilled his demanding role of Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, but additionally managed significant contributions to the Department of Biological Sciences. Dr. Harrington is recommended for retirement at the end of the 1988-89 academic year with the status of Emeritus Professor of Biology and Emeritus Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.

MOTION NO. 6200: Trustee Gould moved, seconded by Trustee Pitts, that the Board accept the foregoing recommendations for retirement with emeritus status. Motion carried.

Dr. Joan Mosebar, Assistant Dean, School of Business and Economics, reviewed the 22-year career of Dr. Lawrence A. Danton, Professor of Economics and Business Administration at Central Washington University, who has requested phased retirement effective at the end of the 1988-89 academic year. Dr. Danton's many contributions to the University and to the School of Business and Economics are well documented and without peer. Of particular note is his leadership as Dean during the time the School undertook its successful move toward accreditation. Dr. Danton is recommended for phased retirement with the status of Emeritus Professor of Business Administration and Economics effective at the end of the 1988-89 academic year.

MOTION NO. 6201: Trustee Pitts moved, seconded by Trustee Tollefson, that the request of Dr. Lawrence A. Danton, Professor of Business Administration and Economics, to enter phased retirement at the end of the 1988-89 academic year be approved and that he be accorded the status of Emeritus Professor of Business Administration and Economics. Motion carried.

Fees, effective Winter Quarter, 1989

President Garrity reviewed the history of fees charged at CWU and said that the institution has been very conservative in its approach. The fees collected are held for a specific use such as consumable materials, equipment repair, etc. The present request is for approval to charge three new fees: 1) a lab fee of \$10 per student per quarter for expendable materials used in MET 212 - Structural Systems II, Basic; 2) a fee of \$24 per student per quarter for use of simulator in FLT 244 - Single Engine Simulator, and FLT 245 - Single Engine Simulator, Advanced; and 3) a fee of \$48 per student per quarter for use of multiengine simulator

in FLT 344 - Basic Multiengine Simulator, and FLT 345 - Advanced Multiengine Simulator.

MOTION NO. 6202: Mr. Pitts moved, seconded by Mr. Tollefson, that the Board of Trustees approve the implementation of, 1) a lab fee of \$10 per student per quarter for expendable materials used in MET 212 - Structural Systems II, Basic; 2) a fee of \$24 per student per quarter for use of simulator in FLT 244 - Single Engine Simulator, and FLT 245 - Single Engine Simulator, Advanced; and 3) a fee of \$48 per student per quarter for use of multiengine simulator in FLT 344-Basic Multiengine Simulator, and FLT 345 - Advanced Multiengine Simulator, effective Winter Quarter, 1989.

Answering questions from the Board, President Garrity said that if students are receiving financial aid, the fees automatically become part of their package and they receive assistance to pay them, but there is no such assistance for students not on financial aid. However, the simulator fees are relatively low in comparison to fees charged at other institutions.
