The only way we could complete these valuable projects is by having the exceptional staff and faculty we have at the Brooks Library. Over the past six months we have had the addition of the following faculty who will bring a myriad of outstanding qualifications and experience

to the library:

Zeb Evelhoch joined us on May 15 as the Electronic Resources Librarian.

Before joining the Brooks Library, Zeb worked in both public and academic libraries in circulation, interlibrary loan, periodicals, e-resources, and acquisitions. He's served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Ukraine and was a semi-pro skier and freestyle ski coach in Park City, UT. Zeb and his wife have been enjoying camping and hiking around Central Washington, and they look forward to continuing to explore the region.

On July 16, Aimée Quinn joined the library as our Government Publications Librarian. Arriving from the University of New Mexico, Aimée has over 25 years' experience as an academic research librarian with many of those years working in academic depository libraries. Additionally, Aimée brings a wonderfully diverse background that includes a BFA in Theatre Arts and strong teaching experience.

She will be working on marketing and the promotion of library programming, library social media, research services, and instruction. 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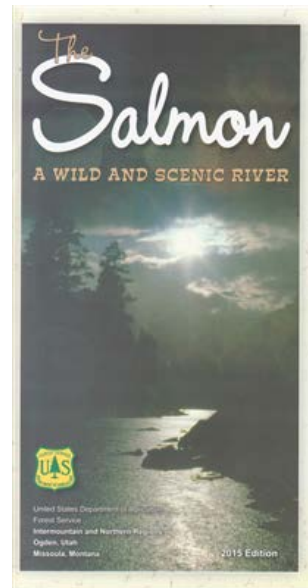
Centers
