# Approval of Minutes

### **Action Items**

# **Proposed Academic Program Offerings**

Costs of providing programs to nontraditional students at university centers were discussed. Enrollment of nontraditional students is increasing.

**Motion 98:02:** Mr. Woods moved, seconded by Mr. Sells, that existing bachelor of science programs in Accounting and Business Administration be offered at the CWU Wenatchee Center. Motion carried.

### Proposed Summer Session Budget/Fee

The following Summer Session 1998 fees were proposed: undergraduate tuition - \$80 per credit; postbaccalaureate tuition - \$90 per credit; graduate tuition - \$115 per credit; application fee - \$48 per student. Facilities costs are not included as they are part of the regular yearly operational costs. The proposed fees are 3 percent higher than last year's fees. Fixed cost distributions for Summer 1998 total \$732,595.

Motion 98:03: Mr. Woods moved, seconded by Mr. Glover, that the proposed Summer Session Budget be approved. Motion carried.

### Revised Collection Policies for CWU

Recent legislation allows Central Washington University to add collection costs to debts owed the university. Collection agencies under contract with the university may add reasonable collection fees, payable by the debtor, for the collection of debt. The bill specifies that the amount to be paid for collection services shall be determined by the government unit and its collection agency.

**Motion 98:04:** Mr. Glover moved, seconded by Mr. Sells, that the university's collection policies, revised pursuant to Senate Bill 5827, effective July 27, 1997 (RCW 19.16.500), be accepted. Motion carried.

### **Executive Session**

### Indemnification of Employee

Ms. Chaplin requested an executive session for ten minutes from 1:20 p.m. until 1:30 p.m under the authority of RCW 42,30.110(I) to discuss . . . litigation . . . to which . . . a member acting in an official capacity is . . . a party. The meeting reconvened at 1:22 p.m.

**Motion 98:05:** Trustee Sells moved, seconded by Trustee Woods, that the request for defense of Dr. Lin Douglas in the civil action No. 97-2-00473-2, Donahoe vs. CWU and Douglas, Kittitas County Superior Court be approved. Motion carried.

### **Board of Trustees Discussion and Action Items**

Change of Meeting Date

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**Motion 98:06:** Trustee Sánchez moved, seconded by Trustee Sells, that the Board of Trustees meet Monday, May 18, 1998 rather than Friday, May 15, 1998 as previously approved. Motion carried.

### Presentation of Theme 5

Ms. Rhonda Hilyer , a consultant with Agreement Dynamics in Seattle, presented a brief snapshot of her December 11, 1997 collaborative bargaining workshop. Her remarks focused on determining interests of all participants rather than looking for solutions from fixed positions. Joint decision making involving compromise and collaboration is preferable to coercion. Shared interests should be enumerated. Critical success factors for positive labor relations were reviewed. Creative thinking and an established time frame would benefit the process.

Dr. Gregory Patera , Association of Governing Boards consultant and board chair at Ferris State University (Michigan), reviewed the faculty collective bargaining experience at Ferris State. Ferris State is a rural institution with a student population of 9,500 and a staff of 1,220. Tuition and salaries are set by the Board of Trustees with a recommendation from the president. During a general overview of Ferris State and its twenty-four year history of collective bargaining, Dr. Patera stated that Ferris State experienced disruptive job actions (strikes) and litigation. Legal fees top \$500,000 per year for two in-house attorneys. Students were affected by faculty strikes and were actively involved in seeking solutions.

### Campus Input on Theme 2 Presentation

- What Theme 2 configuration will make CWU competitive? Balance Ellensburg and centers/distance learning. Consider programmatic focus, faculty/staff and other key assets, and cost. Consider possible centers in Okanogan (cooperative agreement with WVC) and Grandview. Maintain highly selected graduate

### programs.

Written input from the Associated Students of Central Washington University (ASCWU), Association of Exempt Administrative and Professional Staff (AEAPS), and four individuals was included in agenda materials.

ASCWU vice presidents Greg Watt and Amy Russell presented student input on Board Theme 2 emphasizing that CWU centers support the main campus in meeting the needs of placebound and timebound students. Faculty advising and peer mentoring needs were also discussed. The students were commended for their timely response.

Jen Gray, Chair of AEAPS, indicated that exempt staff support the information presented in the discussion of Theme 2. They also support the charge of the University Marketing Committee to help define what will make Central competitive and encouraged committee members to seek a balance between marketing research and marketing promotion.

Mrs. Chaplin indicated that the Board of Trustees plans to review input on each of the themes, examine interests and issues, then synthesize that information at the board retreat in July. Discussions of the long-term future of the university would occur in the fall.

It was suggested that the board could benefit from discussion with Eastern Washington University trustees concerning their experience with faculty collective bargaining. It is important that the Board of Trustees and the United Faculty of Central understand each others interests. Ken Gamon, Copresident of the United Faculty of Central, indicated that the UFC is interested in conversations with the Faculty Senate and the Board of Trustees to define interests and needs.

To facilitate discussion, Mrs. Chaplin appointed a small subcommittee of the Board to examine interests and determine how the Board can receive the information they need to understand the faculty collective bargaining issue. The subcommittee includes Dr. Nelson, Trustees Chaplin and Sells, Rob Perkins, Ken Gamon, and a student selected by the ASCWU Board of Directors president. Establishment of the subcommittee and support for its charge were accepted by consensus.

# President's Report Items

### Status of University Employment (Response to Theme 2)

In response to a question from Mike Sells, Dr. Nelson presented a report on university employment, including administrators, faculty, and classified staff, as of November 15, 1997.

# **Budget Priorities for FY 98**

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Dr. Nelson reviewed the following elements which will impact university operational budget planning for 1998-99: possible enrollment shortfall, 2 percent salary increase for faculty and exempt staff, support for the Academic Support System Project (ASSP), and accountability reserves. Planning priorities for the four university divisions were submitted for review.

### NASC Accreditation Process: Progress Report

Dr. Libby Street, executive director of the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges (NASC) accreditation process at Central Washington University, submitted a report on our progress. Dr. Street, Phil Backlund (Chair of the Strategic Planning Committee), and Connie Roberts (Director of Assessment) were applauded for their recent work with the Commission on Colleges of NASC. They presented information at a workshop detailing how we are integrating accreditation requirements into the strategic planning process.

### Strategic Plan Update

In his written report, Phil Backlund stated that the committee is integrating the strategic planning and accreditation processes into a long-term structure for future accreditations. In addition, the board themes are being integrated into the plan, the planning process is being strengthened overall, and planners will use electronic templates for the first time. The committee plans to produce a brief executive summary this year designed for external audiences with a second, more inclusive plan to incorporate goals, objectives, and accomplishments of the various units of the university.

# **Campus Master Plan Status Report**

In his briefing report, Duane Skeen, Chair of the Campus Master Plan Committee, outlined a number of issues of public concern in response to an environment impact assessment of our campus master plan. Due to unanticipated time constraints, presentation of the completed Campus Master Plan will occur October 1998.

### Campus Climate Response - Update

In this second presidential response to the 1996 Campus Climate Report, activities and programs were outlined that have been undertaken within the past year in each university division to address issues and concerns raised in the report.

# Administrative Exempt Salary Plan Guidelines Revision Report

The guidelines and process by which salary levels may be established for CWU administrative exempt positions were presented. The guidelines were revised with input from the Association of Exempt Administrative and Professional Staff.

### Other Reports

### Academic Affairs

Provost Dauwalder attended the Higher Education Coordinating Board (HECB) meeting in Spokane earlier in the day and briefed the trustees on those proceedings. The HECB made several decisions at the meeting which impact Washington State University and Eastern Washington University.

In a brief review of his written report, Dr. Dauwalder stated that Warren Street, Professor of Psychology, has been appointed associate dean of the College of the Sciences and Louise Baxter, Assistant Professor of Biological Sciences, has been appointed director of the Center for Teaching and Learning. He also reviewed academic programs which have been submitted to the HECB for approval.

### **Business and Financial Affairs**

### Student Housing/SUB Potential Bond Acquisition

Vice President Nasser presented detailed information on potential bond acquisition for student housing and the Samuelson Union Building (SUB). Facility concerns, current funding, options, strategies, and possible cost implications for students were reviewed. Plans for a student referendum to help pay for revitalization of the SUB were discussed.

# Financial Report 1996-97

The audited FY 1996-97 Financial Report for Central Washington University was presented for the information of the Board of Trustees.

### **Endowment Investment Report**

Mr. Nasser presented recommendations from the Central Washington University Foundation Investment Committee for the investment of private gifts and grants given to CWU for the period ending December 31, 1997. Total fund balance was \$1,770,369.81.

# Purchase of Campus Academic Support System Software Components

Details of the purchase of Campus Academic Support System Software Components were reviewed. Implementation of the systems is expected to occur over a three-year period.

Based upon the recommendations of the assigned university project managers and with delegated authority from the Board of Trustees, the following projects were accepted by the Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs as complete:

### **Major and Minor Capital Report**

Information on capital, noncapital, and Facilities Management maintenance projects was presented.

### **Deferred Maintenance Report**

Facilities Management is performing a complete survey of deferred maintenance needs for all facilities at Central Washington University. A database will be developed from the facility inventory surveys which will facilitate better informed decision making.

### **Energy Services Projects**

The CWU Facilities Management Department has entered into an interlocal agreement with the State Department of General Administration to use a program whereby utility improvement projects are financed from guaranteed energy savings. The central steam plant and chilled water plants are targeted for improvements in this agreement.

### Student Affairs

Dr. Shumate reviewed proposed recommendations for the FY 98 budget for the Housing and Dining Fund. Proposed rate increases to cover inflation and comparisons of actual costs were included. Formal review and approval will occur April 10.

### **University Advancement**

Mr. Young's report included information on development progress, alumni relations activities, and a legislative relations update. Monday, February 16, 1998 is Central's legislative day in Olympia.

### **Faculty Senate**

Dr. Perkins presented information on the following items: a revised administrator's survey which will be distributed in April, reorganization of the Senate Executive Committee to include a new chair-elect position, roles and

responsibilities of the United Faculty of Central and the Faculty Senate, reexamination of the faculty adjustment scale, and a faculty equity pay study.

# Board of Directors, Associated Students of Central Washington University

President Amy Gillespie stated that the ASCWU Board of Directors recently reaffirmed their commitment to diversity by resolution, their strategic plan is nearly complete, and several students will participate in Central's legislative day in Olympia February 16.
