CONSENT AGENDA

Discussion concerning the upgrade of the underground storage tanks and the proposed development of a van pool ensued. Vice President Courtney Jones and Director John Holman, Facilities Management, explained that the university has to store some volatile fuels and we must upgrade our underground tanks to bring them into compliance with state and federal standards defined by law. Both the fuels and the ground around the present tanks have been tested and some tanks have already been removed. It is now time to do further improvements.

With reference to the van pool proposal, Mr. Jones stated Facilities Management had been approached by a number of people to provide a van pool program to serve students, faculty, and staff in the Ellensburg, Cle Elum, and Yakima trip areas. The purpose of this service would be to provide group transportation to Central Washington University and decrease commuter trips, thereby improving the accessibility to campus parking at the University, as well as making a commitment to improving the environment. The service would be totally self-funded and fully insured. Other elements of the proposed service were reviewed and concerns answered to the satisfaction of the Board.

<u>Vice President for Student Affairs</u> - no formal report, but shared an item of interest with reference to the football team beginning the playoffs Saturday, November 20, 1993. The Board wished them well.

<u>Vice President for University Advancement</u> - Vice President Young reviewed the organization of the University Advancement area. An up-to-date organization chart was handed to the trustees along with an explanation of the various functions. Mr. Young said that he looks forward to hiring a Director of Development early in January. The major role of this position is fund-raising.

Faculty Senate - no report.

Board of Directors, Associated Students of Central Washington University

Kris Henry, President of the Board of Directors, Associated Students of Central Washington University (BOD, ASCWU) gave two handouts to the Board of Trustees: <u>The Olympia Connection</u>, published every two to three weeks which is intended to keep Central students informed of legislative matters and happenings in Olympia, and the <u>Grand Central Newsletter</u>, an ongoing source of information on everyday events in and around Central.

The BOD is working on proposed revisions to the ASCWU Constitution which should be ready to be brought to the Board of Trustees in February.

Association of Administrators

On behalf of Ms. Carolyn Wells, Chair of the Association of Administrators, Dr. James G. Pappas, Academic Services, said that a meeting had been held and an executive board elected. The Association members are in the process of reviewing their bylaws and are involved in a variety of professional development activities.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

No reports or recommendations at this time.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS

President Nelson told the Trustees that the Governor has requested a 2% cut recommendation from each state agency. He gave the Board copies of the CWU response to the Governor and said that if we have to execute such a cut, it will actually be 4% rather than 2% and explained the rationale. The president reviewed the cuts already suffered by the University in the last two years - 3.1% in 1991-93, and 4.7% in this biennium. Further cuts cannot be taken without affecting enrollment and programs. The President handed to the trustees copies of a letter to the Governor signed by the presidents of all six of the 4-year public institutions in the state of Washington regarding the reduction plan request, urging a higher priority be given higher education. The group also asked the Governor to continue to provide the measure of management flexibility which presently exists. Discussion ensued.

Conversion of certain classified staff to administrative, civil service exempt status

President Nelson presented the subject report. The regular session of the 53rd legislature of the state of Washington passed ESHB 1509 which defined certain additional positions as exempt from classified service. There is some variation among institutions with the research universities making a broader interpretation of the exemption criteria, but Central, Eastern, Western, and The Evergreen State College are close in their application of the legislation. The following classified staff were converted to administrative, civil service exempt status:

Changes in the Exempt Employees' Code of Personnel Policy and Procedure as a result of the implementation of ESHB 1509

As a result of the passage of ESHB 1509 that defined certain additional positions as exempt from classified service, it is necessary to clarify certain parts of the Exempt Employees' Code.

MOTION NO. 93-27: Trustee Woods moved, seconded by trustee Chaplin, that the Central Washington University Exempt Employees' Code of Personnel Policy and Procedure be amended as follows:

 That the following new section No. 2.0312 be added to the section titled Continuing Contracts;

"For purposes of this section (2.03), all employees exempted from classified service on or after July 1, 1993, pursuant to EHSB 1509 shall be credited with time in service equal to the time served in their last Higher Education Personnel Board classification at Central Washington University."

2) That the following new section No. 3.082 be added to the section titled Notice of Nonrenewal or Termination (not for cause) for Regular Appointments:

"For purposes of this section (2.03), all employees exempted from classified service on or after July 1, 1993, pursuant to EHSB 1509 shall be credited with time in service equal to the time served in their last Higher Education Personnel Board classification at Central Washington University."

 That the following new section No. 4.142 be added to the section titled Short-Term Disability Leave:

"For purposes of this section (4.14), all employees exempted from classified service on or after July 1, 1993, pursuant to ESHB 1509 shall be credited with time in service equal to the time served in their last Higher Education Personnel Board classification at Central Washington University."

On call for the question, the motion carried.

Extension of institutional membership in TIAA/CREF retirement plan to administrative, civil service exempt personnel

Prior to May 1974, all administrative exempt employees were eligible to participate in the institution retirement plan for Central's faculty and other eligible employees under the provisions of RCW 28B.10.400. However, effective May 6, 1974, the Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) law was changed. It defined most nonacademic employees as "classified" for the purposes of retirement eligibility and required that such employees hired thereafter participate in PERS. In 1991, the law was decodified. In its place, RCW 41.40.108 was enacted which restates that all classified employees must be members of PERS but no longer defines the word "classified."

Positions held by Central's administrative exempt employees are specifically excluded from Chapter 41.06 which governs classified employment. For this reason and because there is no longer any language in the statutes requiring PERS participation for this group of employees, it is recommended that new hires be required to participate, and current employees be allowed to begin participation in the CWU Retirement Plan.

Trustees inquired as to the potential fiscal impact on the university and were told that a

projection for 1994 shows a net savings.

MOTION NO. 93-28: Trustee Pitts moved, seconded by Trustee Woods, that the Central Washington University retirement rules and regulations for faculty and administrative exempt employees be amended to extend membership in the institutional retirement plan to nonacademic exempt employees. The CWU retirement rules will be amended to support this action and brought back to the Board of Trustees for formal adoption at the February, 1994, meeting of the Board. Motion carried.

Changes to the Faculty Code of Personnel Policy and Procedure. Section 9.90 - Retirement (removal of mandatory retirement age) and 9.92 - Phased Retirement for Faculty: Proposed changes to Part 2-2.18.6 of the University Policies Manual (Faculty and Civil Service Exempt Retirement Rules and Regulations - Retirement Age)

Amendments to the Federal Age Discrimination in Employment Act, signed into law in 1986, and effective January 1. 1987, eliminated mandatory retirement at any age except for tenured faculty members at an institution of higher education. This special rule expires December 31, 1993, and it will be unlawful to require retirement of any employee beginning January 1, 1994. Trustees questioned the financial impact of phased retirement for faculty and were told the average length of service in this capacity is three to four years. Further discussion ensued. President Nelson agreed to provide the Board with a statistical analysis of the phased retirements.

MOTION NO. 93-29: Trustee Pitts moved, seconded by Trustee Chaplin, that effective January 1, 1994, the Central Washington University Faculty and Civil Service Exempt Retirement Rules and Regulations, Part 2-2.18.6 of the University <u>Policies Manual</u>, be amended as follows:

2-2.18.6.1 Retirement Age.

2-2.18.6.1

2) Mandatory Retirement Age: Effective September 1, 1979, the mandatory retirement age shall be 70.

2-2.18.6.2 Employment after Mandatory Retirement Age: See appropriate sections in the Faculty Code of Personnel Policy and Procedure and Faculty Handbook for current rules regarding employment beyond the mandatory retirement age after retirement.

2-2.18.6.3 Effective Date of Retirement:

1) Faculty and civil service exempt personnel shall be retired from the university on August 31 following the birthday on which they reach the mandatory retirement age.

2) The effective date of retirement shall be the first day of the month following the month in which the employee separates from university service. [New section approved 6/18/85, motion no. 5903.]

and that the Faculty Code, Parts 9.90 A, and 9.92 A and D be changed as follows:

9.90 Retirement

A. Faculty members shall be automatically retired from permanent fulltime university employment as of August 31 following the birthday on which the age of seventy (70) is reached. If a faculty member's birthday is August 31, he/she shall be retired on the date that he/she

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birthday is August 31, he/she shall be retired on the date that he/she reaches ago 70. There is no mandatory retirement age for faculty members after December 31, 1993.

9.92 Phased Retirement for Faculty

Central Washington University offers phased retirement to eligible faculty.

- A. After January 1, 1994, A at, or after, age 62 and until age 70, as outlined in section 9.80A of this code faculty members may voluntarily elect to reduce their service to the university by entering a phased retirement program. The phased retirement period shall continue for a maximum of eight (8) years. Under phased retirement. Flaculty members may continue teaching up to 40% of an academic year teaching load in their respective disciplines. For this policy, 40% is considered to be 15 contact hours per academic year. Any Continuing Education course load is not considered to be part of the 40% of an academic load. [BT Motion 91-39, 6/14/91]
- D. The decision to teach part time (as noted in "A" above), once made, shall continue for each ratireo to age 70, or until such time as the ratireo declines to continue. A decision by the ratireo to discontinue the program at any point shall be final. Phased ratirement status, once chosen by the faculty member, shall continue for a maximum of eight (8) years or until the faculty members fails to exercise the option to continue in this status, as provided in Section 9.92E of this Faculty Code. After the faculty member has served eight years of phased ratirement or has failed to exercise the option to continue in this status, the faculty member has served eight years of phased ratirement, whichever comes first, the faculty member will be fully ratired from the university. Full employment status with the university cannot be reinstated once the faculty member has elected phased ratirement.

RESOLUTION NO. 93-3

A resolution of the Board of Trustees of Central Washington University designating certain persons as authorities for contracting for, purchasing, and leasing services and personalty and delegating the Board of Trustees' powers and duties of such contracting for, purchasing, and leasing under RCW 28B.35.120, subsections (6), (7), and (9), to certain designated persons.

WHEREAS, effective May 6, 1971, and as still in effect, RCW 28B.10.528 reads as follows:

"The governing boards of institutions of higher education shall have power, when exercised by resolution, to delegate to the President or his designee, of their respective university or college, any of the powers, and duties vested in or imposed upon such governing board by law. Delegated powers and duties may be exercised in the name of the respective governing boards";

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, That under the provisions of RCW 28B.10.528, the Board of Trustees of Central Washington University designates that person now holding or subsequently appointed to the position of President of Central Washington University as the authority for contracting for, purchasing, and leasing services and personalty for current operations of Central Washington University when such contracting, purchasing and leasing are in accordance with budgets approved by the Board of Trustees, and delegates to that person now holding or subsequently appointed to the position of President of Central Washington University by the Legislature in RCW 28B.35.120, Subsections (6), (7), and (9), to so contract purchase, and lease; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED. That under the provisions of RCW 28B.10.528, the Board of Trustees of Central Washington University designates those persons now holding or subsequently appointed to any of the presidentially designated positions set out below as authorities for contracting for, purchasing and leasing services and personalty for current operations of Central Washington University when such contracting, purchasing, and leasing are in accordance with budgets approved by the Board of Trustees, and delegates to those persons now holding or subsequently appointed to any of the presidentially designated positions set out below the powers and duties vested in or imposed upon the Board of Trustees of Central Washington University by RCW 28B.35.120, subsections (6), (7), and (9), to so contract, purchase and lease, and all actions taken pursuant to this resolution may be subject to the approval or disapproval of the President of Central Washington University.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the following list shall constitute the presidentially designated positions to which the designation as authorities for contracting for, purchasing, and leasing services and personalty for current operations of Central Washington University and the delegations of powers and duties as set forth in this resolution are made:

FOR ALL UNIVERSITY CONTRACTS:

President

Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs Special Assistant to the President Business Manager

FOR ALL PURCHASED GOODS, SERVICE CONTRACTS, AND LEASES:

Controller

Director, Business Services & Contracts and at the Director's discretion:

Buyer II up to the amount where the State requires formal written bids. Buyer I up to one-half the amount where the state requires formal written bids.

FOR SELECTED CONTRACTING ACTIVITIES AS SET FORTH BELOW:

Vice President of Student Affairs

All contracts as may be required for delivery of student services or for the operation of the Student Affairs Division.

Dean, Graduate Studies and Research

All contracts as may be required to further University research or academic development.

Dean, Library Services

Limited to purchasing and contracting for the acquisition of library books, films, pre-recorded tapes audio and video), other audio records, library subscriptions and periodicals, and delivery of library services to students.

Dean of Continuing Education

Limited to contracting for personnel and other services required to conduct the Central Washington University Continuing Education Programs.

Director of Student Activities

Limited to contracting for entertainment activities for the Student Union and the Associated Students of Central.

Director of Auxiliary Services

Limited to contracting between Central Washington University and occupants, or potential occupants of university housing and to purchasing and contracting for items for resale through the University Store.

Manager, University Store

Limited to purchasing and contracting for items for resale through the University Store.

Director of Athletics

Limited to contracting with other colleges and universities for "Athletic Contest Agreements" when such do not require expenditure of Central Washington University funds, and to contracting for officiating services requiring expenditure of funds in amounts not to exceed \$500.00 per contract. This authority shall include the responsibility for maintaining files of such agreements in the Department of Physical Education in lieu of submission to the CWU central file of contracts.

Director of Information Resources

Limited to contracting for computing and voice/data equipment, software, and supportive services in accordance with the policies, procedures, and Washington Administrative Codes established by the State Information Resources Board pursuant to Chapter 43.105 RCW.

OTHER SIGNATURE AUTHORITIES:

For contracts for services only (does not include contracting to purchase goods) in amounts less than \$2,500.00, and which are written within the respective appropriate areas as designated below. Also delegated to the specified positions are authorities to ratify "after-the fact" purchase requisitions for both goods and services when such ratification is found by the Principal Budget Administrator to be in the best interest of Central Washington University, and when ratification will not violate Washington State Purchasing Law by circumventing competitive bidding requirements, the receipt of competitive quotations, or the Minority and Women's Business Enterprises purchasing law: Chapter 39.19 RCW and Chapter 326 WAC.

Dean, College of Letters, Arts and Sciences Dean of Academic Services Dean, School of Business and Economics Dean of Continuing Education Dean, Graduate Studies & Research Dean, Library Services Dean, School of Professional Studies Dean of Institutional Research Director, Information Resources

PROVIDED, that the President may, at any time, withdraw the presidential designation from any one of the aforementioned presidentially designated positions and shall notify the Board at its next regular meeting of such action; provided, furdier, that any additions to the aforementioned list of presidentially designated positions must be approved by resolution of the Board of Trustees of Central Washington University.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED. That all actions taken pursuant to this delegation of powers and duties may be exercised in the name of the Board of Trustees of Central Washington University.
