Introductions

Provost Dauwalder introduced retiring Professor of Anthropology James Alexander and reviewed his 36-year career at Central. Dr. Alexander shared his commitment to "stimulating discontent" as a way to motivate university discourse.

Board Chair Report

Mrs. Chaplin thanked Kari Taylor, President of the Employee Council, for the staff buttons distributed to the trustees. She also commended university staff for their exemplary efforts to serve students. Dr. McIntyre and

Board Committee Reports

Academic Affairs - Nadine Romero, Chair

Accreditation issues and faculty scholarship were two issues discussed by the Academic Affairs Committee. Ms. Romero praised History Professor James Cook, author of *Oversees Chinese, for sharing his research so effectively with the committee. Program review, budget concerns, and a market study were among other issues considered by the group.

Resource Development - Judy Yu, Chair

Budget issues are a primary focus of this committee. Committee members will examine the biennial budgeting process and have requested a monthly reporting process that will show the status of specific areas. Summer session issues, including fee recommendations, were discussed. At the February 9 committee meeting, the group will review budget development and examine enrollment impacts of tuition adjustments. The board will convene a special meeting in January to discuss budget issues.

Rich Corona reported that the draft gas contract with the City of Ellensburg should be completed by February. The new contract provides increased flexibility and reduces costs.

Student Affairs - Ken Martin, Chair

Members of the Student Affairs and Enrollment Management problem-solving group briefed the committee. The group is organized to help students solve crisis issues. Enrollment and safety issues were also reviewed.

President's Report

Legislative Issues

Dr. McIntyre reviewed progress on the search for a government relations director. Due to the pressure of legislative activities and our need for representation in Olympia, we have retained Linda Schactler from Brine/Flynn Public Affairs as a temporary legislative consultant. She is an experienced legislative liaison and will coordinate the institutional message we will take to Olympia. Institutional priorities in summary form are: rebase enrollment target, return funding for enrollment that did not materialize, and develop a recovery and regowth plan.

To accomplish these priorities, we will conduct a market study to determine demographics and needs of the students in our region. The music education facility is a priority.

Searches

Position announcements for the vice presidential vacancies – provost/ vice president for academic affairs and student affairs and enrollment management – will appear in the Chronicle of Higher Education in January.

Strategic Planning

Provost Dauwalder and Dr. Libby Street have been working with the strategic planning synthesizing committee in a university-wide planning effort. Planning will help us shape the budget process, as budget decisions must be in line with planning parameters.

Discussion Items

Quality of Life Facilities Strategic Planning Maren Oates outlined the Quality of Life Project for board members. Trustees reviewed a preliminary assessment report on the project from the consulting firm. The next phase of the project will require another consultant. Details of the remainder of the project will be finalized by the end of the academic year with status reports provided through early spring.

Motion 00-59: Mr. Reich moved, seconded by Ms. Yu, that the board requests the president to commence budget development taking into account 1) the enrollment deficit we have encountered and 2) the potential of state budget reductions in the future and justifying recommendations with reference to our approved strategic emphases in particular and our strategic planning process in general. Motion carried.

Other Reports

Faculty Senate

Dr. Nelson reported on a successful professional development day for faculty December 6. He reviewed faculty response to enrollment deficits, the possibility of reduced budgets, and involvement in legislative discussions. Many faculty are also participating in the strategic planning synthesizing process.
